With former alternate quarterback Mike Smith suddenly blossoming out as a topnotch pass receiver and halfback, and with senior quarterback Tommy Thomson throwing better than ever before, the Sudan Hornets Priday night won a 20-12 opening game victory over the towering Morton

Contributing mightily to the win was sparkling defensive play by halfback Pat Brownd, tackle Kennel May and Tommy King. who played center, guard, linebacker and fumble-grabber.

King, a 140-pounder who played only on offense last season, made the most of his first opportunity on defense, cutting down the big Morton backs all over the field. He was in on 17 tackles, six of them unamisted, twice was the direct cause of Morton fumbles, and grabbed one fumble in the

May, playing against tackles outweighing him by more than 50 pounds, still refused to be taken out of the play, and was in on 13 tackles. Near the end of the first quarter, after Morton's big No. 10, Sherrill Griffith, Intercepted a pass and broke into the clear, May overhauled him from behind to save a sure touchdown.

Brownd also saved a TD almost single-handedly when he made three out of four tackles after Morton had a first down on the Sudan 10 in the fourth period. He was credited with 11 tackles.

Although Morton was probably the higgest team the Hornets will face all year, they will run up a-27-game losing sweak last Priday tally. A pass try was short, and

of the Morton game somewhat battered, Coach Hank Brown expects most of the boys to be ready by Priday night. Fullback Roy Roberts had a swollen knee suffered on an out-of-bounds pile up, and Mike Smith had an arm injury, but both should be okay. Biggest blow to the Hornet hopes was a pre-game injury to second team all-district tackle Robert Williamson, Sudan's biggest play er at 174 pounds, Williamson has an injured knee cartilage, and it now is questionable whether and it now is questionable whether he'll play any this season,

Smith scored two touchdowns in the first half, and Roberts bulled over for the clincher in the fourth period for Sudan Friday.

Sudan took the opening kickoff and drove 61 yards to score, with the biggest play being a 32-yard pass from Thomson to End Danny Allen to the Indians 26. Roberts was the workhorse then, gaining 20 of those yards on four carries, and Smith took a pitchout off left tackle to score from 2 yards away. Thomson passed to Allen for 2 points and the Hornets led

In the second quarter, with Griffifth and HB Charles Ledbetter doing most of the damage, Morton drove 42 yards to score, Ledbetter carrying across from the 3. A pass was incomplete, and Sudan still led 8-6.

It took Sudan just 31 seconds to score again as Morton kicked off, Thomson threw one incomplete pass, and then tossed a perfect strike to Smith, who caught it waist high about 20 yards downfield, then, with end Danny Allen keeping him company, raced the rest of the 61 yards to a Hornet TD. This gave Sudan a 14-


