Postal Services Calling Site Bids for Post Office

Rankin is going to get a new post office.

Plans for construction of a new mail facility were confirmed this week from the Midland headquarters and advertisements for bids for sites appear in this issue of The News and may also be obtained at the post office on Main Street. No date for start of construction has been announced.

In the advertisement for bids on the site, the specifications state that the property must have dimensions of 100 ft, x 150 ft., and containing approximately 15,000 square feet for postal purposes. Location is to be in the "business district" of Rankin.

Deadline for submission of site bids is August 12, 1975. They are to be sent to Mr. Carl O. Hyde, Postal Operations Analyst, United States Postal Service, 100 East Wall Street, Midland, Texas 79701.

This is a bid on site—or land—only. Once a location is made, another bid will be put out calling for actual construction of the building itself. Persons interested in submitting bids should include, in writing, the legal description of the site, its dimen-

sions, location and asking price.

Rankin's present post office was opened in 1953.

Another new post office in the area is to be built in Midkiff. It is reported that bids on their sites must be in by July 31. In a conversation Tuesday with Mrs. Sue Winters, Postmaster at Midkiff, she told The News that she

expected it to take a least a year before they could hope to move into a new building. Mertzon, where a new building is now said to be nearing completion, has been "in the mill" about a year.

It is assumed that Rankin can expect approximately the same length of time—or more—before a new unit is ready for use.

May Not Be Easy

Despite the fact that the Postal Service is calling for bids on a new site for construction of a new post office for Rankin, it might not be a bad idea to hold onto your parking place at the present one, if past issues of the Rankin News are any indication. Getting a new post office wasn't all that easy back in '53 when the present structure was erected.

Old newspaper files tell of the first bids in 1952 for 1600 square feet of space being rejected. W. O. Adams was then the acting post master of Rankin and he is quoted as saying that he felt the bids were rejected because the proposed rent of about \$150 per month was too high.

Issues of the paper in February of 1953 tell of bids being taken on 1750 square feet of office space and that the late J. P. Rankin was eventually the successful bidder. Adams is then quoted as saying that construction was expected to be completed in August; however, the back

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files do not indicate exactly on what date the new office was put into use.

It is believed that it was in the late summer or early fall of '53—some two years after the first call for site bids went out.


McCamey Officers Fail in Diligent Efforts to Place Blame in Death of Hale



141 New Oil Wells Drilled In **Upton County During 1974**

The production of crude oil and natural gas in 1974 continued to have a significant impact on the economy of Upton County, with the estimated value of the county's production, royalty payments, and state severance taxes reaching new highs.

Upton was one of 197 counties-an increase of four from 1973-which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a year which saw the total value of state production jump from just over \$6.7 billion to almost \$11.4 billion.

The county ranked 27th in the state in the total value of petroleum produced-\$105,2 millionwith \$91.7 million of that coming from the sale of 13.1 million barrels of crude oil; \$13,5 mil-

lion from the sale of 46.2 million MCF of natural gas.

This study by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association shows also that the county's petroleum production last year resulted in the payment of \$13.1 million to royalty owners.

Oil and gas developers and producers spent an estimated \$13.6 million drilling 141 wells in the county last year, with 3.3 percent of that figure lost in eight dry holes. The total drilling yielded 131 oil wells and two gas wells. The exploratory effort in the county included the drilling of six wildcat wells seeking new oil and gas fields.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 673 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1974 and shared a payroll totalling \$9.1 million.

Processing plants also added to the county's petroleum-related economy: the "Oil and Gas Journal" lists six natural gasoline processing plants, with a daily capacity of 131.7 million

The survey also shows that the State of Texas received \$5,2 million in production taxes from Upton County wells, with \$4.2 million coming from crude oil output and \$1 million from natural gas production.

"These figures, whether considered statewide or individually in almost 80 percent of Texas' 254 counties, emphasize the importance of a healthy petroleum industry in the nation's No. 1 energy state," said Sherman Hunt, a Dallas independent oil man who is president of Texas Mid-Continent.

"In the face of declining production in Texas, it is significant that this increased return to royalty owners and producers came from crude oil and natural gas which is free from restrictive federal price controls. But (Continued to Page 4)
