Following the recession, which will also be played by Paula Corder, a reception for the class will be held in the Home Economics Department in the high school building.



Again, this is not written as a plug for golf; but rather, in an effort for people to better understand just exactly what an outstanding accomplishment these young men have done by winning the state title. And for the third time yet! Golf is not for everyone, but everyone ought to appreciate the dedication of the Red Devil golf team over the past three years to come up with a record such as this. It's almost unbelievable.

Like any sport, some participants are more gifted than are others. Last Sunday, after playing on his second state champion team in a row, one of the Red Devils was observed out on the local links trying to work out a flaw in his game. That, folks is how champions come about.


