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

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Shipping Clothes to School? **Pack Up Your Troubles**



With summer almost over, it's time to be thinking about getting ready for school again. And for increasing numbers of youngsters who attend schools and colleges away from home, there's the problem right now of how to keep a wardrobe at home until the last minute without risking getting to school

there's the problem right now of how to keep a wardrobe at home until the last minute without risking getting to school and having nothing to wear.

Most teen-agers usually want to keep a full wardrobe at home for the long Labor Day week-end. Two days later they may be needing the same clothes at school 500 miles away. If they're not driving, they may be wondering how to ship that heavy trunk and have it waiting for them when they arrive.

Don't panic. In most cases, trunks can be delivered by air door-to-door anywhere in the United States within 24 hours, saving up to a week or 10 days shipping time. And the cost is surprisingly low. An Air Express shipment of a 70-pound trunk, for instance, costs under \$10 for distances up to 500 miles. That includes pick-up at home and delivery to school by R E A Express truck with no special arrangements made for drayman haulage at either end.

Something else worth keeping in mind: Fresh laundry or forgotten items of clothing go fastest by Air Express. Packages weighing several pounds, which surface truckers in most cases won't bother with, travel anywhere in the United States overnight for only slightly more than \$4.

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
