Visitors to San Francisco still peer at Alcatraz through telescopes, still click their shutters to make it the most photographed piece of real estate in the West, still admire the barren beauty of "The Rock" as it guards the Bay.

But now there is a difference, because the famous prison is empty. The buildings and dungeons, which housed Confederate prisoners, Indian chiefs and the most famous gangland bosses of the age, are crumbling. And quietly, in mid-March, the last of the inmates was transferred.

No one yet knows what will become of "America's Devil's Island." Some people suggest it should be made into a recreational park. Others would like to see a gigantic statue rising from the 135 foot rock, welcoming ships to the harbor.

Commissioners noted that the addition now has eight homes without city sewer, and others are being built, and expressed the wish to keep pace with the progress of the city.

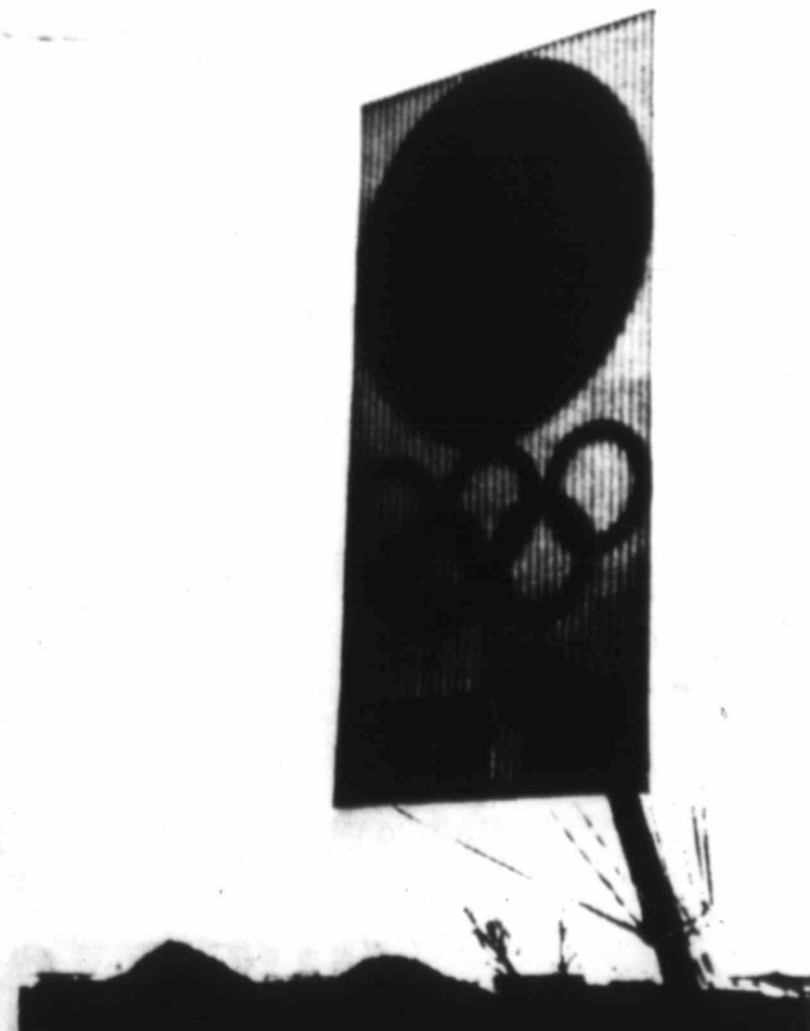
### TWO FROM SUDAN HAVE PAINTINGS ON DISPLAY

New Design Trend  
Schools Get Expandable Classrooms



One of America's oldest building materials industries appears on the verge of its biggest boom. For the Indiana limestone industry, that would be quite a boom. Time was, when nearly every building had to be made of limestone—the Indiana variety, at that—an unusual stone found only in a small two-county area of southern Indiana around Bedford and Bloomington.

As the result of new concepts in architecture, Indiana limestone has become as modern as tomorrow's newspaper. The stone still come from quarry operations, some of which pre-date the Civil War. But this limestone has a new and different shape, size and finish.

Educators say, for example, the new Indiana University schools (a teacher-training laboratory school) may create a revolution in school design, planning and teaching. One of the most amazing innovations of this \$5,200,000 complex of 13 separate buildings is the use of 2-inch-thick, 4x8-foot limestone "sandwich" (insulation bonded to the stone) panels, a complete wall section hung with just two bolts and a rubber gasket seal between panels. These panels and the "space age" ideas developed by the architects, are as important as the imaginative educational research and unique teaching methods the school will provide. David O. Meeker, Jr., associated with an Indianapolis architectural firm, developed the design. The school will teach all grades and high school.

