He said that the new system was a bunch of foolishness dreamed up by somebody to sell schools a lot of new textbooks.

I wish I could remember who that guy is.

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WHEN vapor in the atmosphere condenses to a point that it is heavier than air, it falls to the ground in a phenomenon called rain. I read that somewhere, but a lot of folks around here are beginning to wonder if it ever really happens.

## Former Postmaster Simon Hay Dies

Simon deLagneau Hay, 71, one of Sudan's most respected settlers who retired last year after 25 years as postmaster, died at 1:15 p. m. Tuesday in Medical Arts Hospital, Littlefield.

A former Lamb County judge and commissioner, World War I hero and Sudan area farmer, Hay had been hospitalized for an operation which was performed a week before his death. However, his death, was attributed to a heart attack.

Funeral services were to be conducted at 3 p. m. today (Thursday) at Sudan Methodist Church, with Rev. Frank Weir, pastor, and Rev. John W. Hill of Littlefield officiating. Rev. Hill is pastor of the Presbyterian Church of which Hay was a member. Interment was to be in Resthaven Mausoleum, Lubbock, under direction of Hammons Funeral Home, Littlefield.

Born Oct. 15, 1892 in Kankakee, Ill., Hay served in World War I in the Coast Engineers.

Gen. John Pershing personally presented Hay with the British Military Medal for bravery over and above the call of duty as a result of one specific engagement in France in World War I.

Hay was a member of a group of volunteers who went out under fire to cut barb wire and set up a poston bridge across a stream so the rest of the battalion could cross. When Hay was discharged in 1919 he had earned a commission as lieutenant, earning the rank on the battlefield. He took part in the Argonne-Meuse and Somme offensives.

His first cruise to Sudan in 1921, and bought a farm. Three years later he returned to Illinois to marry Louise Cline, and the couple then made their home in Sudan. He was elected to the county commissioner's court, where he served eight years, and then was elected Lamb County Judge, serving six years.

For a time he was co-owner of a grain elevator in Sudan with several other men, including John Deen and the late Billy McKinley and Pete Brown.

Hay was appointed Sudan post-

master in 1937 and served in that job until he retired in 1962.

Survivors include his wife, Laura; two daughters, Mrs. James W. (Paulette) Ryan of Anchorage, Alaska, and Mrs. Wilbert H. (Sherrill) Richarz, Air Force Academy, Colo.; two sisters, Mrs. Oscar LeBeau and Mrs. Harris Howeler, both of Chicago; one brother, Donald Hay of Chicago; and six grand children.

## Hall Takes Coaching Job

Henry Charles Hall, 30, of Menard was elected by Sudan School board of trustees Tuesday night to be head coach in football, basketball and track in the high school beginning this fall.

Hall was selected from a field of 44 candidates for the jobs which were opened up when former head football coach R. L. Brown was given a fulltime assignment in girls physical edu-

cation and basketball, and former head basketball coach Dempsey Watkins was reassigned as head of the mathematics department.

Hall is married and the father of two children. In four years as head basketball coach at Menard, his teams won 48 and lost 25, and were co-champions of the district once. In three years as head football coach, his teams won 22, lost 9 and tied 2, winning district twice and bi-district once.

Hall lettered in football, basketball and track at College High School in Bartlesville, Okla., and lettered one year in each of those sports at Lamar Jr. College, Lamar, Colo. He also attended the University of Colorado, where he participated in football and baseball.

One of the most common contaminants in water is hardness. Almost all supplies contain some of the dissolved minerals causing hardness.

