## Extension Excerpts

 Upton Reagan Extension Agent Success with home canning is no accident. Canned foods that look as good as fresh are more than luck. Using the correct processing method is necessary fir good results.The water bath method is used for processing acid foods like fruits and tomatoes. It is a way of processing foods at a temperature of 212 degrees F. Enough heat is supplied by the boiling water to destroy the bacteria, eic which cause spoilage. A wat-er-bath canner is a large kettle with a cover and rack to keep the jars from resting directly on the bottom.
The stem-pressure method is necessary for processing low acid foods like beans and peas. The spores of some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat supplied by the steam pressure canner.
