## 'Straw Vote' By 22 Favors Integration

Some 31 persons met at the Sudan school cafeteria last Thursday night and after discussing the issue for a couple of hours came to the unanimous - but in several cases obviously reluctant - agreement that the school probably will be better served by integrating the top six grades than by spending \$275,000 or more for a new Negro school.

Representatives of various organizations in the district were invited to the meeting with members of the school board and administration, and their questions and views on the problems facing the board were invited.

A straw vote taken at the end of the meeting found everyone who voted at all, in favor of bringing the Negro students from Collins School into the white school from grade seven on up, starting this fall.

The meeting was called primarily because of the recommendations of the state accreditation committee which visited local schools April 3 and said they would recommend, among other things, that a new site and new building be provided for colored children if a 12-grade school is continued for Negroes here.

As soon as the recommendations become official, when the committee's written report is received here, the board said it plans to have a general meeting, with all the public invited, to explain the alternatives.

It was noted that remodeling projects estimated at \$15,000 were recommended for the school

system regardless of what is done about the Negro school.

Board President Leroy Fisher, who presided at the meeting, also pointed out that no bonds could be voted and sold without an increase in assessed valuations or a new vote and subsequent passage of Senate Bill 116, a financing plan recently rejected by voters in the district.

At the meeting of 22 persons with the nine persons connected with school administration, many obviously were somewhat undecided against it, but who could come up with an acceptable alternative, even to themselves; and some who appeared rather non-committal on the topic until the trial vote was requested.

Figures were presented to the group showing an estimated added cost to the district of \$36,350 per year to remain segregated and still be accredited (by building a new Negro school.) On the other hand, it was stated that savings on teacher salaries alone would amount to \$1,092 per year if the last members of the schools are integrated.

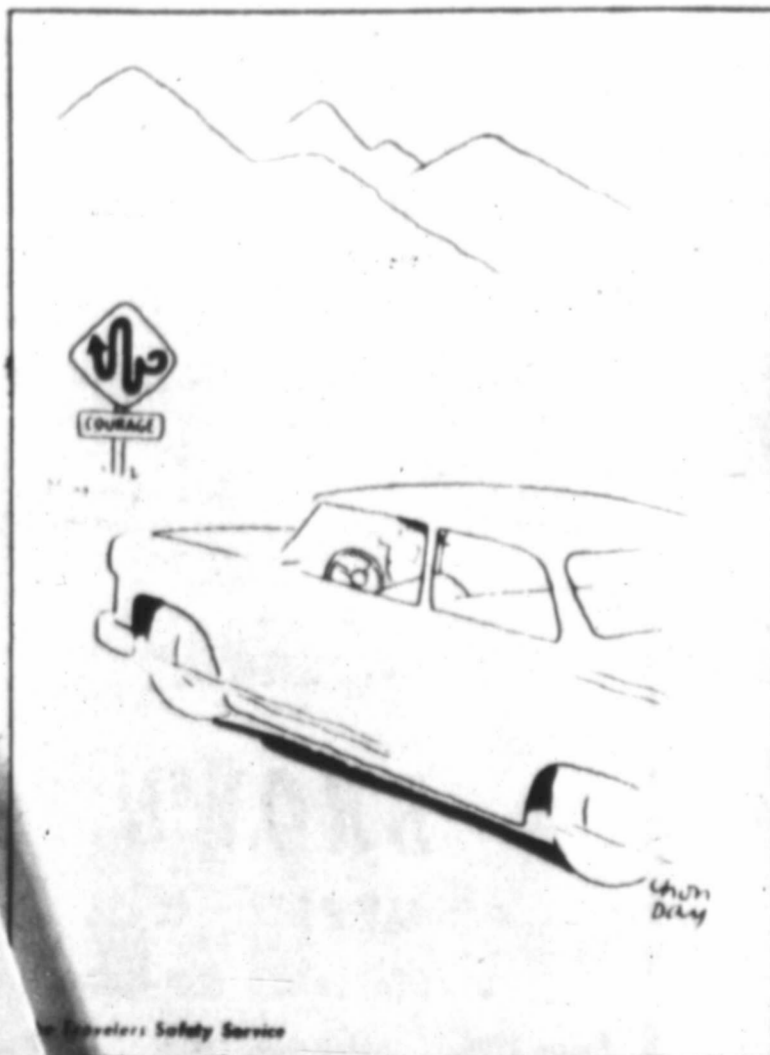
The Negro parents of Collins school students and other Negro citizens here presented a petition signed by 62 adults saying they were against integration in any form.

But it was pointed out that although they may be perfectly satisfied with the current arrangement, and the white patrons of the district may be satisfied, the state still is insisting on an "integrate or build" course of action.