The "closer" panels will make it possible to expand even a single classroom economically, by simply relocating the stone slabs. Indiana University's Dean Harold G. Shane said, "Most modern schools, including laboratory schools, have a characteristic of becoming too small and enlargement can be expensive. The building site has been laid out so that all steel columns are in straight lines, even though the individual buildings

may be quite different. Conceivably, the entire area might someday be covered under one roof. Meanwhile, when expansion of a building or part of one (in any direction), is required, the steel columns are erected in the pre-determined spot of the master plan. The insulating panels are then removed and rehung to enclose the extended structure.

Good news to the taxpayers is the low cost. The square-foot tab will be \$14.37, Meeker said. The average school cost per square foot, one study reports, is \$15.48. Indiana limestone exterior walls with practically no upkeep, cost up to 60 per cent less than brick, which can not be moved, he added.

Architects find the new design techniques exciting. Daily they are uncovering new and unusual applications for this richly textured, easily carved, warm-colored natural stone. "Modular"-type "sandwich" panels of smaller size are now popularly used everywhere in high-rise "curtain wall" multi-storied buildings. Opinion research shows 46 per cent of architects say they'll do even more of this in the future. Some small panels are made as thin as one-quarter of an inch in width. "Yet very thin Indiana limestone panels aren't desirable," one stone company executive cautioned, "and they are actually more expensive than reasonable thicknesses." He said some persons associate weight with cost, because metals are priced that way. "Limestone is not," he commented, "and heavier walls create tighter buildings, costing less to heat and air condition, thereby saving even more."

