Paperwork Mountain For New Drug



A physician for a leading pharmaceutical firm studies an 8,000-page, three-foot stack of scientific information submitted in a new drug application being forwarded to the Food and Drug Administration in Washington, D.C. The data support an application to manufacture and market a new psychiatric drug. It is estimated that fifty full working days of reading time will be required to review the information, assuming a maximum of only three minutes' study per page.

Scientific proof of a new drug's safety and effectiveness has been supplied by prescription drug manufacturers for many years, but a spokesman for Eli Lilly and Company estimates that the expanded federal drug regulations effective this year will cause a tenfold increase in paperwork. In 1960 the average new drug application totaled about 800 pages. Future applications, it is felt, may average 6,000 pages or more.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 3 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 3 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

Section 3. Every person subject to some of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces, and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize alternate voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1962.

Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1962 at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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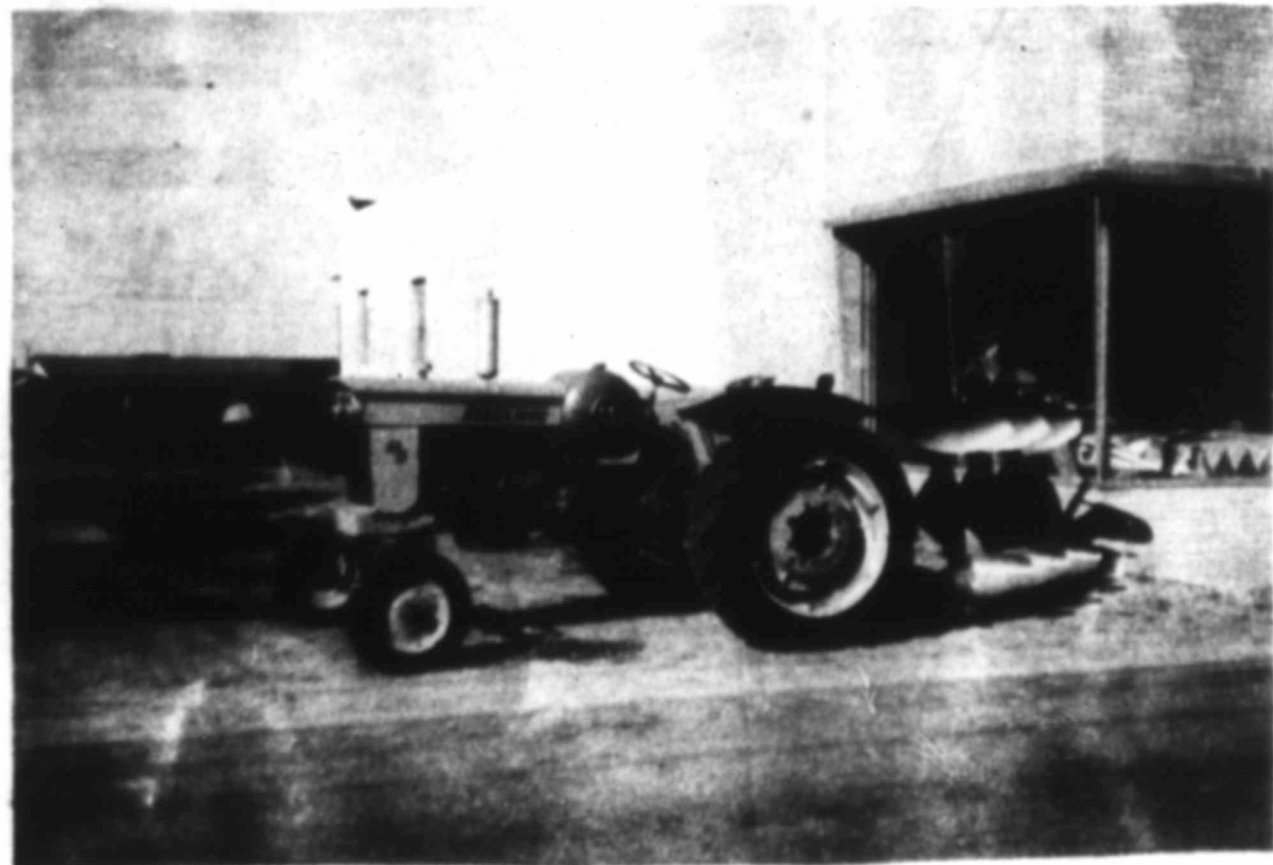