Ignoring the state's recommendations would mean loss of accreditation for the entire school system, meaning Sudan graduates' high school record would not be accepted by colleges.

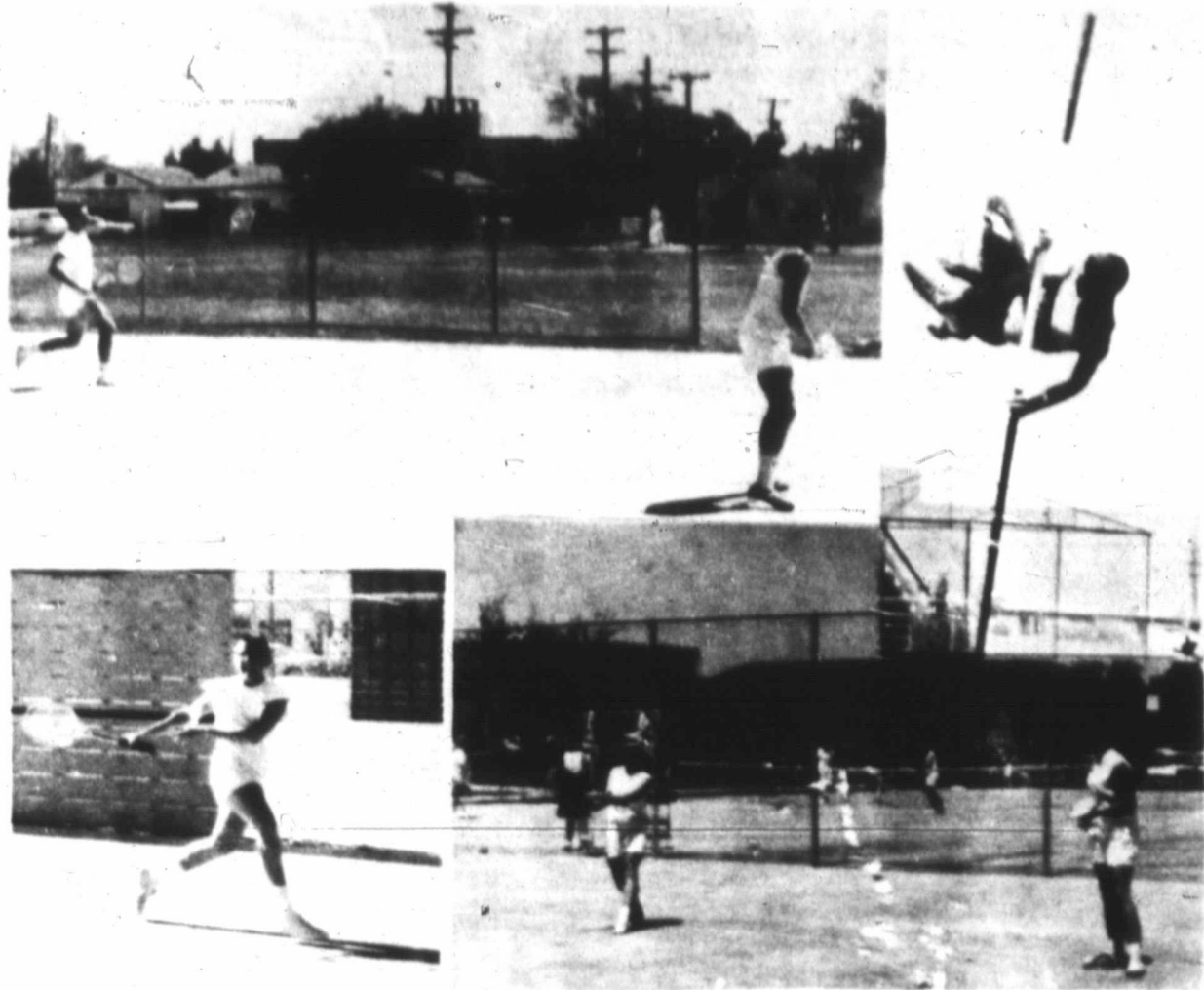

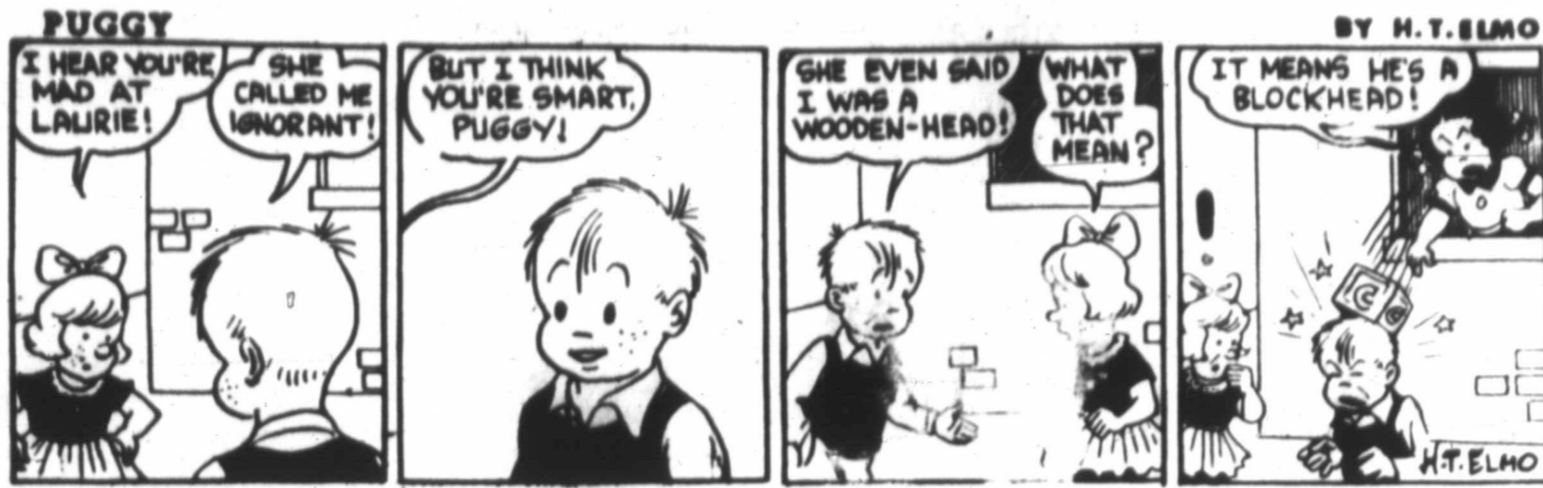

Scripture: St. John 3: 16; Romans 5: 18-21.

Ustinov also will co-star in it with Anthony Quinn. Suskind's production of "Hedda Gabler," starring Ingrid Bergman, has picked up one of two sponsors needed and may air as a CBS special in October. Allan Sherman, who