Recently we heard a speaker mention that the world we live in today is so remarkable that earth-shaking events are practically forgotten overnight.

He mentioned in particular the successful rocket sent by the United States to the moon, which sent back close-up photographs of the earth's satellite through television cameras. His point was that a week later, something else had happened and not a word of the historic moon flight could be found in the newspaper of the day.

We mentally agreed that he was right, but had the point driven home even more this

This time, the planet Mars is the target for a U. S. rocket. Now, the mysterious "red planet' has been a romantic and intriguing neighbor (in space) for billions of years. And, ever since it was first discovered, the prospects for the planet yeilding life similar to that as it is known on earth have been expounded -- from the world's greatest scientists to the world's biggest crackpot movie-makers.

And we have to admit that since the time we first read about the planets in grade school, the prospect has been of interest to us.

What we're getting at is this: When the United States, after years of planning and work, finally successfully launched a rocket which it was hoped might send back some "close up" pictures of our mysterious neighbor, it barely rated a headline in the daily newspaper.

Probably, there would have been no story at all in the papers two days following the launching, except that a small error in the rocket's path was detected. (Errors in Uncle Sam's space and other programs always are newsworthy). So, we at least got a secondday story on how one of the world's greatest "mystery was progressing. Nothing dramatic, however, since it appeared the technical

Comes the third day. (Now, we would think, from our limit- FOR SQUAWS ed knowledge that the early days of such a project are the important ones.) One of the area newspapers carried no story at all. Another had one--but only because Russia duplicated our feat and more or less set up a "space race" to Mars.

error could be corrected.

All of this more than ever proves the point we brought out in the beginning. In other words, "What do you have to do to get a headline in the newspaper?"

Come to think of it, we've had people to ask that question of us.

It's completely out of the realm of our comprehension as to how scientists can figure out where the planet Mars is in relation to the earth. Much less to figure out where it will be in eight months -- that's how long the space flight is to take.

There's so many unknown quantities in a project such as this. There are bound to be That's why we expect day by day reports on how the rocket is coming along.

To our way of thinking, it would be a major miracle if either the United States or Russia is successful in their present mission. That just seems to be getting into "big league" space projects, and we can't believe the space age is that close to us.

Maybe we're wrong. If so, here's hoping it's the U. S. rocket which proves us so.

Undoubtedly, when they get to the point that men are sent in the rockets, more attention will be paid to the progress of such a mission by the press and the communications industry.

## Lazbuddie Voters OK \$235,000 Bond Issue

Lazbuddie School District voters gave a better than 2 to 1 margin to a \$235,000 bond issue in a special election Monday. Final vote count showed 125 voters favoring the issue and 52 opposing it.

The bond issue was called to provide funds for a new science laboratory for the school, a new cafeteria and kitchen, a homemaking department, three new classrooms and related facilities.

The new building is to replace the "Old Red" building on the Lazbuddie campus, which

has been in use for 36 years. The cost of the building program can be met by an increase in school taxes of oneseventh of the current tax rate, without any change in current evaluations, school authorities

Superintendent of Schools Albert Fuller stated that the school board would meet today to declare the results of the election, and meet simultaneously with the architect. John Ward and Associates of Amarillo.

The architect will be given the okay to proceed with the preliminary plans on the program. It will probably require 60 days or so to complete the plans before submitting them to contractors for bids.

It is hoped that the site can be cleared and construction can be begun before school is out this year, although school officials admit that this is optimistic thinking.

"Although it's a blow to the economy of the area, we'll need more time to consider the effects. . . This is a time of self-appraisal and looking forward to the future in an effort to lessen the shock to businesses in Amarillo. . .I don't know when the community has ever been in such good shape to absorb a shock of this kind."

Referring to the closing of the base in times past, City Commissioner Henry Beverley expressed a substantial block of



There were 863 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 909 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 559.1 acres in 1959, compared with 570.1 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$28,714,-107. The value of all crops sold was \$23,915,871. The value of all livestock and livestock pro-

ducts sold was \$4,798,236. The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. 





Using high quality seed is necessary to escape seedling planting date these research disease, Seedling disease escape is selecting for inherent seed and seedling characteristics which will help avoid and resist soil-born ailments.

Seedling disease escape research, has involved evaluating material and selecting for low temperature germination, resistance to seed deterioration, rapid seedling emergence and a low amount of post-emergence damping-off.

The main point is the importance of seed deterioration and its relationship to low temperature germination and seedling growth, Using nondeteriorated seed is important in getting a good uniform stand

of healthy cotton plants. Another important point is that cottonseed deteriorate when exposed to high moisture levels. The deterioration rate is faster when moisture is com-

bined with high temperatures. Deterioration may occur in the field between boll maturity and harvest. It may occur in trailers as they stand in the gin yard and in seed storage if moisture is notreasonably controlled.

What are the results of cottonseed deterioration?

Bird said higher temperatures are required for seed germination, seed germination and seedling growth rates are reduced and seedlings are susceptible to more soil fungi than

those from good seed.

This means that when nondeteriorated planting seed is cotton crop off to a good start, used, planting can be done in colder soil early in the season, growth is faster, and seedlings

**EFFICIENCY** The efficiency of your cotton stripping operation depends on field conditions at harvest, machine characteristics and adjustments, and skill of the

The field conditions are very important. In damp weather, performance of a cotton stripper will be less efficient than under dry conditions. Extensive testing has shown best cotton stripper performance is obtained when relative humidity is below 60% at boll height.

By delaying harvest until humidity is below 60% you should have cleaner fields and better grades if other factors are equal. A dial-type hydrometer measures relative humidity and costs about \$20

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
