## First Trades Days Set This Weekend

AS IF we didn't have enough trouble with the NAACP and such messes as Birmingham and Atlanta, now the women are getting in on the act.

President Kennedy has promised to do something about an 86-page report crammed with statistics to argue that women still are not getting an equal break with men, despite laws saying they should.

The report came from a committee of 13 women and 11 men (all married, I'll bet). It said women especially are getting shorted in matters of jobs and equal pay.

Everyone who has something around he wants to sell is urged to bring items up to the square Saturday morning, and contact some of the auction officials there. The auction will continue until all items are sold.

"We hope this auction will be a popular thing with the people, and they will really participate, both as sellers and buyers," said Calvin Jordan, president of CCA. "It will afford bargain-hunters a good opportunity to pick up some useful things cheap, and lots of people have something lying around which they don't need, but others would be glad to buy at an auction."

The Sudan Trades Days event and auction is planned as a monthly event, provided it meets with good response.

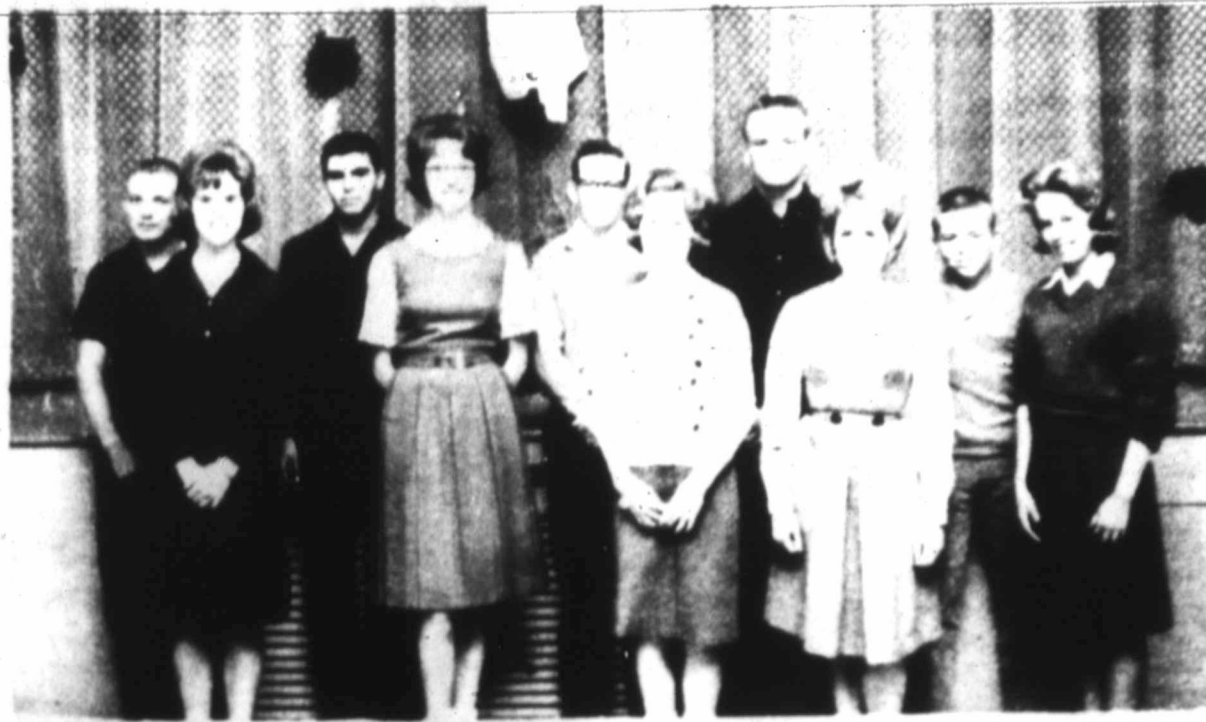

## Teachers Luck Out On Jaycees

The Sudan faculty used a bunch of lucky breaks to take a 36-0 lead on the gallant Sudan Jaycees football team last Tuesday night and then hung on for dear life to barely edge the Jaycees 42-22.

The teachers scored in the first quarter as Dempsey (Bald Eagle) Watkins tossed a 7-yard pass into the end zone to Wayne (Trotter) Potter. The Jaycees took the kickoff and moved to three first downs before they lost the ball around the Teachers 10 when Potter intercepted. Actually, Potter trapped the ball, but the officials didn't see it.

A few plays later, the Teachers scored again as some character went over, and later some other guy scored, and then another one whose name we didn't get. Jimmy (Ironhead) Alsup took a pass from Hank (Charleyhorse) Brown for one of them, and it seems like Watkins scored another one. For most of the first half, interceptions and cigars kept the Jaycees in a hole.

