## WOODWORK BY DALTON

SATURDAY is Halloween, a holiday most of us could do very well without, and, in connection with the event the Amherst P-TA came up with a wonderful idea which I think should be adopted nationwide: they voted to have a "Stay At Home Night".

This is the best deal I ever of, from the adult standpoint, anyway. No running around all night, destroying property, knocking on doors to get bags of loot. (There oughta be a law against anyone over 8 years old going out to trick or treat, except for those who are gathering money for CROP).

If one of the candidates would incorporate this "stay at home" bit into his platform before Tuesday, he could get my vote. But let's not limit it to Halloween. First, let's eliminate Halloween altogether. Then we should initiate an 8-day week, with the extra day to be used in two ways. Plan A would set aside that extra day for meetings. The Owls were big and tough, and it was learned that the home team had been crippled by food

poisoning a week earlier when Hale Center romped over them 45-8. Several starters had missed that game.

Coach Henry Hall used both Mike Smith and Corley Baker at quarterback during the game, but the closest Sudan could get was to the Silvertown 9 yard line in the third period.

Except for the one scoring thrust, the Hornet defensive line did a pretty good job of stopping the

Silvertown attack.

Sudan this week will take another journey north, though not so far, to play Kress, another team winless and scoreless in district play. Last week Springlake trounced Kress 35-0 while Farwell got past one of the district's best teams, winning 26-15 over Hale Center.

## Water Tower Catches Fire

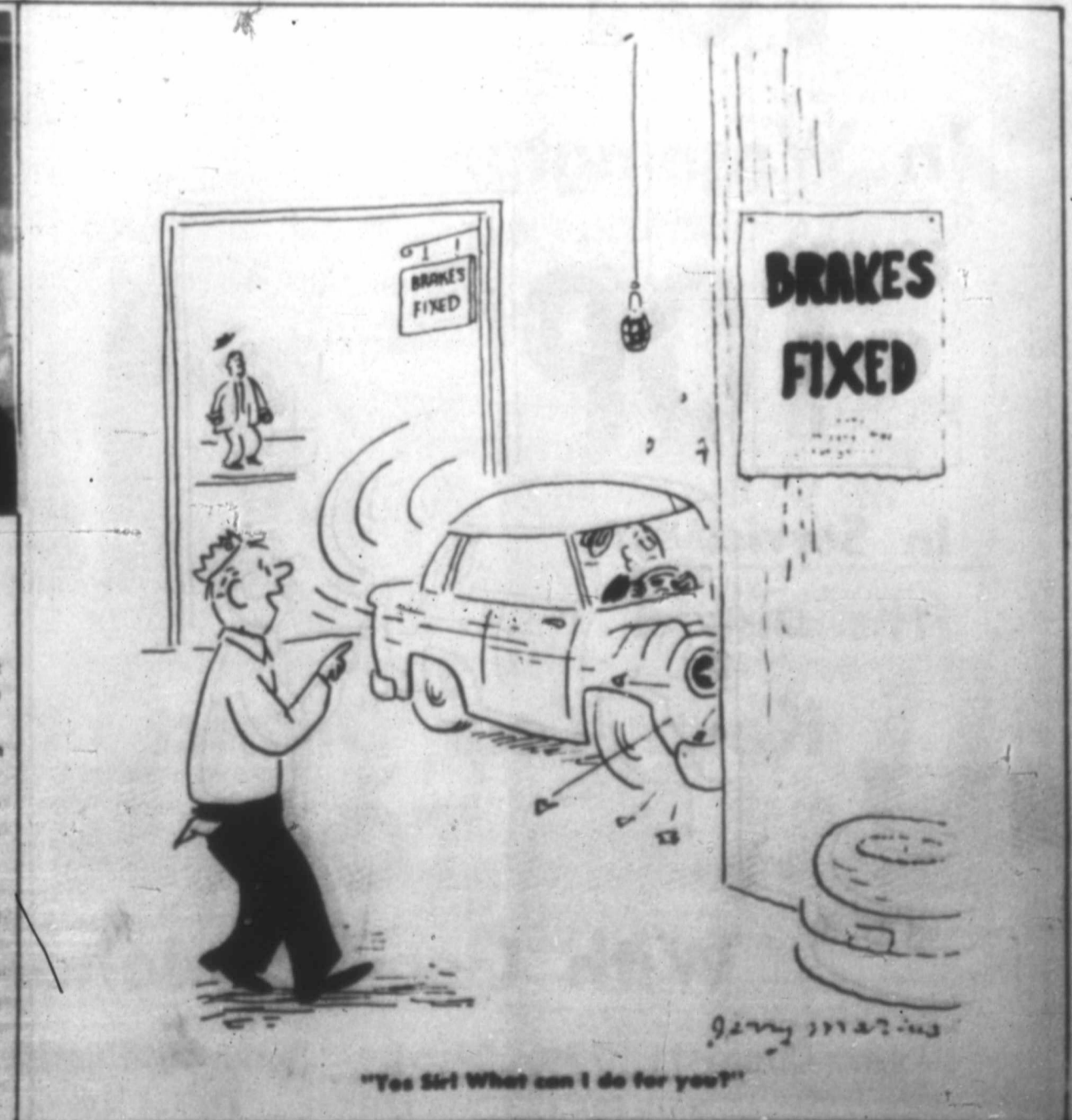
The Sudan water tower caught on fire last Friday morning.

