I wish to call the attention of the reading public to the practical workings of our laws concerning the public wage classes. In 1885 we had about \$50 per capita and nearly all of it in circulation. While money was flush those public servants demanded higher wages, saying that as the necessities of living were high, their wages were not sufficient, and that we could afford to pay more. It was easy to see no one grumbled at their wages being raised. How is it now? We have less than one-third the amount per capita and it mostly locked up thus reducing the profits of production labor and increasing the profits of fixed salaries in proportion. Every contraction of the currency is equal to a rise in fixed salaries, and a fall in private earnings. You now see that is to the interest of every public servant to favor a contraction of the currency. In a majority of offices the salary should be reduced from 25 to 40 per cent. Where is the injustice or impropriety in a demand for a reduction of salaries in times of financial depression to correspond with an advance in a more prosperous time.