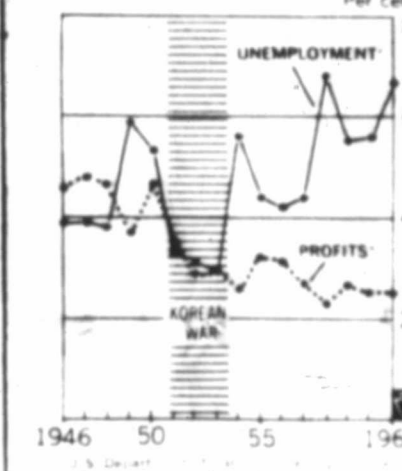

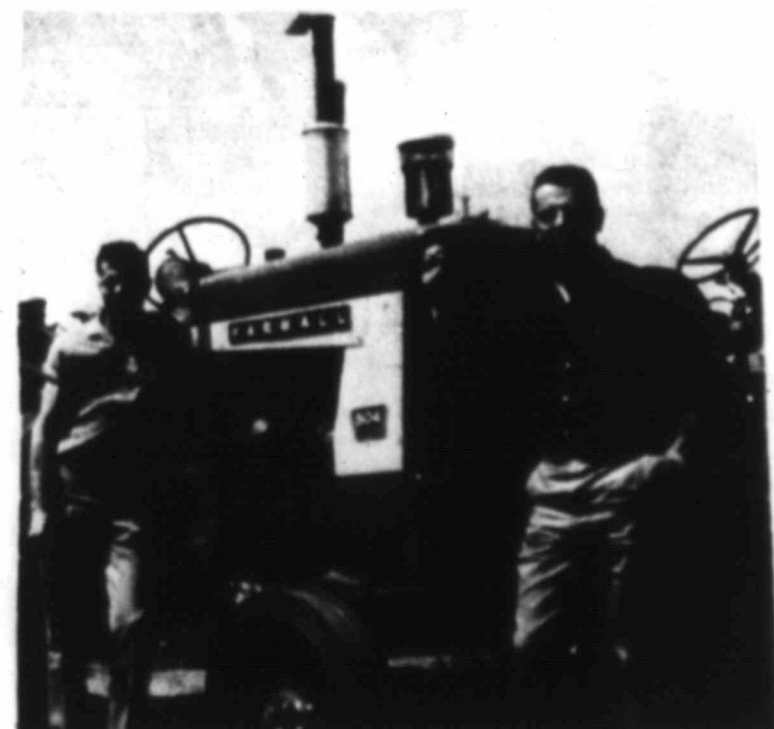
Corporate Profits Mean Jobs

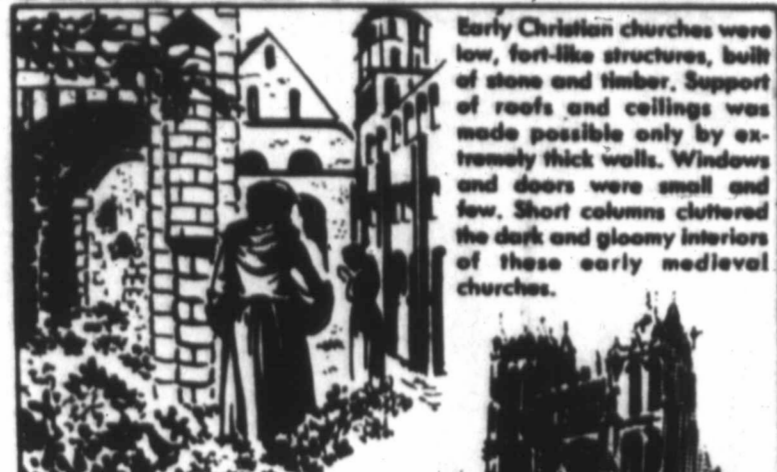
#### To Serve Creamed Seafood

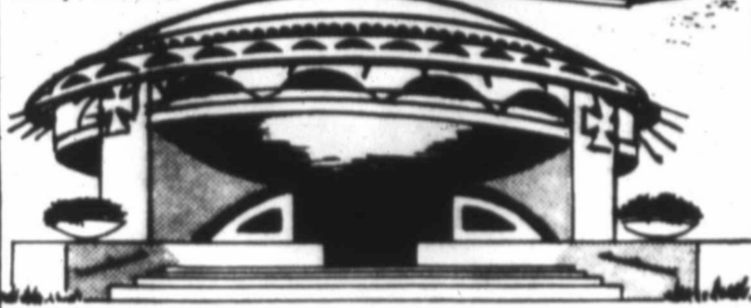
## ALL ABOUT Churches

Spring is in the wind. Even the ice is breaking up on the lakes. Every sunny day promotes the desire to "get-away-from-it-all" for a quiet day of fishing. It will be music to hear the raucous cry of a crow breaking the silence of the woods. The first cast will be a production. Out-of-practice fingers will fumble with the bait. A clumsy thumb will, no doubt, help make the grand-daddy of all snails. Getting out on the back yard for the first few practice casts of the season is a good idea. Try it. Quick casting and fast retrieves won't produce fish this time of year. It's got to be slow and easy. A Frenchman once said that "Genius is nothing but a great aptitude for patience," and when half-frozen fish are stirring sluggishly on the lake bottom, the angler who fills his creel is a genius. Later, the fish will go on a wild feeding spree to make up for a lean winter, but for the moment, you'll have to dangle an Abu-rex temptingly close to get a nibble. Take your time and fish deep. Watching a lure sink and waiting is like watching the proverbial kettle boil—it never does seem to while your anxiously sitting there. Fishing a stream requires care and patience. Melting ice, rushing water, twigs, branches, and hazards to line and lure of every conceivable kind make it exciting and difficult. Streamer flies and bucktails in bright patterns, white and yellow bodied Abu-reflex lures, shiny spoons and spinners, and even a strip of yellow ribbon or tin foil tied to your lure may help produce fish out of muddied water. Use a length of heavy leader, or change the first three feet of your line often. The roughing-up it will take in rocky water leads to lost lures and lost fish. Medium hooks are advisable for fly fishermen, and don't neglect weedless lures. They can save a lot of time and money in the turbulent spring water.

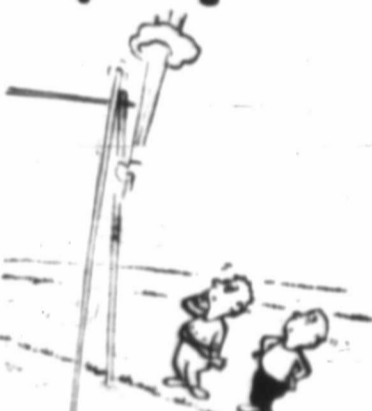
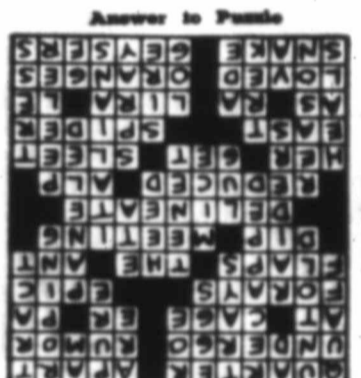

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**TUNA FILLED PEANUT PANCAKES**  
(Makes 5 servings)

2 eggs  
1 cup milk  
1 cup pancake mix  
2 tablespoons Peter Pan Smooth Peanut Butter  
Butter or Margarine  
1 can (16 ounces) condensed cream of celery soup