The unlikely event occurred when sparks from welding apparatus ignited insulation inside the main pipe carrying water from the tower down into the ground line. The tank had been drained and workers were repairing the pitted places in the pipe.

Lum Serratt, night watchman, at the compressor, reported the blaze, which was visible up at the top where the pipe joins the tank. Firemen shot water up to the spot and extinguished the blaze.

**Mailster Routes On Increase**

Mailsters, the three wheeled red, white, and blue postal delivery vehicles, now are used on 12,000 routes. Ten thousand are being added.

Putting a footcarrier in a mailster gives him wheels, gives the patron more service, means economy for the Post Office Department, and adds comfort for mailmen.

The millions of people now on Mailster routes receive 6-day parcel post service from the same postman who delivers their other mail.

Trucks and personnel previously used on parcel post routes are freed for other important duties. Mechanized routes in areas away from the congestion of the city can usually be expanded to serve more people as the suburban areas grow.

Mail carriers are not required to carry parcels which can weigh up to 35 pounds when loaded. In northern areas mailsters are being equipped with heaters for winter use.

**ARE YOUR SHOES UNTIED?**

Scripture: The Acts 12:5-11; Romans 8: 34; II Corinthians 7: 5-6.

Are you seeking to do the will of God since you have become His child through accepting Jesus as your Savior? Perhaps then you have become discouraged, because your old sin, your old temptation keeps coming back and you are almost ready to give up, imprisoned by the old "be-setting" sin.

If this is so, take a look at the imprisoned Peter in the Scripture lesson from the Acts. And as we look Christians, lets look at what those who loved Peter were doing: Prayer was made

without ceasing of the church unto God for him. If we have done all that we can do to help, and to no avail, we are sorrowful ("cast down") but not in despair, for then we confidently put our needs into God's hands, interceding until the answer comes. And many times we, too, are astonished at how the answer comes.

But did you ever try to help someone, who did not try to help himself? Now after we are saved and are forever God's child (unless we are disinherited because of our deliberate sin and willful denial of God's power to save and keep us) if we want to be happy

and joyful in following Jesus, we cannot sit down imprisoned, naked, doing nothing, and just "give up".

If Peter had sat there between those two guards, after the light shined and his chains fell off—do you think he would ever have been free from that dark prison? There were some things he had to do (remember, he was already saved—he was God's child) if he was to be free from the prison and chains that bound him. First Peter was to get up—when he obeyed the chains fell off; (if he had stood there, the chains would have been put back on him) then he was to gird himself (try girding yourself with God's word and association with other Christians and prayer) and bind on his sandals (now who could walk, especially through a garden, or the valley, and climb up to a mountain top, without fastening or tying on his shoes?)

Then Peter was told to "cast thy garment about thee". **Tuna Florentine for Friday**



Let tuna, ever handy on your cupboard shelf, be the mainstay for a vegetable main dish. Combined with spinach and cheese sauce, tuna is a delicious meal-in-one served with buttered noodles, costing only \$1.50, or 25 cents per person.

