But now Armour and Co., from a new facility in Houston, says it will market a steak under the official name of a Texas Cut Steak.

A lot of times in the past, Texans who eat good steak have paid for beef from their own ranges, paying a double freight bill growing out of shipping steers to northern feed lots, then paying their way back to Texas as fimished beef,

However, expansion of feed lot operations in Texas-and the Sudan Livestock & Feeding Co. is one of the biggest-assures the state an ever-increasing supply of Texas fed and finished beef.

The Texas Cut Steak is designed for restaurants, club, hotel and other dining out facilities, and comes in 8 to 16 ounce portions. Armour says it comes out of the rib section with bone out and is completely edible with no waste.





Save Water, Farmers Urged

Irrigation farmers still have time enough before planting crops to make provisions for retaining irrigation "tailwater" on their farms.

A spokesman for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District said this week literally hundreds of systems have been installed throughout the area this winter for re-circulating irrigation "tailwater" from the bottom of the farm fields to higher points where the water can be used.

Tom McParland, Manager of the Water District, stated that the District's staff has recently completed measuring water levels in hundreds of observation wells throughout the District, He pointed out that water levels have again declined from where they stood at this time last year. In fact, according to McParland one county in the northwest portion of the District had an average annual decline in 38 wells of about 7 feet.

He mentioned the water-level decline to point out the urgent need to conserve ground water.

THE FIZZLE FAMILY

How many times have you been caught without anything to serve unexpected guests, or even your own family. Here's a plan to keep you from getting into the same fix again. Start a collection of quick supper ideas and recipes using the staples that are always on hand supplemented by canned and packaged goods that you can keep on the cabinet shelf. As a starter, here's a recipe for Crab and Corn Chowder served with saltines. Fill out the meal with canned tomato aspic, and for dessert, a packaged pudding.

Crab and Corn Chowder

- 1 cup water
 % cup chopped celery
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 bay leaf
- meat
 1 cup milk
 1 cup (8-ounce can') cream style

1 envelope Knorr cream of mushroom soup mix

1 (5 1/2 to 7 1/2 -ounce) can crab-

corn 4 cup pimiento strips

Bring 1 cup water to boil in saucepan; add vegetables and bay leaf and cook until vegetables are "ender. Discard bay leaf. Drain vegetables, add enough water to siquid to make 2% cups. Empty soup mix into a saucepan. Gradually stir in liquid. Bring mixture to boil, stirring constantly. Reduce heat; partially cover and simmer 5 minutes. Pick over crabmeat and remove cartilage pieces. When soup has cooked for 5 minutes, stir in milk, vegetables, corn and crabmeat. Heat. Serve with saltines. Makes 3 to 4 servings.
