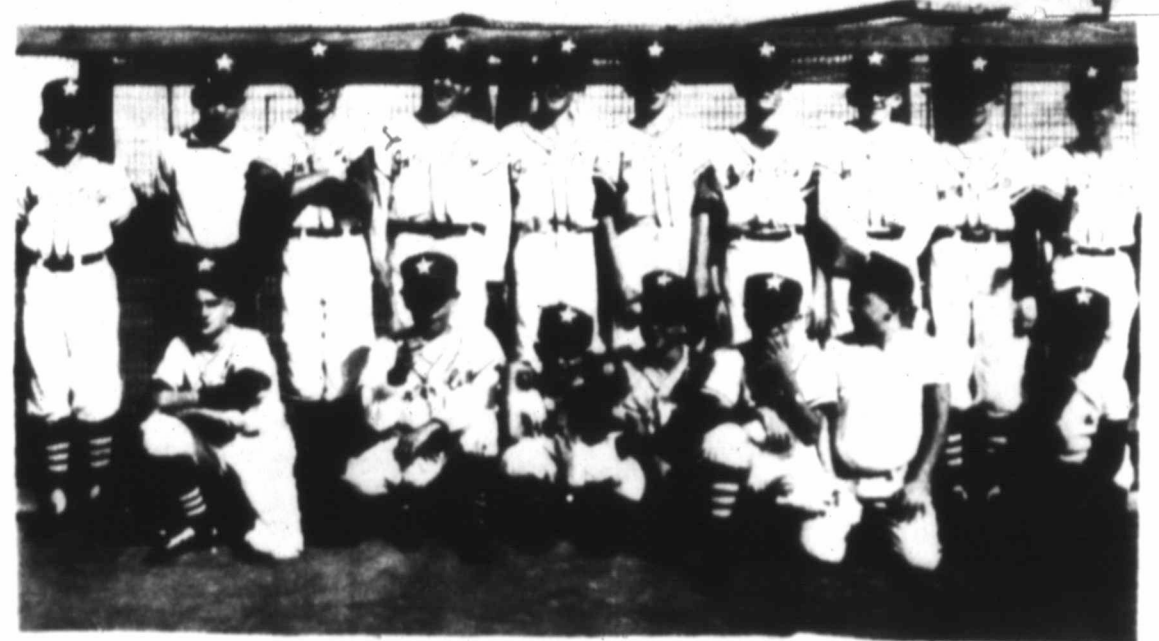
An unofficial report said Miss Curry, winner of the Area I FFA Sweetheart contest, was beaten in the final judging by only four votes.

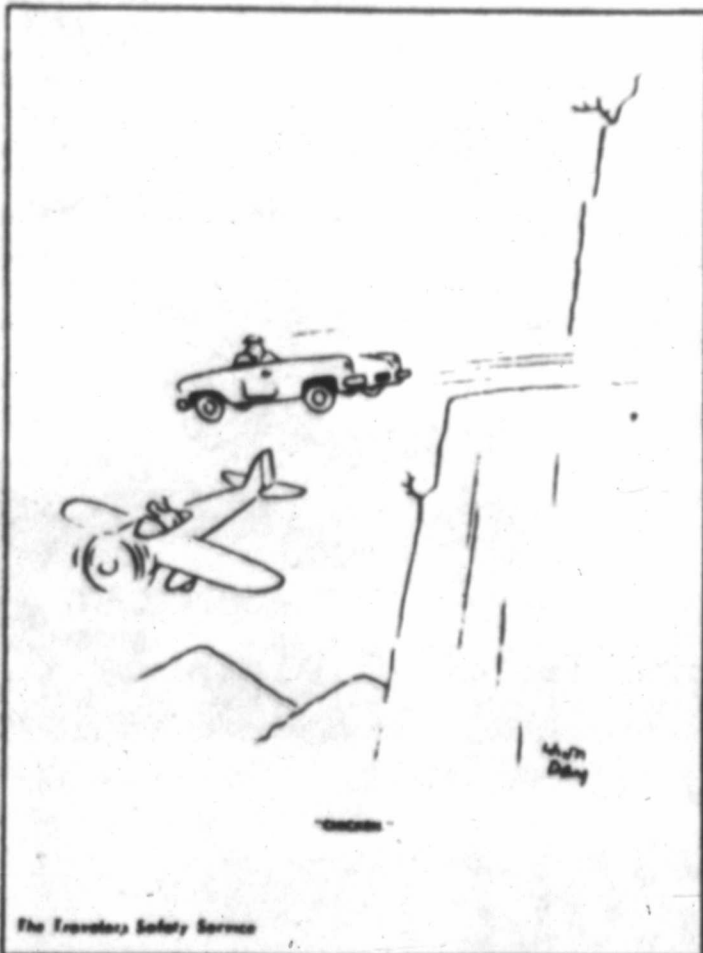

- 12 thin slices (12 ounces) cooked ham (1 #2 1/2 can)
- 3 grapefruit
- 1 large ripe avocado
- 6 pear halves, drained (1 #2 1/2 can)
- Salad greens

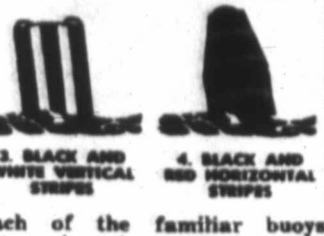

Boating Tips...