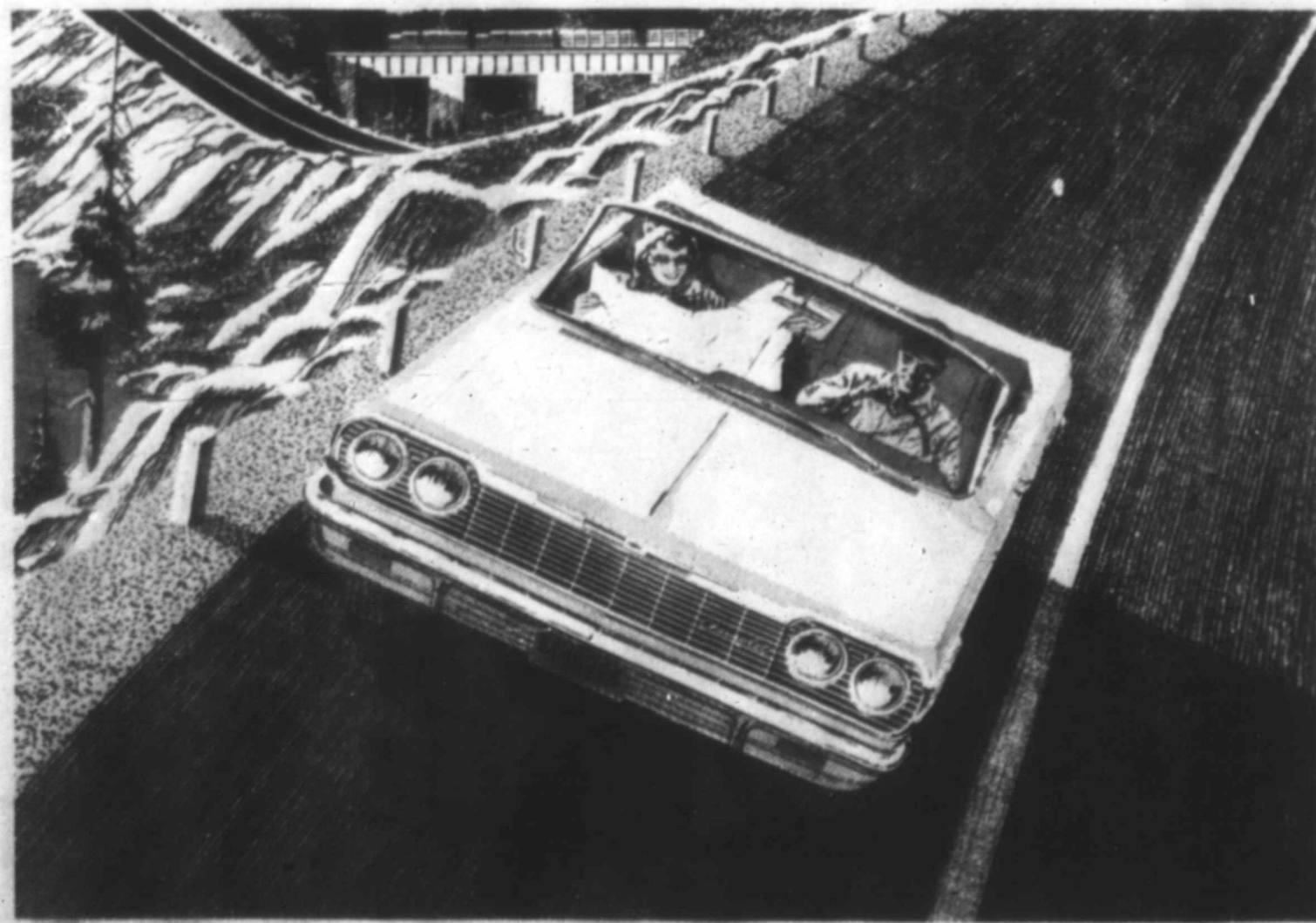

Grade school entry fee is 50 cents per player for each division entered; all other divisions

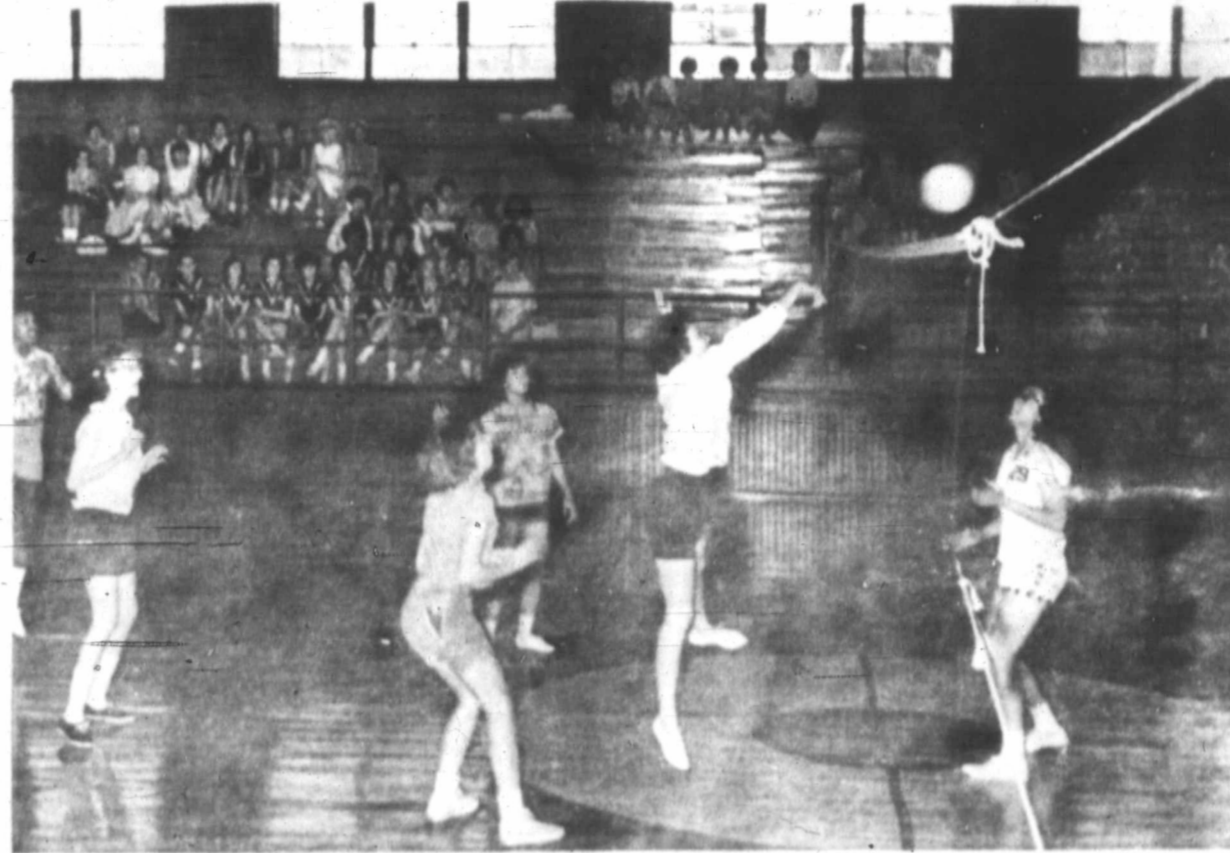
are \$1 per player for singles, 75 cents per player for doubles. Players must live in the Sudan School district or must be employed in the district.

