

Coach R. L. (Hank) Brown, assigned to fulltime duty as head coach of he girls' basketball team and incharge of all girls' physical education classes. His duties will include coaching junior high girls, the board said.

In making the move, the board noted that the success of girlst basketball in Sudan has "put the town and school on the map" and members said they feel putting Brown in charge of the entire girls' program at all levels will improve on the system.

Head Basketball Coach Dempsey Watkins has been assigned as head of the mathematics department of the school, with instruction to coordinate the entire math program as well as to teach more math classes himself.
