## Exam For Postmaster In Sudan Scheduled

An examination for Postmaster at Sudan, salary \$6285 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until April 2, the U. S. Civil Service Commission announced this week. This examination has been announced under revised qualifications standards agreed upon between the commission and the Post Office Department.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least 3 years of experience (education above high school level may be substituted for 1 1/2 years of experience) showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can deal with the public agreeable and effectively. Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will

be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

## Deadline Near On Inspections

Many motorists in Texas are going to be faced with long lines and waiting periods in order to have their cars inspected prior to the April 15 deadline. Only 39 per cent of the 586,270 registered vehicles in Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety have visited safety inspection station and obtained their 1963 safety inspection sticker, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the DPS.

"All registered vehicles in Texas must be inspected by April 15 and have a 1963 inspection sticker on the windshield," Johnson said. He stated that there would be no extension of the April 15 deadline.

One of four Methodist missionaries to Angola who was deported by the Portuguese Government, will speak at Muldrow First Methodist Church at 7:30 p. m. Friday, March 22.

The Rev. Edwin Lemaster, 39, of Lexington, Ky., was deported by the Portuguese Government after being accused of "activities subversive to the government." Although no proof of the charges were ever made, he and the three other missionaries were imprisoned in Lisbon for 90 days before their deportation.

Denial of the charges were made by the missionaries and efforts to get the Portuguese Government to make public their charges and proof of those charges, are being made by the Methodist Board of Missions in New York.

For a lighted city on a hill cannot be hid! Since we have the joy and light of eternal life through Jesus Christ, eternal love and fellowship now in the abiding presence of His Holy Spirit, how shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation and do not share this glorious light with those in hopeless darkness?

How brightly is the light of Christ, the glory of God, shining through you? through me? I know as God's child (born again through Jesus' shed blood for my sin and for yours), with all this

joy and delight that is mine in the growing knowledge of my Heavenly Father and His Kingdom, that I am compelled to shout from the housetop, to hold forth the word of life to all, which is that Jesus loves!

I am compelled by the very dazzling light of His presence, to reveal to you that what Christ has done for me, He can and will do for you. I am compelled by the humbling thought of Christ, the Son of God, King of Kings and Lord of lords, who loves even me and died to save me from my sins; yes, I am compelled to witness by a love for me that is past all understanding. I am rooted and grounded in the love of Christ, for I am His and He is mine. I could not but tell what I have seen and heard in His presence and from His Word.

If you are not a Christian — if you have not accepted Christ, repenting of your sins, do it now, quickly, confessing Christ before men that He then will confess you are His, to the Father. God is the almighty Creator and King, but He also is the loving Father who hears and answers when a sinner turns to Him and says, "Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner." 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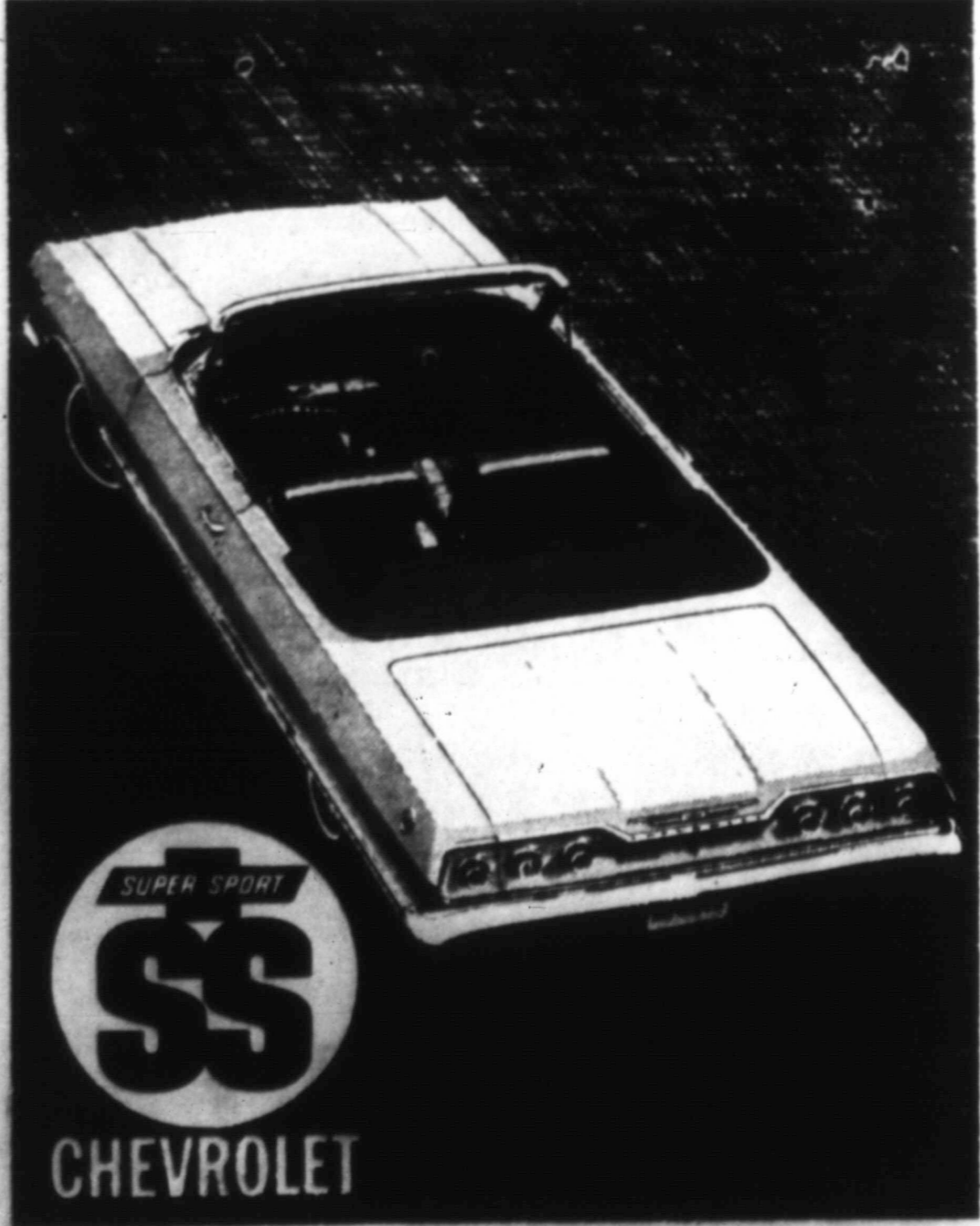