Household Hints by Joan March Worden, Director, Fine Cleaner Information Center.

Sports enthusiast in the family? A good sport keeps his gear in topflight shape. From baseball yard to boat, fine oil cleaners and disinfectants get to work at cleanup jobs for the sportsman dissolving grease and hazing dirt with a whack of the sponge.

Here's how:

**BEATING** The best boat-keeper's boat cleaning tools is a hand-applied scrub brush, wet mop, plastic bucket, sponges, an all-purpose pine-oil cleaner, paper towels, an all-purpose wax and polish. Areas where pine-oil keeps a boat's shipshape or decks gleam, head, plastic upholstery, and bottom and top-side scrubbing to keep boat free of grime and marine growth.

**FISHING** — Bert-revs, pots, and pans — everything fishy should get a pine cleaner both if you're cooking the catch in your kitchen will be a lot more fragrant if you dump the pans from fish cookery into the sink immediately after cooking. Then, while you're eating the prize catch of the season, wash the pans in warm water with a little pine-oil cleaner in it. Rinse well.

**TENNIS** — Increase tennis-ball life and refurbish the nap by tossing tennis balls into the washing machine with the regular wash. 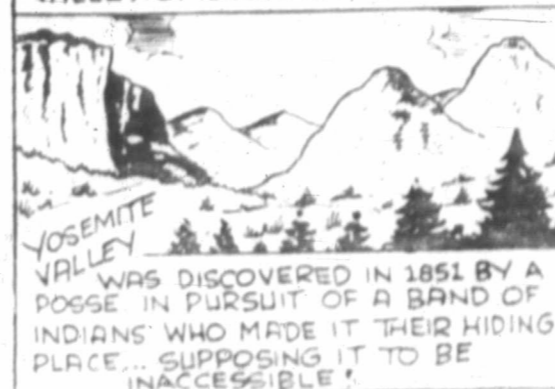

