## Bounty Being Offered On All Coyotes and Bobcat Taken in County

Day, Jr., Upton County Agent, today released a recent meeting of the County Commissioners which it was decided by to pay a bounty on coyotes and bobcats in lieu of the county trappers. Day said this should be a savings to county funds and at the same time help control varmints on livestock in the county.

bounty must have some evidence of a kill or capture, such as a scalp, hide or carcass, have a certification by the Upton County Wolf Club that it was taken in Upton County, and present it all at Day's office at the courthouse in Rankin. Hunters and trappers may keep the hide of any animals for whatever salvage value it may have.

The Upton County Wolf Club is an organization that has been in the county for some time. It is composed primarily of ranchers and stockmen who pay an annual fee of \$1 per section with the funds used toward control of wild animals that prey upon their livestock.

## B-TEAM PUTS PERFECT RECORD ON LINE AGAINST JAL —

## Red Devils Take Week Off With an Open Date

With the exception of the RHS B-Team, footballers will be taking this week as an open date. The B-Team is to play Jal, New Mexico here on Thursday afternoon, Sept. 25. In their last encounter in Jal on Sept. 11, the young Red Devils took a 20-0 decision. Last Thursday, playing before the home folk, they chalked up a 24-0 win over Wink.

Their season record is now at 3 wins and no losses and they have put 66 points on the scoreboard to 6 for their opponents. Only Wink, in the first game, has scored on them.

Last Thursday, the Junior High 7th Grade put it on the Wink 7th Grade to the tune of 22-0 and the 8th Grade had a whopping 54 points to 12 for Wink. Last year—when they were 7th Graders—the '75 8th Graders went winless and scored only one touchdown during the season.

Both the Red Devil varsity and the two Junior High teams will

be open this week. For the Red Devils, last Friday night was another "character builder" in which they outthit, out distanced, and overall outplayed their opponent—in this instance the Jal Panthers—but lost the game by a 14-13 count. This was the first time for the New Mexico team to beat any Rankin team in the last four year at football.

For the Rankin Junior squads, Wink has been a victim of their two wins and no losses. This is the best start in several seasons for the Juniors. Their next outing will be on Thursday, October 2 when they go to Mertzon—and another first of sorts; this being the first time any Rankin team has played a Mertzon football team in over twenty years.

# The Scoop

## THE STATE OF WHAT—

Last week it was noted that the City of Rankin has already received more than \$3000 from the one cent sales tax that went into effect here last April 1. The exact figure is \$3,243.51. This also means that—for the same period of time—the State of Texas has received \$12,974.04 for its 4-cent sales tax out of Rankin.

All this money represents only five months of tax collections with the biggie—December said to be the best—still to come. In other words, the City of Rankin is going to get something like \$6 or \$7 thousand a year—quite a bit more than had been expected. BUT, the State of Texas will get around \$27,000 out of Rankin for 1975.

Think of it—\$27,000 out of a little hick town like Rankin . . . and think of how much the state gets out of Houston, Dallas, El Paso, Odessa-Midland, and on and on and on. What in the world are they doing with all that money down in Austin? How can there possibly be any remote need for additional state taxes as is now being talked—principally a state income tax?

For the life of me, I don't know of one thing that the state of Texas has ever done for me that I didn't help pay for. We have good roads—especially around the big towns, where the roads are paid for out of the gasoline tax. It's also true that some money is spent on education but a big hunk of that money is picked up by the state through local taxes; approximately 92 percent in the case of the state sales tax and the property tax are only two of the taxes collected by Texas. In addition you have property tax, beer and liquor—which is a pretty little sum, cigarette and cigar tax, — a tax here and there. It boggles the mind when you try to get some estimate. And every time the legislature goes into session, and more money—and, in some cases, pass another tax on it.

A LITTLE BIT —

As the date approaches for the special election to see whether or not Texas wants a new constitution, there is beginning to be little bits of light fall on the proposed changes. A couple of weeks ago when we played McCamey in football, I had a brief chat with former McCamey School Superintendent H. L. (Senator) Wheat. I'm not too sure where he got the nickname of Senator— I don't believe he ever held public office—but at the present he does have some sort of job in Austin for a private firm—not the State.

Senator Wheat says he feels that the new proposals are all slanted to benefit the big cities of Texas; that there is very little if anything in it for the rural portions of the state. This, considering the present make-up of the Texas Legislature—the people who had a big hand in writing up the proposed changes—would seem to be a very strong possibility. I get the feeling that a-

about all that it provides for we country folk is ample opportunity to help pay the bill for such things as mass transit systems for people in Dallas or Houston; and most certainly in Austin. I am more and more of the opinion that the new constitution is—as has been reported— nothing more than a special interest piece of legislation and that it has practically no merit aside from that.