The Jaycees scored just before the half when Jackie (Swivel Hips) Van Ness took a pass and ran across from the 10, making it 36-6 at the half.

Despite some one-sided officiating which definitely favored the Teachers in the last half, the Jaycees outscored the Teachers in the final two periods. One of the Jaycee touchdowns came when Rommie (Bull) Gatewood

tossed 12 yards in the end zone to Field Judge W. C. (Flex-foot) Masten. This play was set up by a beautiful 25-yard pass from Dalton (Petrified) Wood to Referee F. M. (Blind Tom) Smith, who was wide open at the left sideline.

Masten, incidentally, stepped off some of the longest penalties ever seen. By taking the longest stride possible, his 15-yards usually came out about 25 yards. Also, once when the teachers pulled a hideout play which appeared to work for a 40-yard TD on a pass to Watkins, the third official, Jim (Payola) Newman, ruled that the cheating teachers had too many men on the field, and a 55-yard penalty was stepped off against the teachers. However, they deserved it.

Ralph (The Uncatchable) Stewart showed fans how he earned the nickname in the fourth period, when he sped 80 yards for a Faculty TD after taking a pass from Brown. Skinny (Pressure) Gage of the Jaycees also made an 80-yard run, but he never did catch Stewart.

Outstanding linemen for the Faculty were Kermit (Soreback) Sorrells and Roger (Dodger) Heberbrand, while Calvin (Vitalis) Vernon and Don (Dilly) Dykes also were outstanding for the teachers.

Barely standing for the Jaycees were Phillip (Flubber) Gordon and Al (Nervous) Noack. Gordon scored the second Jaycee TD on a 20-yard pass.

Cheerleaders for the teachers were LaDelta Vernon and Anoma Duigeon, Lester (Shimmer) Shanks announced.

A pretty good crowd was on hand, and another good crowd is anticipated next Tuesday when another flag football game will be played, the annual Powder Puff contest between the eighth and senior and freshmen boys and girls in the sophomore and junior classes.

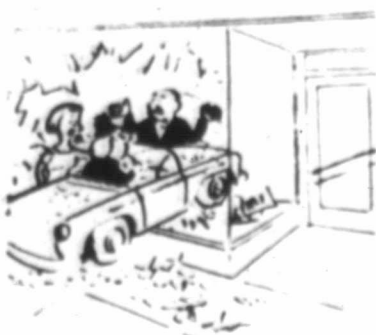

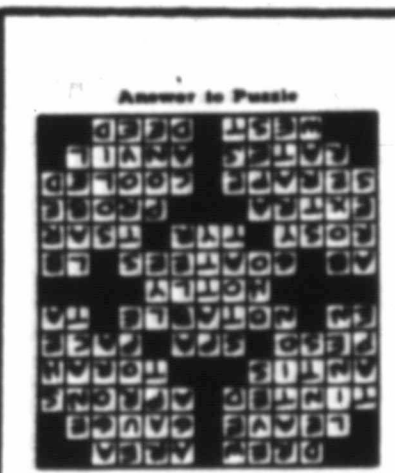

Once again, it's time to winterize your car. By doing it early, you not only avoid the rush when cold weather hits but also have time for attention to some precautions frequently overlooked. It's wise to leave nothing to chance. If you drive a new car with "long-life" lubricants and coolants, follow replacement schedules of your car's manufacturer. With many models, a change of anti-freeze is recommended two years after purchase. In any event, if the cooling system now contains an "expired" anti-freeze solution, or water alone, it is imperative that you replace it with a fresh solution. Before installing anti-freeze, be sure the system is clean and free of grease, oil, rust, and scale. Using Du Pont Frost Flush is a quick, easy way to do this job. Also, see that all hoses and hose connections are sound and tight, that thermostat opens and closes at the proper temperature, and that cylinder head bolts are prop-

Springlake blitzed the bewildered and bumbling Sudan defense for three first-quarter touchdowns, then added one "earned run" in the last inning to trounce the Hornets 26-0 in the district opener at Springlake last Friday.

After a nightmare first period, the Hornets came back to fight the speedy young Wolverines on even terms, but the damage already was done.

Despite the lopsidedness of the score, the Sudan linemen and defensive backs hit the Wolverines very hard in the last three periods, and the Hornets' Danny Allen was a raging terror on offense and defense. Allen, an end, caught five passes for 128 yards, and two of his receptions were astounding. One of his catches was a one-handed stab of a Tommy Thomson aerial, and running full tilt, Allen covered 55 yards from the Sudan 34 to the Wolverines 11 before he was overhauled. This was one of two deep thrusts by the Hornets which died short of the goal. On that occasion, Sudan lost the ball on the 2 on fourth down. Near the end of the game, Thomson intercepted a pass and ran back to the enemy 20, but that drive died on the 10.