Tuna, of which approximately 42 percent packed by American canners, is caught by Japanese fishermen, is a good source of protein, ranking right along with ground beef, portion for portion. And when tuna is added to cheese sauce, the protein is increased. International Tuna Fish Week is Nov. 12 to 21.

**TUNA FLORENTINE**

(Makes 6 servings)  
(approximately 25¢ per serving)

- 2 cans (8 1/2 to 7 ounces each) chunk-style tuna
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- Dash cayenne
- 3 egg yolks, well beaten
- 1 package (10 ounces) frozen chopped spinach, cooked
- Cooked, buttered noodles
- Ripe olive slices

Drain tuna, reserving 1/4 cup oil for sauce. Heat the 1/4 cup tuna oil over low heat; add flour and blend. Gradually add milk and continue cooking until thickened, stirring constantly. Add salt, pepper, lemon juice, butter and cayenne. Stir a little of the hot sauce into the beaten egg yolks, then combine the two mixtures. Cook over low heat 2 to 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Add tuna.

Arrange cooked spinach in greased 2-quart baking dish. Pour sauce over spinach. Place noodles and olives in center. Bake in 375° (moderate) oven 25 to 30 minutes.



## Texas and The Civil War

### Blockade Running Along the Texas Coast

A pilot boat, displaying the flag of truce, came forward from Galveston harbor and asked to know the mission of the newly arrived U.S.S. South Carolina. Commander James Alden, captain of the Union vessel, answered by displaying a copy of President Abraham Lincoln's declaration of a blockade and by stating that his objective was to enforce the presidential decree. It was early July of 1861: the blockading of Texas had begun.

For the first two years of the war additional Union ships arrived in Texas waters until the blockading squadron came to approach thirty vessels in number. During this period, however, there was actually very little blockade running along the Texas shoreline. With Cuba as their great base of operations, most blockade runners headed for nearby southeastern Confederate ports. Also, the squadrons along much of the Texas coast encouraged the use of small schooners with very limited cargo space over the employment of more sizable ships. Finally, Texas had an overland outlet to international trade through Mexico—the only neutral nation bordering the Confederate States of America.

By 1863, however, the situation was changing. Heavy blockading efforts to the east caused many runners to head towards the more difficult-to-patrol coast of Texas. And, a number of key ports in the southeast had fallen into Union hands; within the year only Charleston, Mobile, Wilmington,

and Galveston would remain as major ports under the Confederate flag. Then, too, by the middle of the war, Texas overland trade through Mexico was seriously disrupted by drought conditions and by a transportation breakdown. Because of these factors, heavy sea traffic developed between Galveston and Havana. While it is difficult to gauge the size of this commerce, Galveston wharves were busy with the unloading of critically needed consumer goods and military supplies, and with the loading of thousands of bales of valuable cotton. Because cargo space was at such a premium, screw jacks were used to compress bales of cotton into holds. In fact, it soon became a source of pride among stevedores to force the greatest number of bales into a given ship. One unfortunate vessel was sunk when over-ambitious hale handler compressed the cargo right through the bottom of the ship.

The Havana-Galveston voyage normally took three days, and the captains hoped to approach the Texas coast on dark nights when the waters were smooth. By using sounding lines, the runners could determine their nearness to the shore and still gain maximum benefit from the darkness that concealed them from lookouts on Union blockade ships. On stormy nights, when soundings were inaccurate and the danger of running aground was greatest, the evasive ships from Havana would anchor some thirty miles out in the Gulf and would nervously await the return of normal weather conditions. While this standing by the runners would keep a very close watch for other ships and would keep their boilers well fired with hard coal that burned with a minimum of smoke in case it became necessary to outrun suspicious Union craft. When the weather finally settled, the cargo ships would take advantage

of the next evening dusk to move close enough to shore to allow its lookouts to spot the tips of the blockaders' masts. At this point anchors were again dropped and the sailors once more waited for the time to pass so that their entry into Galveston Bay would occur just at the right moment. During this period of riding at anchor just beyond the reach of the Federal fleet, extreme cautions were taken to facilitate a rapid escape. The entire crew remained on an alert status. Men with sledge-hammers stood by the anchor rigs ready to knock out the chain shackles and abandon both anchors and anchor chains if rapid flight became necessary. Engineers worked throughout those hours to keep the steam level right up to the blowing-off point. Finally, about two hours before dawn, the ships would enter their way forward guided by lead weighted lines. Their aim was to glide silently past the blockading ships and to reach the outskirts of the harbor just as the first rays of the dawn were breaking.