I never did like it and now I'm beginning to get the feeling that it's a real booger. Furthermore, I still haven't found anyone who can tell me exactly what it proposes to do. Oh, anyone can find people who will tell you how good it will be for the State of Texas—or how bad — but if you will check them out closely, you will find that they are mouthing politics and little, if any, facts.

Another little item on voting: it has now been learned that even the election sets; the packet of supplies such as tally sheets, registration lists, etc. that are used to hold elections must be printed in English and Spanish. This means more than double the cost and the firm I have always ordered such supplies from for retail to the city, school, county, hospital, etc. has informed me that they are not

going to furnish any more election sets at this time—due to having to print them up in Spanish. There's about a dozen forms in an election set and I guess they can't find anyone to translate all that stuff into Spanish for them.

One final kicker: it has now been learned that no county can have less voting boxes than they

do Commissioner Precincts. In the case of Upton County, that will mean four boxes instead of two and double the cost of holding the election. If Loving County, with an estimated population of 160 has four Commissioners—as do most counties—they, too, will have to have four election boxes. Could it be that the whole world's gone bananas?

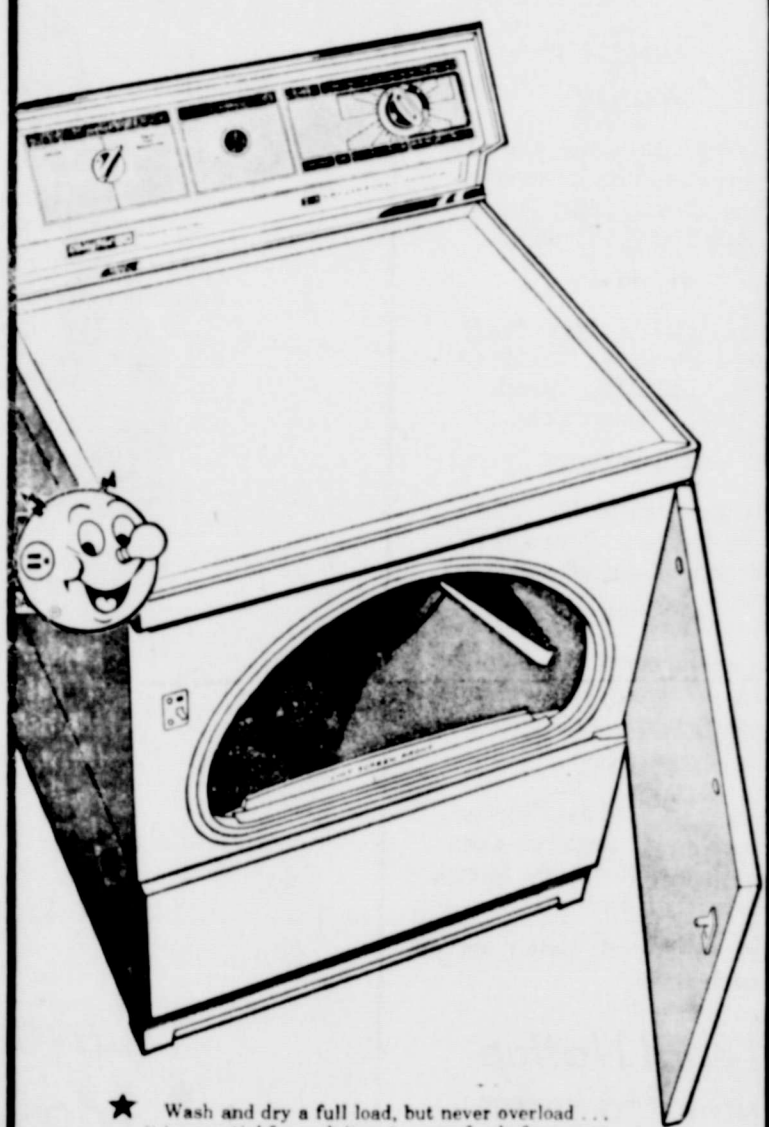

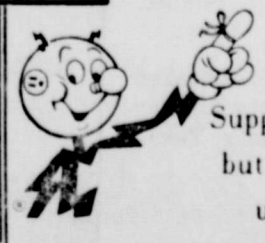
