

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



SAUDI ARABIA GOVERNMENT SPEEDS **ECONOMIC & SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT**

New York - Among the developing countries of the world Saudi Arabia is unusual in not owing a single penny to Uncle

Yet, according to the Saudi Arabian Information Service here, the huge Middle Eastern country - three times the size of Texas - is pushing its own elaborate and eostly program of economic and social development to the tune of \$122 million

Among other things this includes a school construction boom that is providing new schools at the rate of one every three days, new health facilities, a network of superhighways, and other public works

Saudi Arabia's development effort represents a happy exception to the usual pattern of foreign aid. The Saudi Government has turned to the United Nations and to the United States for help in supplying technical experts, but this is to recruit men, not money
