WOODWORK BY DALTON

HAVE you ever wondered about how much it costs you to raise a child to the age of 18? Neither have I, at least not to that particular age, but any parent knows that the federal government's income tax allowable of \$600 a year is far from being realistic.

The magazine Changing Times estimates the cost of raising a child to the age of 18 at \$35,000 for the average middle-class city family. This figure about \$2,000 per child per year.

Of course, if you're real poor folks, the cost can be as little as \$12,000 for 18 years, the magazine says, and this hits the government's figure pretty close. But it hastens to point out that such living is real poverty, that it wouldn't include the child's share of the cost of housing, and that many pampered urban families spend as much as \$60,000 raising a child to age 18.

Major expenses on the average for 18 years come to about \$28,000 and include cost of being born, medical and dental, food, clothing, housing and transportation.

The magazine article also points out that by stopping their estimate at age 18, none of the totals includes "the real crusher that may start at 18 - the cost of college."

The thing that bothers me is that, assuming that each one of our kids needs \$2,000 a year, my wife and I - and our dog - will have nothing at all to live on. And you parents with four or five kids (and maybe two dogs) are in real trouble.

UNLESS you're some kind of nut, you want to be healthy. And unless you're different from most people, you'd like to have good health without having to pay the price. One of the frustrations of living is that you just can't seem to do the things you want to do and stay healthy.

Just last month I finally had that routine physical checkup which I had been intending to get for 15 years. Such a periodic medical examination (and it should be at least 15 times more often than mine) is part of the proper medical care which the Texas State Dept. of Health lists as one of seven paths to fitness.

(In my case, the only discouraging result was that I was given a list of foods I shouldn't eat, or at least should only dabble at. A good rule of thumb to follow in this diet, as in any other is this: If it tastes good, it's bad for you.)

This fits in with rule number 2: nutrition is important. "Gorging yourself one day and going without food the next is not the way."

Number 3 is proper dental care. Number 4 is exercise. "Believe it or not, exercise is an important element in fitness. Choose any exercise that suits you.... and that you enjoy," says the TSDH. "You need exercise enough to bring on healthful fatigue.... vigorous enough to tire the power of your muscles.... and regular participation using all parts of the body."

I know quite a few people whose biggest physical exertion is changing the gear shift lever from reverse to drive.

The other items were listed as studying work, healthy play and recreation, and adequate rest and
