Initial Discourse of a Serles On the Labor Question.

The Relation Between Employer and Em ploye One of Mutual Dependence-The Meaning of Anarchy-So- ; lution of the Problem.

Following is the opening discourse of series on the Labor Question delivered by Rev. T. DeWitt Talmage in Brooklyn Tabernacle. The text was: The earth was without form, and void;