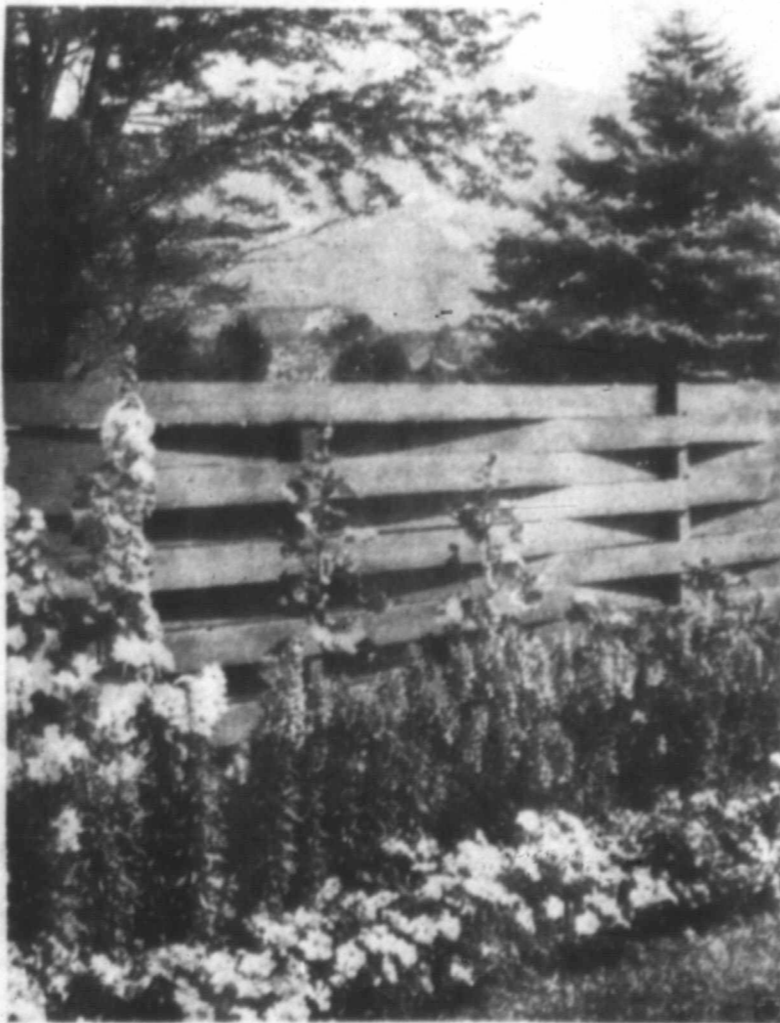

## GARDEN SCHEMING



Annuals may be used for garden scheming just as may the larger trees and shrubs. Here hollyhocks in the background, snapdragons in the middle and petunias for an edging make an attractive border planting against a dark brown woven fence.

Many people sow seeds of annuals in rows for cutting. While this may serve their purpose, annuals have a far wider use in garden scheming—that is planting a garden design using annuals for their height, form of plant and flower, and color of bloom.

In the picture above thought has been given to the forms and colors of annual flowers used in a border planting in front of a woven fence.

Powderpuff hollyhocks are used in the background because they are tall. Their rounded, double flowers are borne in clusters along the stems and show off well, with their bright shades of white, yellow, pink or red against the dark brown of the fence.

The next row, as you see, is of Rocket snapdragons which are not as tall as the hollyhocks nor as short as the petunias used as a border. Snapragon form is upright, each plant growing several stems and resembling a small bush. Flowers are borne in spikes thus offering a contrast in form to the hollyhock flowers. Colors are red, pink, rose, yellow, tawny apricot and white.

The petunias are the newer hybrids, loaded with flowers. The plants are low and spreading, ideal for the front of a border. As you know, petunia colors now are legion. They may be lavender, lavender-blue, purple, many shades of pink and rose, scarlet, salmon, cream-yellow or white.

When such a wide choice of colors is offered in three-different flower forms just a little thought to placing them and to creating a color scheme will make your garden a show place.

## Green Thumb Tips

Spacing is an important factor in growing sturdy, floriferous annual flowers. Sufficient room should be allowed when seedlings are thinned so each plant can spread its widest. Directions for spacing are on the seed packet.

While it "hurts" some gardeners to thin seedlings, growing two rows of the same flower side by side, one row of plants properly spaced and the other left unthinned, will prove that wide spacing pays.

One of the unusual annual vines that should be planted near every outdoor living room is the moonflower. This, as its name implies, blooms at night filling the air with delicious fragrance. Ordinarily, during the heat of summer, the flowers will close when the sun rises high in the sky.

While this would leave the vines without daylight bloom, it is possible to have flowers day and night by alternating the planting of moonflowers with Heavenly Blue morning glories. These will bloom all day and close at night.

After a row of vegetables or flowers has been planted, roll the wheel of a wheel cultivator over the newly planted seeds. Or, walk down the row, placing one foot in front of the other with the heel of the front foot touching the toe of the one in back.

If either of these simple acts the row is marked so you can find it easily when cultivating between rows and the seeds are firmed to the soil so they can obtain moisture from it.

Try to choose the day on which you transplant seedlings. A sunny or windy day should be avoided as sun and wind dry plant tissues.

Clouded skies and still air make a day ideal for transplanting. Or, of course, you can move plants in the early evening which will at least give them the dark, cool night during which to recuperate from transplanting.

If the winter in your area was mild, you may find snapdragon plants growing where they did last autumn. This is because snapdragons are really perennials, grown as annuals in the north where winters are too cold for them to survive. Fertilize each plant and you'll have another season of flowers from it.

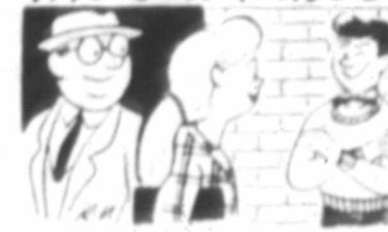