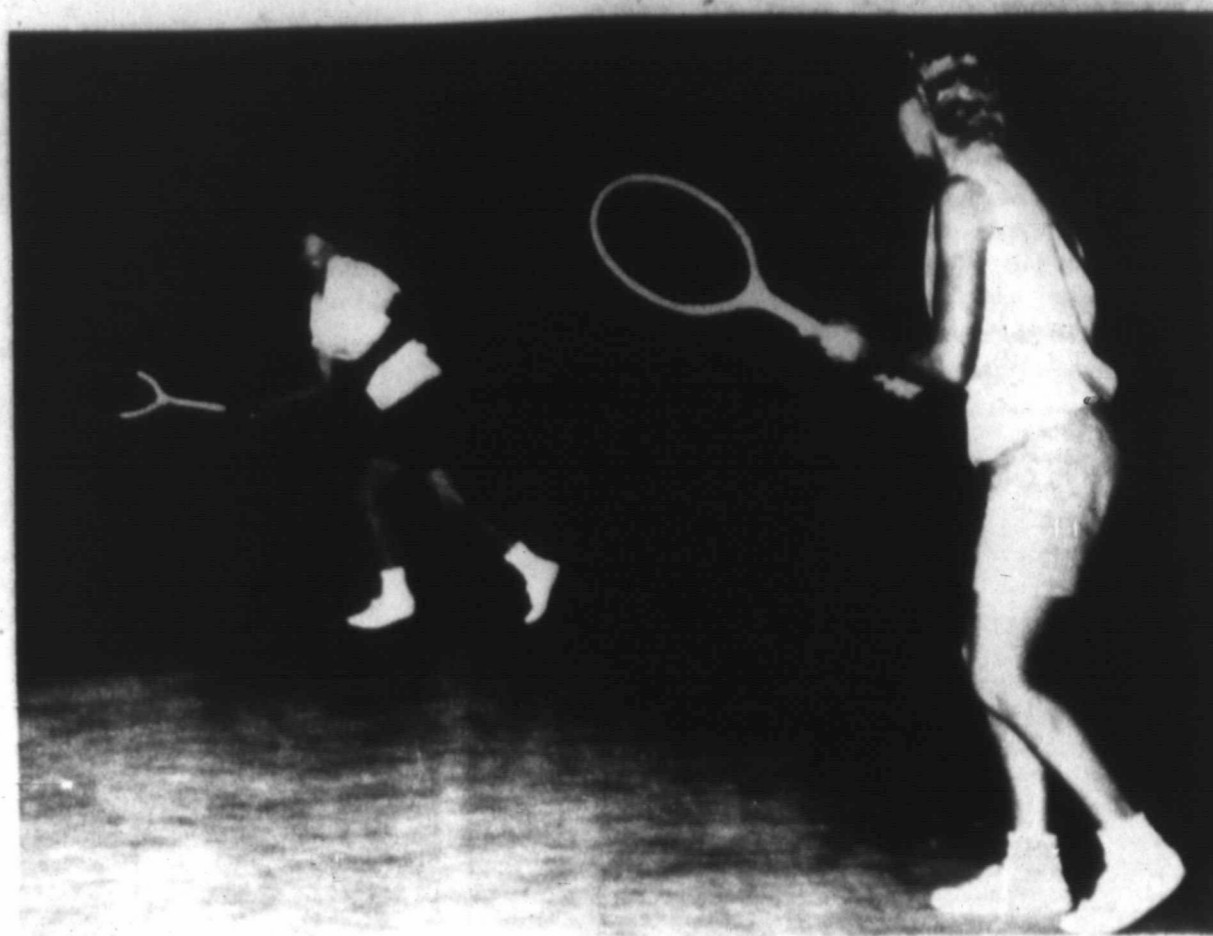

Through Coal Pipelines

New 'Black Gold' For America



The new 88th Congress can provide a significant boost to America's economic growth rate by making possible the construction of privately-financed pipelines for low-cost delivery of coal, the nation's most abundant fuel. Congressional action will help the ailing coal industry — but more importantly it will cut operating costs of many electric utilities which serve American factories and households.

As pretty Alice Lechtenberger of Houston, Tex., demonstrates, pipeline coal is a mixture of water and finely ground coal. When the coal is ground to a special formula, its particles remain suspended in the mixture, so that it can be moved by pipeline and pumped directly into furnaces at electric generating plants. The savings inherent in pipeline transportation, plus other reductions in handling costs, mean lower fuel bills for power plants.

Congress is being asked to grant builders of coal pipelines the right of eminent domain so that the necessary right of way can be acquired. No government funds or financing are involved. After Congress enacts such a bill — which President Kennedy has endorsed — private companies will begin building long-distance coal pipelines and liquid coal will be on its way, adding immeasurably to America's economic and industrial strength.
