IF YOU THINK prices of sugar are high, just wait until after Aug. 24 and you renew your auto liability insurance. The legislature once more has tacked on more compulsory insurance, and apparently is in a race with the federal social security agency to see who can get away with the most increases before the people finally openly revolt.

Rep. Bob Fairchild of Center, who surely must make more money than I do, sponsored a bill to raise the bodily injury insurance or security requirements under the driver financial responsibility law from \$5,000 for one person and \$10,000 for two or more to double those amounts.

Incredible as it seems, the bill passed both houses. Twelve senators recorded "no" votes after it was passed by voice vote. In the house, it was close, 68-67, with speaker Byron Tunnell breaking the tie.

No, one will ever have to remind me not to vote for Tunnell or Fairchild or anyone else I find who approved the measure. I do not know how Sen. Andy Rogers or Rep. Billy Clayton voted on

Argument for the bill was that court judgments impersonal injury cases often exceed \$5,000. They sometimes exceed \$25,000 too, I expect, so look for more increases two years from now if they can muster enough idiots to

Argument against the bill, voiced by Rep. Elimio de la Garza of McAllen, was that 35 per cent of the drivers cannot afford to carry liability insurance at presentrates. So, he said, there will be even more uninsured motorists on the highways after the Fairchild law takes effect.

Estimates are that the average driver will pay about \$5 more a year in premiums. That isn't much, except that it's added on top of a premium already far too high, and one which is likely to

The financial problem is an old one, as the school district is winding up the year approximately \$30,000 in the red, and the present tax rate of \$1,50 will just take care of the budgeted expenses for coming years, leaving nothing to pay off the deficit. An earlier attempt to provide an answer to that problem fell flat when voters in the district rejected a proposal (Senate Bill 116) which would permit the district to levy a maintenance tax with a maximum ceiling of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, with the interest and sinking fund added to that. The board had planned to levy a tax of about \$1.50 total, but the vote killed that,

Thursday night's discussion is expected to include the possibility of calling another election on Senate Bill 116, rather than accept the less desirable alternative of raising valuations across

Although the seed in grown in Argentina it is genetically the same as that produced in the United States. Look for the tag "Grown in Argentina." in your shipment this year. It is an example of greater agricultural cooperation between American countries.



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



Feeding The Mature Dog Dog owners take great care, in feeding puppies the proper diet. As a dog matures his dietary needs change but there are still basic principles of feeding which must be followed to keep him in the best of health.



Most important in feeding mature dogs is that the food be completely nutritious and that it be

served in proper amounts. An inadequate or deficient diet for an adult dog not only causes poor body condition and rough hair coat, but also lowers the body's resistance to bacterial

Experts at the Purina Dog Care Center recommend this gen-eral rule for feeding a dry ration to grown dogs: one-half ounce of dog food per pound of body weight per day. Following this rule, a 32-pound

dog would get 16 ounces of dry dog food daily. However, it should be emphasized that dogs vary widely in their food requirements depending on age, size, activity and other factors.

Once-a-day feeding is sufficient for adult dogs. It is generally desirable to feed about the same time, usually in the evening since this may tend to keep the dog quieter during the night.



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

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
