Sudan Bank Re-Elects Directors

After the shareholders meeting the Board of Directors held its annual meeting and elected the following officers:

Walden was re-elected chair man and president of the Board James P. Arnold was re-elected executive vice president and vice chairman, Grady Franklin Maples was re-elected vice chairman, George R. Nichols was re-elected vice prevident. Mrs. Sara 61, Woods was re elected cashier and secretary Jacks Van New was elevated to 275 bales of cotton waiting to be compressed at Central Compress and Warehouse, Inc., in Sudan early Wednesday morn ing, and firemen from two towns were still on the scene several hours later

Damage was expected to be approximately \$20,000, according to Guy Nickels, owner, who indicated that parts of some of the bales probably could be salvaged.

The blaze was first discovered and the alarm turned in at 5:50 a. m., and Sudan firemen who had earlier in the night answered another alarm at the Sudan Live stock 5-Feeding Co., turned out and had the fire under control in a short time. However, fire men had to continue putting water on the slow-burning cotton for hours afterward, and Muleshoe Fire Dept, sent fire men and units to assist.

The burning cotton was at the north end of an area containing thousands of bales waiting to be processed. The cotton which burned was part of a shipment received Tuesday, it was report.

Around 3:30 a.m. the Sudan Volunteer Fire Dept, went to the feeding pens and lought a blaze of burs and fence posts. About 25 truckloads of burs burned, reported Feeders Crainmanager Marvin Tollett, Loss was estimated at about \$350.



"So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. "


