



Publisher Tom Anderson of Farm & Ranch magazine writes: "One of the eternal verities is that there is no such thing as equality. Former Secretary of State Christian Herter, who is now our Special Representative for Trade Negotiations, says: "The most difficult and complex of the problems that face us is that of trade in agricultural products . . . Agriculture and industry are interwoven at every point in our economy. Farmers buy a great many of your products, and farmens are more dependent upon export markets than any other major segment of the American producers. The crops on one out of every five acres cultivated here are shipped abroad. Farmers derive 15 per cent of their income from exports -- whereas the United States as a whole exports only 3.8 per cent of its gross national product. Moreover, total farm exports, running at \$5.6 billion a year, amount to 27 per cent of our exports as a whole."

According to the National Research Bureau the cost of a college education will be doubled by 1970. It estimates that, by that year, a four-year education, including tuition, books, fees and board, will cost from \$14,400 to \$20,000 at a private school and from \$9,600 to \$12,800 at a state university.


