Plane Crash Kills Former Resident



In a grinding crash that left a big hole in the ground, three men were killed last Saturday .60 of a mile east of the ranch house on the Smith ranch west of Rankin, Dead were William (Bill) Crisp, a former employee of Union Texas who worked at the Benedum Plant in the early 1950's, and Horace Hartgrove, a stock broker, and Evrand Louis Ricci, a businessman. All three were from San Angelo.

Upton Sheriff S. O. Langford, called to the site at 8:50 p.m., said that Blake Atkins, an employee on the Smith ranch, told of seeing the plane in "barrel rolls" as it approached the ranch from the west. It then straightened up and disappeared behind a hill east of the ranch headquarters. In a few moments, Atkins is said to have heard what he believe to be the plane hitting the ground and observed smoke from an apparent fire.

David Noble and Shorty Mayberry, both of McCamey, were driving on Highway 67 and, according to Langford, saw the aircraft strike the ground and burst into flame. They immediately notified the Sheriff's Office through their two-way radio

The McCamey Fire Department answered the call to the fast burning wreckage that left all three bodies charred. Langford said that Crisp was found in the pilot's seat of the plane and the other two victims were in the wing areas.

Services for the victims were held earlier this week.