made the "My Son, the Folk Singer" hit album, may do a couple of CBS specials this summer. Hugh Downs will take flying lessons soon that will later be aired on his Today show. An automatic camera will be rigged in the cockpit when he solos. Despite repeated ABC promises that Voice of Firestone will be on next season, it now appears that the show will be canceled after the summer. 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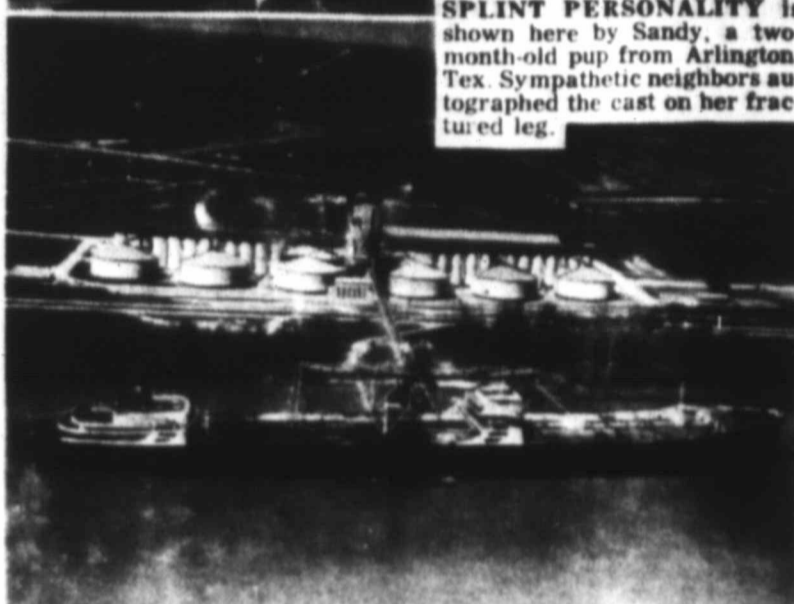

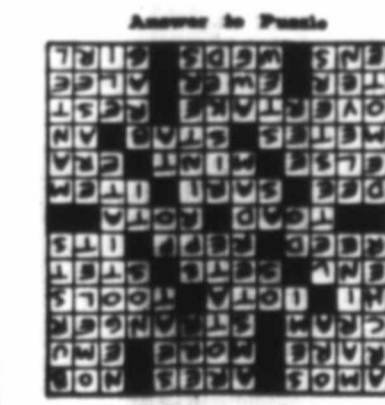