In addition to the regular Galveston traffic, a number of smaller schooners made runs into other ports of Texas. Because of sandbars, these boats were usually equipped with movable centerboards that could be pulled up when shallow waters were being crossed. Many of the smaller ships headed for Central American ports: Tampico, Vera Cruz and Belize (British Honduras) became centers for Texas cotton trading.

Blockade running off the Texas coast was successful until war's end. Vital medicines, tools, guns, ammunition, and supplies not only reached troops in Texas, but much of it was smuggled across the United Mississippi River to their Confederate friends.

# Why I Am a Republican for Goldwater

By SENATOR STROM THURMOND

(This was not written and spoken by some discredited individual, but by a highly respected U. S. Senator and lifelong Democrat. Just two days before giving this speech, Senator Thurmond was asked by Mrs. Lyndon Johnson to accompany her on a campaign trip through the South, which is proof of the high esteem in which he is held. If you think that he has overstated his case, we ask you to consider the trends in the Democrat Party, the ultimate goals of its leaders, and the cynical coalition of concentrated power which is threatening to make a mockery of Constitutional Government and our free institutions.)

"It has been wisely said that "For evil to triumph, it is only necessary that good men do nothing." Particularly is this true in time of crisis. Seldom before in the history of our nation have we faced so great a crisis.

"The people of South Carolina have placed me in a position of trust in the national government. From this position, I have observed at close hand the conduct and factors which have brought about this crisis. I would, therefore, be most derelict in my duty were I at this time to remain silent.

"I have no choice but to speak openly, frankly, and fully to the people of South Carolina on the crisis that confronts us.

"The Democratic party has abandoned the people. It has turned its back on the spiritual values and political principles which have brought us the blessings of freedom under God and a bountiful prosperity. It has breached the trust reposed in it by the people. It has repudiated the Constitution of the United States. It is leading the evolution of our nation to a Socialistic dictatorship.

"THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY HAS FORSAKEN THE PEOPLE TO BECOME THE PARTY OF MINORITY GROUPS, POWER-HUNGRY UNION LEADERS, POLITICAL BOSSES AND BIG BUSINESSMEN LOOKING FOR GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS AND FAVORS.

"The Democratic party has used the government as a propaganda machine to distort the truth and deceive the public to the extent that a sub-cabinet official can publicly defend the Administration's "right to lie" and remain in office, unrebuked.

"The Democratic party has invaded the private lives of people by using the powers of government for coercion and intimidation of individuals.

"The Democratic party has rammed through Congress unconstitutional, impractical, unworkable and oppressive legislation which invades the personal and property rights of the individual.

"The Democratic party has encouraged lawlessness, civil unrest, and mob action.

"The Democratic party has violated its trust by using the power of government to suppress information on scandals and corruption of its leaders in government and party offices.

"The Democratic party has succored and assisted our Communist enemies through trade and aid at the expense of the American people.

"The Democratic party has established and pursued for our government a no-win foreign policy of weakness, indecision, accommodation and appeasement.

"The Democratic party, as custodian of government, faltered at the Bay of Pigs and in the Cuban crisis of 1962 — at the very moment when victory was at hand — and thereby forfeited Cuba to Soviet domination, subjected our nation to the peril of an armed enemy camp 90 miles from our shores, and opened the doors of the hemisphere to Communist subversion.

"The Democratic party, as custodian of government, has sent our youth into combat in Viet Nam, refusing to call it war, and demanding of our youth the risk of their lives without providing either adequate equipment or a goal of victory.

"THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY NOW WORSHIPS AT THE THRONE OF POWER AND MATERIALISM.

"The Democratic party has demonstrated a callous disregard for sound fiscal policies and practices . . .

"The Democratic party has utterly disregarded the disastrous effects of the resulting inflation on people with fixed incomes, such as retirees, pensioners, Social Security beneficiaries, and those who have their savings invested in insurance.