Each of the familiar buoys shown above has a story to tell. If you haven't been "getting their messages" here's what they mean: 1) Red, even-numbered buoys—keep them on your right entering a channel or going upstream (remember: red, right, returning). 2) Black, odd-numbered buoys—keep them on your left entering a channel from seaward or going upstream. 3) Black-and-white vertical stripes—mid-channel marker which can be passed on either side. 4) Black-and-red horizontal stripes—obstruction marker which should be passed on side indicated by topmost color. For example, if the top color is red, keep the buoy on the right entering a harbor. Clear all buoys by at least 50 feet, caution Mercury boating experts. Also, don't tie up to a buoy—it's a federal offense.

Scripture: Hebrews, chapter 12, St. John 3:16; 14:1-6.
"Take time to be holy..." I wish that, even if you do not care to read further in this devotional,

you would find and read again the words of this song, for it gives step by step guidance in holy living.

Did you know that without holiness no man shall see the Lord? What, then, is holiness and how can we have it?

First, we must desire it. But, you may say, you don't plan to die and go to hell. Neither do I plan to go to Clovis this week, but if I start out Hwy. 84 and keep going in the direction of Clovis, I will arrive there sooner or later. So, do you really want to live with and to see God?

To see God as your Father, you must first see Him as your Creator, whose word is true (the author of your faith), and believe Him when He promises eternal life to any and all mankind who

will believe in and accept Jesus as His only begotten Son sent to redeem us from our sins. Jesus, sent to save sinners from death and hell into abundant, eternal life! Your part to do is to accept Jesus as your Savior and Lord with all that you are: heart and soul, mind and strength. Give yourself to Jesus and He will enter in, giving Himself to you.

Now, this is the first of a three-fold way in holiness: (1) the setting apart by the Spirit in conviction of sin to salvation (for once you are convinced you need a Savior from sin, you have met Christ!). The Holy Spirit has done His perfect work in bringing you to see your need of Christ. For only Christ can save!

The second in the threefold way of holiness or sanctification is the work of the blood or body of Christ (Hebrews 10:10) — the death of Jesus on the cross, the offering of His body once for all, setting us apart, "sealing us" unto God once for all.

The third way in holiness is the washing of water by the Word. The practical and progressive growth in cleansing us from our "taking heed" according to God's Word. It is a continuous process (Paul said, "I press toward the mark"). When we have by faith in God's promises the first two phases of sanctification, then the last can be pursued by us. And because of God's great love for us, we should want to follow after holiness in order to be pleasing in His sight, to bear witness to His saving power and grace.

Do you know this Almighty God, this heavenly Father, who speaks now in forgiving mercy and wooing, pleading love? Jesus died to save you and bring you back home to the abundant, eternal life and love with the Father. The time to hear and make a choice is now, for some day Christ will speak again in judgment, and everything that can be shaken will be removed.

In what are you trusting for hope, love, peace, security, life forevermore? Do you have Jesus, and thereby have become a member in the kingdom that cannot be moved? Only believe — have faith in God.

Take time to be holy... speak oft with your Lord... make friends of God's children... feast on His Word... By looking to Jesus, like Him thou shalt be.

May God help us to seek holiness.

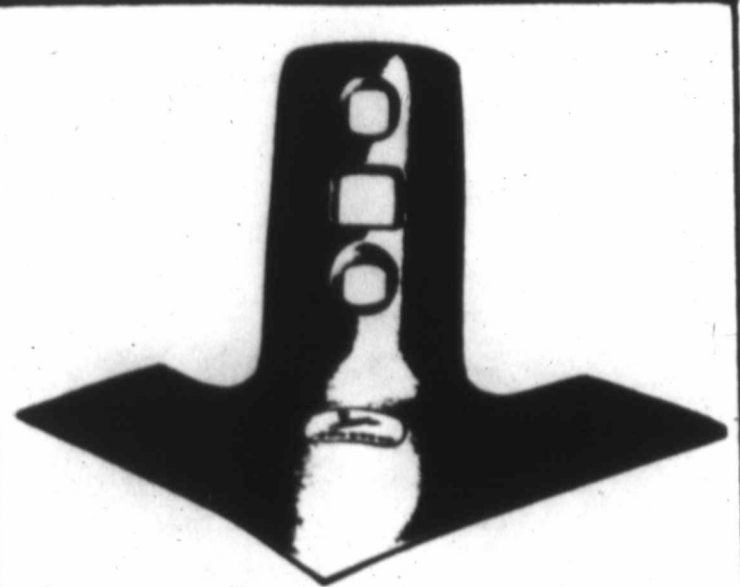

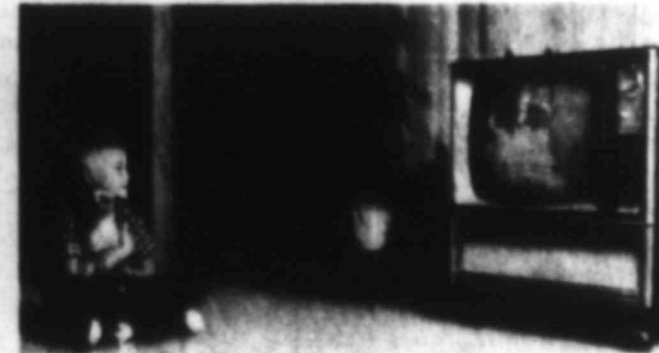