Springlake rolled up nearly 400 yards, and it was a good spectacle game, as each team threw 25 passes.

Springlake kicked off, and scored in 52 seconds. Sudan took the long kick on the 20, and fumbled on the next play. Two quick plays later, the Green's Jerry Don Sanders, a 165-pound sophomore, ran on a reverse around left end 25 yards for a touchdown, with nobody touching him. He could easily have run a half mile. Trailing 6-0, Sudan was soon forced to punt to the Springlake 26, from where

the Wolverines drove for another score, tallying on a pass from sharpshooting Jerry Been to end Floyd Henderson from the 17. Been kicked point. Sudan again had to punt, and just before the end of the quarter, Been found Sanders standing so far behind the Hornet secondary they would have needed binoculars to read his number. Sanders took the pass and ran 71 yards for the score. Been again kicked point, and it was 20-0 at the end of the first.

In essence, that was the ball game, but Sudan's Kennel May at tackle, Allen at end, Pat Brown and Tommy King at line-backer, Corley Baker at half, and others got in their licks before the play ended. Marcy Cantu at halfback also really laid into a couple of larger boys on defense. Big play of the second quarter for Sudan was Allen's 43-yard dash with a Thomson aerial to the 32. This drive died about the 20 when Thomas Gregory intercepted.

Sudan has an open date this weekend before playing host to Kress.

Springlake and Farwell lived up to preseason billing as teams to beat in District 3-A as they shut out Sudan 26-0 and Kress 42-0 respectively. Hale Center was idle.