"The Democratic party, as custodian of government, has adopted the practice of taking your money by taxation and then using that money to attempt to buy your votes.

The Democratic party is attempting

with alarming success to change the Congress from an independent body representing the people to an amen chorus for presidential proposals.

"The Democratic party has endangered the security of the nation by negative decisions on military preparedness, preoccupation with bilateral and unilateral steps toward disarmament, and by use of the military services domestically as instruments of social reform.

"THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY HAS NOMINATED FOR VICE PRESIDENT A KEY LEADER OF THE AMERICANS FOR DEMOCRATIC ACTION, THE MOST INFLUENTIAL SOCIALIST GROUP IN OUR NATION.

"The Democratic party has encouraged, supported, and protected the Supreme Court in a reign of judicial tyranny, and in the court's effort to wipe out local self-government, effective law enforcement, internal security, the rights of the people and the states, and even the structure of the state governments.

"The Democratic party is converting our constitutional federated republic into the same type of disciplined and submissive servant of an elite power group as it has made of the Democratic party itself, as all who watched the Democratic convention on television can bear witness.

"The top leaders of the South Carolina Democratic party have chosen to abandon the traditional independence of the state party, and to lead the people of South Carolina down the road to serfdom mapped by the national Democratic party. The party of our fathers is dead. Those who took its name are engaged in another reconstruction, this time not only of the South, but of the entire nation.

"If the American people permit the Democratic party to return to power, freedom as we have known it in this country is doomed, and individuals will be destined to lives of regulation, control, coercion, intimidation and subservience to a power elite who shall rule from Washington.

"Fortunately, for those of us who

cherish the traditional freedom entrusted to us by our forefathers, there is another choice this year. Although the party of our fathers is dead, the principles of our forefathers live now in the cause of a presidential nominee.

"THE MAN WHO HAS GAINED THE REPUBLICAN NOMINATION FOR PRESIDENT AGAINST ALL THE ODDS AND OPINION POLLS, AND WHO NOW HAS CONTROL OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY, IS ONE WHO BELIEVES IN AND ABIDES BY OUR CONSTITUTION. HE HAS DEMONSTRATED HIS FIDELITY TO FREEDOM, INDEPENDENCE AND THE CONSTITUTION BY HIS ACTIONS AND HIS VOTES IN THE UNITED STATES SENATE.

"I personally know him to be able and responsible. He is an honest man of courage and conviction, who trusts the American people to hold the reins of government and rule themselves.

"I cannot foresee what success will reward Sen. Barry Goldwater's efforts to return the national government to its constitutional role and our nation to its rightful place of strength and respect in the world. Nor can I predict with certainty how long these ideas and ideals of Sen. Goldwater which I share will prevail in the councils of the Republican party which he now heads. I do know that we have a fighting chance under Barry Goldwater's leadership and that we are welcomed to his banner.

"I know also that the course for the Democratic party has been set toward socialism and arbitrary rule. I know further that the Democratic party's line of succession is Hubert Humphrey and Robert Kennedy, with Walter Reuther and Joseph Rauh pulling strings behind the scenes.

"I have worked within the framework of the Democratic party, because experience proves it necessary to work within the framework of one of the two national parties to be effective. I have, nevertheless, maintained independence of judgment on issues and have conscient-

iously tried to represent the people of South Carolina, seeking to protect their rights and freedom.

"I shall always maintain my independent judgment and action and put the people of South Carolina first. To do this in the future I must work within the framework of the Goldwater Republican party.

"For me, there is no alternative. The future of freedom and constitutional government is at stake, and this requires that I do everything in my power to help Barry Goldwater return our nation to constitutional government through his election to the presidency. This also requires that I join him in his fight, successful as of now, to make the Republican party a party which supports freedom, justice and constitutional government.

**Mr. ZIP Moves Long Distance Parcels Faster**

**Five Digit Code Skips Sorting Stops**

Mr. ZIP has a new assignment—to accelerate delivery of long distance parcel post by 24 hours or more.

Postmaster General John A. Gronouski has announced plans to distribute outgoing parcel post by ZIP Code in the Nation's largest post offices. These offices account for more than 50 percent of the total volume.

