Wreck Kills Young Wife

A Sudan man was injured and his young wife killed in a smash-up of two autos on U. S. 84 about 7 p. m. last Saturday night. Injured was Jerry Foust, 22,

bookkeeper for Baccus Chevrolet in Sudan. His wife, Jeanne, 20, was dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. The couple lived in Littlefield, but Foust has been employed in Sudan for some time, and is a member of the Sudan Jaycees.

Officers said Mrs. Foust died of a broken neck. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the First Baptist Church, Littlefield, with the Rev. Robert Longshore of Littlefield and Rev. Otis Edwards of Hobbs officiating. Burial was in Hobbs following graveside services. Hammons Funeral Home, Littlefield, directed arrangements.

A native of Wellington, Mrs. Foust, the former Jeanne Jackson, married Jerry Foust Dec. 2, 1962. She graduated from Hobbs High School and attended Hardin-Simmons University.

Survivors are her husband; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Jackson of Hobbs; three sisters, Miss Rae Jean Jackson and Mrs. Jennette Hicks of Hobbs and Mrs. Carol Ann Thompson of Paris. The Elders were here to attend the Crane-Dalhart football game in Lubbock Saturday when their son, Bill, was one of the players for the Crane team.

Foust was driver of the 1963 car, owned by Baccus Chevrolet, which was reportedly headed toward Lubbock when a 1958 model car carrying 12 Latin Americans, headed northwest, attempted a turn off 84 in front of Foust, at the intersection of U. S. 84 and FM 2641. Two Latin children, a 6-year-old girl and a 13-year-old boy, also were killed in the crash. The crash occurred in Foust's lane of traffic, and officers said Foust's car skidded 70 feet before the impact.

Foust was in a Littlefield hospital early this week, but his injuries were not believed serious.

Guess What Postmaster Wants Us To Do...

Postmaster E. C. Mizard had his annual Christmas 'present' ready this week for his patrons, and, to nobody's surprise, it was his paternal suggestion: "Mail LB Early".

"Christmas shopping and mailing it, for most people, one of the heaviest chores at Christmas," he said, "and if I can persuade some people to get it done right now I think they will agree later - when they are taking it easy while others rush around - that I have given them a very good present."

"Virtually all Christmas mailing can be disposed of now by observing the following five suggestions," the postmaster explained:

1. Do your shopping for your Christmas gifts now.

2. Check and revise mailing lists for cards and presents.

3. Package and mail Christmas parcels promptly. Don't worry about being too early - just mark them "Do not open until Christmas."

4. Buy Christmas cards now and address them right away, separating them into out-of-town and local bundles. Mail them immediately with ZIP Codes on them and you've got it made, except perhaps for that last-minute card you forgot to send to Aunt Minnie.

5. Buy plenty of stamps now while post office windows are uncrowded.

Incidentally, to speed Christmas card handling, letter carriers and post offices will have free supplies available of "local" and "out-of-town" bands for Christmas cards. If you will use these to separate

your local and out-of-town cards, it will expedite delivery and assist your post office.

And - just as an additional peace-of-mind safeguard about parcels this Christmas - the Postmaster urges you to insure them.

SANTA FE RECORDS FEWER CARLOADS

Total carloads moved over Santa Fe System Lines for the week ending Dec. 7, 1963 were 31,357 compared with 32,770 for the same week a year ago.

CLASSING OFFICE HAS BUSIEST WEEK

The Lubbock Cotton Office closed nearly 200,000 samples for the week ending Dec. 6 - the largest weekly volume so far this season.

"This left us a carry-over of 110,000 samples," reported W. K. Palmer of the Agricultural Marketing Service Office.

So far this season 576,500 samples of cotton have been classed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in the Lubbock cotton office.

The average staple length was 29.7 thirty-seconds of an inch. This compares with 29.9 for the preceding week.

Micronaire readings were lower than the previous week. Samples reading 3.4 and lower increased from 39 per cent last week to 52 per cent this week.

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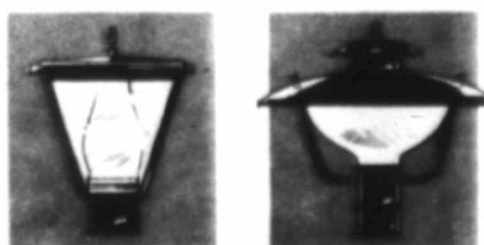

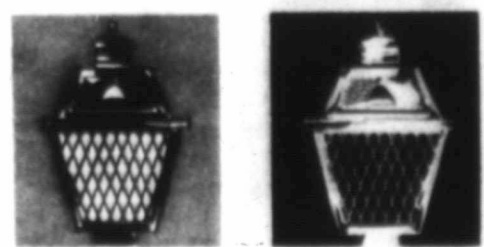

DEVOTIONAL

Scripture: 1 John 5.
"And this is the record, that God hath given to us Eternal Life, and this life is in His Son." (1 John 5:11.)
Let's look at the record - God's Holy Word - kept for us through almost 2,000 years since Jesus' birth, which in itself is worth thinking about. Recorded in God's Word is God's work and word from the beginning; the prophecy of Jesus coming and the recording of the fulfillment of that prophecy.

In the new Testament we have recorded the birth and earthly life of Jesus, and the recording of His statement that He came to save the lost; His threefold ministry - Prophet - His earthly life and teachings, Priest - His Holy priesthood that now is as He sits at the right hand of God, the Father, to make intercession for us, and King! - when He returns again for His Bride, the Church that is founded on faith in Jesus Christ as the only begotten Son of God. Also, we have instructions on how to live now and how to live eternally.

The "coming again" of Jesus is a promise Jesus made us when He was here (and through the Holy Spirit had recorded for us). Unless we believe that promise of Jesus, we make God's record a lie, and we have not faith in Jesus that is necessary in order for one to have Eternal Life. ("By grace are ye saved, through faith.")

When we believe Jesus' promises (remember He is God and we do not have to understand and know every detail of the working of His mind, we cannot!), and accept these promises as truth, then we know that He hears ALL our prayers, and will supply our every need. He listens in loving patience to even our most foolish little requests, like as a father to his child, and answers with what is best for us all.

Although God's ways are not always our ways, and we do not always understand at once, neither does a child understand when a parent refuses to let him eat too many pieces of pie, not at the time of refusal. 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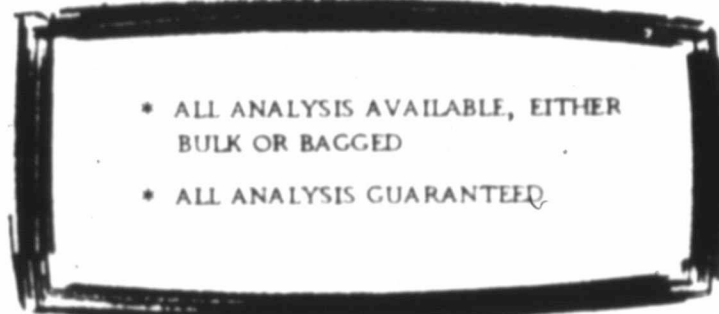
