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

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

DEVOTIONAL By HAZEL HOUSE

Scripture: I John 5.

"And this is the record, that God hath given to us Eternal Life, and this life is in His Son. " (I

Let's look at the record - God's Holy Word - kept for us through almost 2,000 years since Jesus' birth, which in itself is worth thinking about. Recorded in God's Word is God's work and word from the beginning; the prophecy of Jesus coming and the recording of the fulfillment of that prophecy.

He listens in loving petience to even our most foolish little requests, like as a father to his child, and answers with what

Although God's ways are not always our ways, and, we do not always understand at once, neither does a child understand when a parent refuses to let him eat too many pieces of pie, not at the time of refusal, But, if God does love us as much as His record says that he does, enough to give His only Begotten Son to die in our place so that we, also, could live forever. (Do you know anyone you would give your son's life for?) Then surely we can trust Him with our present life and needs, and our future, and thereby have that peace which passeth all understanding.

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