The program, he said, not only speeds deliveries but reduces damage to parcels because of fewer handlings in transit.

"I have made a commitment to President Johnson to revitalize our nation's parcel post service," Mr. Gronouski said.

"I envision a virtual revolution in the handling of parcels."

The success of the program, Mr. Gronouski said, hinges on public use of ZIP Code numbers in addressing packages, as well as the cooperation of firms that mail parcel post in large volume.

Explain how the program operates. Mr. Gronouski pointed out that ZIP Coded parcel post bypasses larger cities where there is a heavy mail volume in post offices and is routed directly to the sectional center nearest its destination.

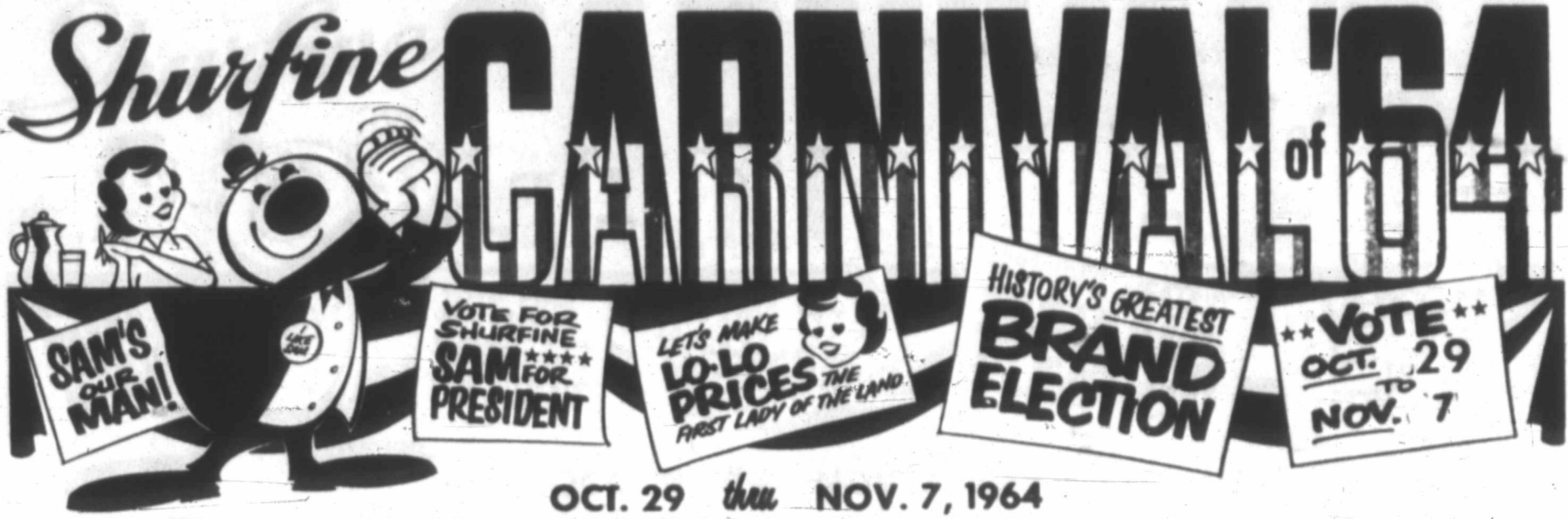
**Foster-Safer Deliveries**

Delivery thus is accelerated by as much as 24 hours, especially for packages which travel 300 miles or more. And since fewer handlings are involved, the possibility of damage is reduced.

By way of illustration, Mr. Gronouski said a parcel mailed from Los Angeles to Alexandria, Virginia, without ZIP Code must be halted enroute at Cincinnati for further sorting. From there it is sent to the Washington, D.C., sectional center and then forwarded to Alexandria.

But if the package is ZIP Coded it will bypass Cincinnati and move directly to Alexandria through the Washington sectional center, usually by local delivery star routes, saving as much as a day in transit.

ZIP Code is built around the concept of 566 of these sectional centers throughout the country. Mr. Gronouski explained. By the end of the year he said the distribution of out-own parcel post by ZIP Code is expected to be implemented in each of these mail handling plants, which serve as transportation centers for surrounding post offices.
