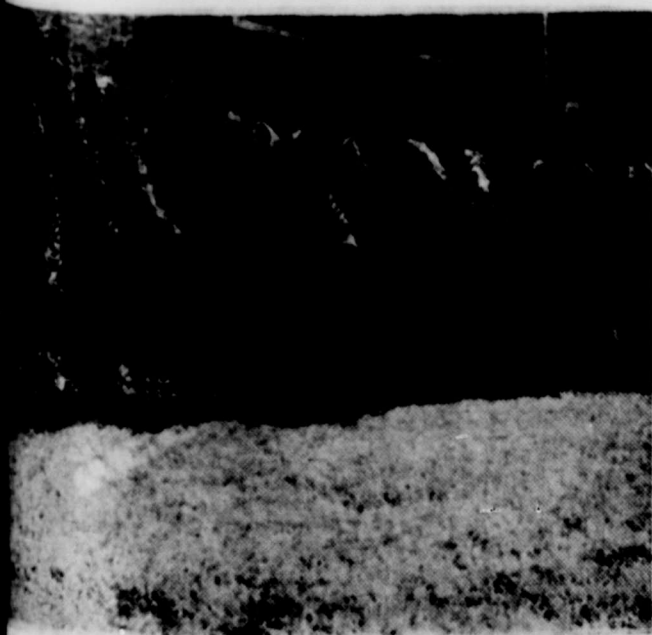

## Services Pending for Carolyn Boggs

Funeral services were pending as of Wednesday morning for Mrs. Carolyn King Boggs, 43, of Vancourt, the victim of a traffic accident some 25 miles east of San Angelo last Monday. She is a former resident of Rankin and was previously married to the late Travis (Shorty) Taylor.

According to a report in the San Angelo Standard-Times, Mrs. Boggs and her step-son, Norman B. Boggs, were riding in the Boggs auto when it was in collision, head-on, with a truck-tractor semi-trailer, driven by Trinidad Yanez of Houston. Mrs. Boggs was pronounced dead at the scene while her stepson was taken to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo for treatment of multiple fractures, contusions and lacerations.

The scene, south of Vick on Highway 87, was the site of another fatal accident that claimed the lives of two other persons within the past year.

Among survivors are her husband, Norman Boggs, of near Vancourt, a daughter, Susie Taylor of the home, two stepsons, Norman, Jr. and Terry Boggs of the home; two sons, Tom Taylor of Rankin and Bill Taylor in the Armed Services stationed at Ft. Huachuca, Ariz.; and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kelley King of Sulphur Springs, Texas.

## Rankin Basketballers to Tournaments in McCamey and Garden City Dec. 5-6

For all but two of Rankin School's eight basketball teams, it's tournament time. Six teams, four from Junior High and two from high school, are to enter tournaments in McCamey and Garden City.

The Red Devil A Team and the RHS Girls A Team will be in the Garden City affair, scheduled for Friday and Saturday, December 5th and 6th. Playing in McCamey on the same dates will be the Junior High 7th and 8th Grades, both Boys and Girls Teams.

In regular play this past week, a slight turn-about has taken place in the high school ranks with the Red Devils currently riding a three-game win streak and the RHS A Girls taking two losses in a row. Previously, the girls were unbeaten and the Red Devils were having trouble getting untracked.

Wins for the Red Devils came when they dropped Imperial November 25, put down the McCamey Badgers 66-56 on Monday and sank Grandfalls 49-39 last Tuesday. The RHS Girls tangled with two top West Texas Girls units for their losses, McCamey and Eldorado.

Action next week calls for the 7th and 8th Grades to host Imperial on Monday with a 5:00 p.m. start. The Junior Girls are open next week.

In high school, all four teams go to McCamey on Monday with the Boys JV Team starting act-

ion at 5 p.m. Also to start at 5:00 will be the Girls JV's.

On Tuesday, the Boys Team will host Imperial for two games with a 5:00 p.m. start by the JV's. The RHS Girls will travel to Crane for a pair, with the Junior Varsity tipping off action at 6:00 p.m.

often put down for going out and "killing off the wildlife." Well, that sound good if you are anti-gun or anti-hunter; but it's not true, according to the facts as presented by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Money derived from taxes on guns, ammo and licenses, has contributed more than \$2.2 billion dollars to wildlife conserva-

tion over the last 50 years. In Texas, that amount has been over \$500 million since 1937. A big portion of the money used in game management comes from hunters, according to the Texas Department.

Other facts point out that hunters are helping—not hurting—the game population in Texas and the U. S. Some figures:

In 1910, the U.S. elk population was 50,000. Today it is at 250,000 or more with annual harvest of 88,000.

In 1900, deer population in the U.S. was estimated at 500,000. Today, the white-tailed deer in Texas alone is estimated at 3.1 million by the Department. U. S. population is put at 16 million with over 2 million harvested annually.

Antelope were down to 12000 in the entire country in 1927. In

recent years, Texas has more than that and there are 175,000 nationally.

As late as 1952 it was estimated that the U.S. had only 97,000 wild turkeys. Today they are estimated at more than one million.

The next time you see a hunter, don't look upon him or her as someone bent on destroying the wildlife of the land. In fact, if we didn't have hunters, it's doubtful that there would be any game at all.

Of course, I don't think it is proper to say that hunters are responsible for there being wildlife. I know a lot of people who don't hunt but they contribute a good bit to the wild life of the country. Think about it.

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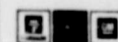

- ★ For best results, use flat bottom utensils with tight fitting covers. Utensils of medium or heavy weight aluminum conduct heat faster, transfer heat evenly and respond quickly to temperature changes.
- ★ Match the utensil to the size of the unit. Use 8 inch units for large utensils. Use 6 inch units for small to average sized pans.
- ★ Use high setting for a quick start for any surface cooking, or to boil water quickly. When cooking temperature is reached, switch to a lower setting.
- ★ Do not pre-heat the oven for roasting or broiling, but do pre-heat the oven to the temperature given in the recipe for baking.

**TREE SAFETY** —  
A holiday of the heart—a time of joy and the young. Your Christmas tree is to guard against the tree early and

keep it standing in water from the day you bring it home until you take it down.

2. Before bringing it inside, saw off the trunk diagonally an inch or so above the original cut for better water absorption.

3. Choose a spot as far as possible from any source of heat that might dry it out or set it afire.

4. Buy light strings certified by the Underwriters' Laboratories. Never use candles on a tree. Check lights carefully for loose sockets or broken wires. Metal trees should have off-the-tree

spotlighting only.

5. Use tree ornaments that won't burn and beware of metal foil icicles dangling into light sockets.

6. Some combinations of decorating materials may be dangerous. "Angel hair", usually made of glass wool, will not burn. Neither will spray-on flocking snow. But snow sprayed on angel hair makes a combustible combination. Read all labels on decorating items.

7. Small children should not be left alone in the room with the tree. Older youngsters should learn not to play under or right next to the tree to avoid knocking it down and to call an adult or teenager to turn the lights on or off.

8. Be careful not to overload the wiring system. If other lights dim when the tree is lighted, disconnect other electrical equipment while the tree lights are on. Do not leave tree lights on when away from home.

9. For outdoor tree decorating, use equipment made especially for outdoor use.
