Alaskan Kin Of Sudan Residents Unhurt In Quake

The awesome earthquake which devastated Alaska last week apparently caused no seriour injuries to any of the known relatives of Sudan people in the quake area, as all but two had been heard from by Tuesday,

At that time, Mrs. Polly Kent had not heard from her two brothers, Barney Miser and David Kiser (formerly of Bula who live in Anchorage, a city of 100,000 hardest hit by the tre-

Mrs. Kent's son, Pat Kent of Sudan, an amateur redio operator, reportedly has been trying to establish contact with his uncles in Anchorage. Although this contact had not been made Tuesday, it was reported that another Sudan radio operator, Charles Logan, had received a report about another Sudan man, Howard Weaver of Anchorage, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vern Wesver of Rt. 1, and that Weaver apparently made it through the

received a letter from his son, Donley, in Fairbanks, reporting that he and his family were all right, And Tuesday, Mr. and Mrs. Simon Hay of Sudan received a telephone call from their daughter, Paulette (Mrs. James Ryan of Anchorage), to the effect that she and her family were unburt, and that she had information which indicated another former Sudan resident in Anchorage, U. B. Porter Jr., was safe.

Tuesday morning, although she had heard that phone service had not been restored, Mrs. Hay placed a call to Anchorage, leaving word for the operator to call her back if she could establish contact. She was surprised and overjoyed to hear her daughter's voice at 11:26 a. m. Tuesday when the phone rang at the Hays' Sudan home.

Mrs. Ryan, whose husband is a superintendent of the power plant serving Anchorage and the surrounding area, reported that all her family was fine, and that damage to their home, about two miles outside Anchorage and in the opposite direction from the hard-hit coast, was slight, except that their chimney fell. Paulette and children, Stephen 9, and Phyllis, 6, were home when the quake hit, but Ryan was at the power plant. Ryan came home immediately after the big temblor, and stayed about an hour to be sure his family was all right. Then, with all possible,

The mighty quake, which had phytical and mental repercussions around the world, hit Priday, leaving Anchorage a shambles, with a toll of dead and injured still to be counted. Autos and homes and buildings dropped out of sight into the sea or into huge craters. The downtown area of Anchorage was wrecked.