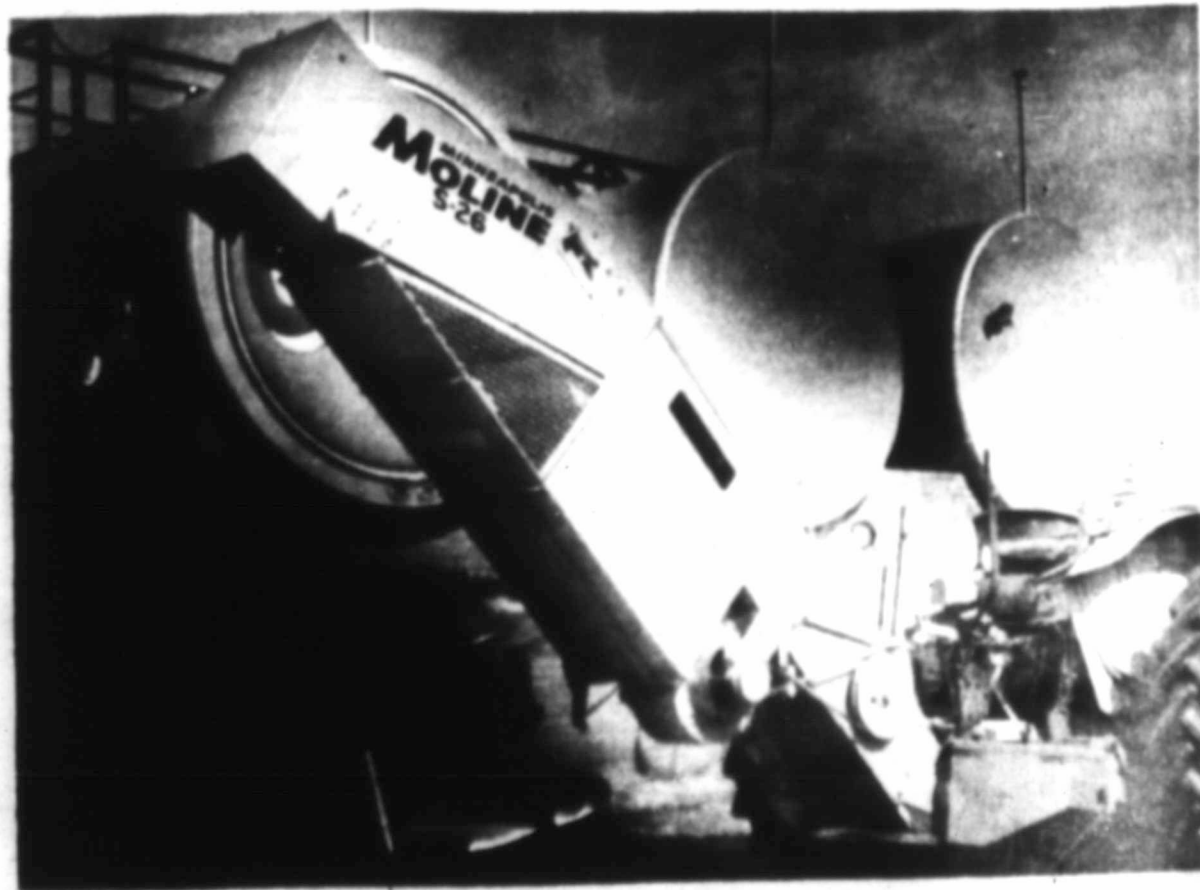

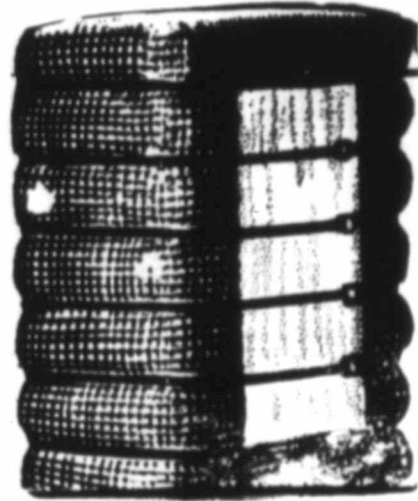

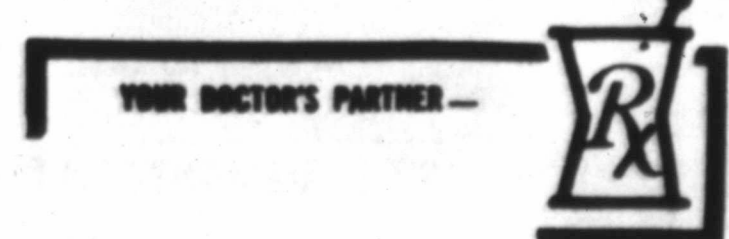

SAUDI ARABIA GOVERNMENT SPEEDS ECONOMIC & SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

New York - Among the developing countries of the world Saudi Arabia is unusual in not owning a single penny to Uncle Sam.

Yet according to the Saudi Arabian Information Service here, the huge Middle Eastern country - three times the size of Texas - is pushing its own elaborate and costly program of economic and social development to the tune of \$122 million annually.

Among other things this includes a school construction boom that is providing new schools at the rate of one every three days, new health facilities, a network of superhighways, and other public works.

Saudi Arabia's development effort represents a happy exception to the usual pattern of foreign aid. The Saudi Government has turned to the United States for help in supplying technical experts, but this is to recruit men, not money.

Not until well after World War II when the privately owned oil industry came to maturity, did the Government's share of the profits rise high enough to finance a comprehensive national program. Since that time, the results have been spectacular by comparison with the past.

As one official Government publication states: "It is difficult to realize that only thirty years ago the sole means of communication within the country consisted of camels, mules and donkeys."

Today Saudi Arabian Airlines, which is Government financed but privately managed, serves most cities of Saudi Arabia and the Middle East, while the country boasts two major international airports at Jeddah and Dhahran. Telephone service, almost non-existent a few years ago, is to be made completely automatic and will be increased by 80,000 additional lines under a project financed by the Government. Construction is now under way on a 6,200-mile network of asphalt highways connecting key commercial and cultural centers.

NEW SCHOOLS  
The country is building new schools at the rate of one hundred per year. With the best estimates of total population in the neighborhood of 4.5 million, the rate of expansion of educational opportunities and facilities may well be unsurpassed elsewhere in the developing world. In a decade, the number of students attending schools rose nearly tenfold, from 41,490 in 1953 to 440,110 in 1963, and according to UNESCO estimates may reach 260,000 in the 1963-64 scholastic year.

Rapid growth has also occurred in the field of public health and medical care which, like education, are free of charge to all Saudi citizens. Four large

hospitals have risen in the last few years and fifty-seven new public health centers have been established in various parts of the kingdom.

Apart from its oil resources Saudi Arabia remains basically a pastoral country. However, only an estimated 15 percent of the land is considered arable, and because of the chronic water scarcity only 1 percent is actually under cultivation.

Accordingly, the Government has undertaken a mammoth program to develop new sources of water in desert areas by the digging of artesian wells and the construction of a \$4 million dam at Jizan and another at Abha to store rain water. In addition, model farms are being established. A complete study of all plant life in the country is underway to determine possible new economic uses, and a fertilizer industry has been created using local raw materials.

AGRICULTURE  
For these and other related agricultural projects the Ministry of Agriculture will spend nearly \$10 million in 1963 more than twice the 1959 budget.

In the words of Prince Faisal the Prime Minister, the broad objectives of the Saudi Government policy are "to implement substantial improvement programs that will result in permanent economic well-being and raise the standard of living of all the inhabitants of the Kingdom."
