Simon deLagneau Hay, 71, one master in 1937 and served in that of Sudan's most respected settlers job until he retired in 1962, who retired last year after 25 years as postmaster, died at 1:15 Laura; two daughters, Mrs. p. m. Tuesday in Medical Arts James W. (Paulette) Ryan of Hospital, Littlefield.

A former Lamb County judge and commissioner, World War I hero and Sudan area farmer, Hay had been hospitalized for an operation which was performed a week before his death. However, his death, was attributed to a heart attack.

Puneral services were to be conducted at 3 p.m. today (Thursday) at Sudan Methodist Church, with Rev. Prank Weir, pastor, and Rev. John W. Hill of Littlefield officiating. Rev. Hill is pastor of the Presbyterian Church of which Hay was a member. Interment was to be in Resthaven Mausoleum, Lubbock, under direction of Hammons

Puneral Home, Littlefield. Born Oct. 15, 1892 in Kunkakee, Ill., Hay served in World War I in the Combat Engineers,

Gen. John Pershing personally presented Hay with the British Military Medal for bravery over and above the call of duty as a result of one specific engagement in France in World War L.

Hay was a member of a group of volunteers who went out un-. der fire to cut barb wire and set up a poutoon bridge across a stream so the rest of the battalion could cross. When Hay was discharged in 1919 he had earned a commission as lieutesent, earning the rank on the bettlefield. He took part in the Argome-Muse and Somme offen-

He first came to Sudan in 1921, and bought a farm. These years later he returned to Elitsols to marry Laura Caton, and the couple then made their house in Sudmi, He was elected to the unty commissioner's court, where he served eight years, and then was elected Lumb County Judgo, serving six years.

For a time he was co-owner of a grain elevator in Sudin with reral other men, including John Duon and the late Billy Mc-Norly and Pote Bosson.

### GARDEN SCHEMING



Annuals may be used for garden scheming just as may the larger trees and shrubs. Here hollyhocks in the background, snapdragons in the middle and petunias for an edging make an attractive border planting against a dark brown woven fence.

Many people sow seeds of annuals in rows for cutting. While this may serve their purpose, annuals have a far wider use in garden scheming-that is planning a garden design using annuals for their height, form of plant and flower, and color of bloom In the picture above thought has been given to the forms and

a border planting in front of a woven fence. Powderpuff hollyhocks are used in the background because they are tall. Their rounded, double flowers are borne in clusters along the stems and show well, with their bright

shades of white, yellow, pink or

red against the dark brown of

the fence. The next row, as you see, is of Rocket anapdragons which are not as tall as the hollyhocks nor as short as the petunias used as a border. Snapdragon form is upright, each plant growing several stems and resembling a small bush. Flowers

are borne in spikes thus offer-

colors of annual flowers used in ing a contrast in form to the hollyhock flowers. Colors are red, pinks, rose, yellow, tawny

apricot and white. The petunias are the newer hybrids, loaded with flowers. The plants are low and spreading, ideal for the front of a border. As you know, petunia col-ors now are legion. They may be lavender, lavender-blue, purple, many shades of pink and rose, scarlet, salmon, cream-yel-

low or white: When such a wide choice of colors is offered in three-different flower forms just a little thought to placing them and to creating a color scheme will make your garden a show place.

## Green Thumb Tips

"I don't like to interfere

Spacing is an important facor in growing sturdy, florifer ous annual flowers. Sufficient room should be allowed when seedlings are thinned so each plant can apread its widest. Directions for spacing are on

the seed packet.
While it "burts" some gardeners to thin seedlings, growing two rows of the same flower side by side, one row of plants properly spaced and the other left unthinned, will prove that wide spacing pays.

One of the unusual annual vines that should be planted near every outdoor living room is the moonflower. This, as its name implies, blooms at night filling the air with delicious fragrance. Ordinarily, during the heat of summer, the flowers will close when the sun rises high in the sky.

While this would leave the vines without daylight bloom, it is possible to have flowers day and night by alternating the planting of moonflowers with Heavenly Blue morning glories. These will bloom all day and close at night.

After a row of vegetables or flowers has been planted, roll the wheel of a wheel cultivator over the newly planted seeds. Or, walk down the row, placing one foot in front of the other with the heel of the front foot touching the toe of the one in

By either of these simple acts the row is marked so you can find it easily when cultivating between rows and the seeds are firmed to the soil so they can obtain moisture from it.

Try to choose the day on which you transplant seedlings. A sunny or windy day should be avoided as sitn and wind dry plant tissues.

Clouded skies and still air make a day ideal for transplanting. Or, of course, you can move plants in the early evening which will at least give them the dark, cool night during which to recuperate from transplanting.

If the winter in your area was mild, you may find snapdragon plants growing where they did last autumn. This is because snapdragons are really peren-nials, grown as annuals in the north where winters are too cold for them to survive. Fertilize each plant and you'll have another season of flowers from it.


