## \$9 Million Increase in Values Prevents Any New Tax Increase —

# School Budget Put At \$980,616 For 1975-76 Term

Rankin Independent School District held their annual budget hearing last Tuesday morning with a very light turnout of tax payers present; these being mostly oil company representatives. There was no objections raised to the proposed document as presented.

One reason for the good response to the proposed budget is possibly the fact that no tax increase is called for to finance its funding. This was made possible primarily due to an approximate \$9 million increase in values—primarily oil—within the district over the past year.

This will leave the tax rate and percentage figures at the same as last year; the rate being \$1.45 on the \$100 valuation, and the factor used being 55%.

Called for is a total expenditure of \$980,616 for the next school fiscal year. As is always the case with school budgets, the largest single amount is allocated to school payroll costs; in this instance, about one-third of the entire cost of operations. Total outlay for salaries of all types will be \$695,126, up about \$98,000 over last year. This increase, amounting overall to about 15 percent, is a part of the package approved by the State Legislature for teachers, plus increases granted by the School Board to auxiliary personnel.

Other totals will see \$83,750.00 budgeted for Purchases and Contracted Services; \$53,615 for Supplies and Materials; \$66,080 listed under Other Operating Expense; \$38,475 for Debt Services; and \$43,570 for Capital Outlay.

A breakdown of the Capital Outlay figure shows a wide variety of purchases anticipated for such items as classroom furniture, lab and audio-visual equipment, health and P. E. equipment, new band uniforms, industrial arts and commercial equipment, and a proposed reno-

vation of the band stands at the football field and a possible purchase of a 100-set portable-type bleacher arrangement for the Knobb Hill track field.

Local taxes will supply by far the bulk of the budget, set at \$835,548 (less 2% for non-collections.) Per Capita, paid by the

state, is put at \$78,000 and other state and federal funds are expected to amount to \$4,000. A surplus of \$58,068, left over from the current operations will also go into the total and miscellaneous local income is put at \$5,000 to bring the total to the budgeted figure of \$980,616.

If you have any pecans I would like to suggest you spray as soon as possible for the Pecan Nut Casebearer. On Tuesday I checked some pecan clusters and found the Casebearer had already entered the nut, but only a day or two old.

Application at this time of Sevin or Malathion with a little zinc is in order. On the small sprayers, use 2 Tablespoons of Sevin and 2 T of zinc per gallon of water.

The local low rent housing project was voted in by Rankin residents some ten years ago and has operated "in the black" since it opened about eight years ago. Payments on bonds used for it's construction, are made by the Federal Government at no cost to the City of Rankin. Neither does the City make any direct payments toward the operations of the project and each year receives a small sum of money as payment in lieu of taxes from the operation.

After it is paid off, in some 30 more years, it will become the sole property of the City of Rankin and they will receive any profits that have been earned from its operation. At the present time, the project has about \$2500 in excess operating funds that are not otherwise pledged for maintenance and operations.

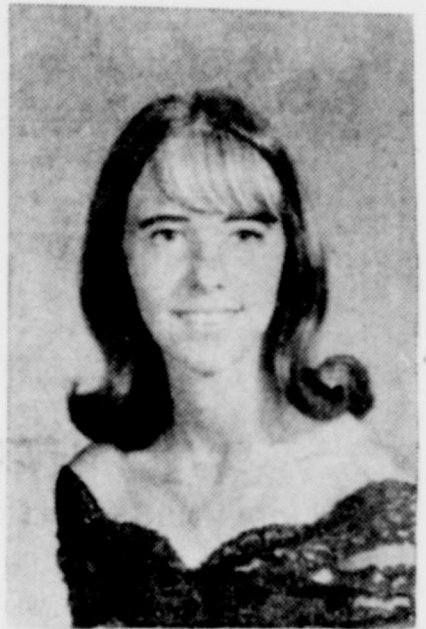
