The almanac is authored by Robert B. Thomas, it says on the cover. But what puzzles me is the line which says "The original Robert Thomas Farmer Almanac, published every year since 1792."

There's a bit of information in the book - a rather remarkable amount, considering that it was written by a 173-year-old man.

One of the first things I noticed was an ad for some kind of ointment, which just about takes care of all one's medical needs. It relieves (says the ad) hay-fever, stuns, burns, sunburn, diaper rash and athlete's foot.

That almost takes care of a person from top to bottom... if I could only use it for hairdressing.

It says rainfall over the nation will be 1.18 inches below average. Tell it to the westwind.

A look at April in the almanac gives this interesting information for last Monday: "Fast Day, N. H., Hol. Ala., Fla., Ga., Miss., Time enough is never enough."

It makes you wonder just what all that means. Part of it, at least, sounds like the itinerary for a Freedom March.

Among a list of popular superstitions on page 49 is a number of legends I never was aware of, which may explain some of my misfortunes. I probably violated some taboo I never even heard of.

Among the ones listed: "If a black cat comes to you, you must take it in. It will bring good luck." (I always thought you were supposed to run like mad.)

"If a cock crows before the door during a rainstorm, it soon is going to clear up." (If this happens at my door, there's gonna be one dead rooster pretty quick.)

Rain!

"Rain, at last." These words could be heard in almost every conversation in the Sudan area Monday as Sudan had its first measurable rain fall in almost a year. Although some agree that we need more of the "wet stuff", it is a start for the season and sprouters that believed that it had never rained here, have almost changed their minds, believing that maybe there is a chance after all.

Measurements varied and reports from one-half inch to six-tenths have been reported for the city with the surrounding area reporting anywhere from 1/4 in. to 1 1/2 inches.

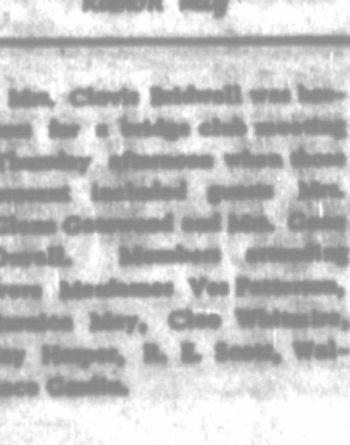

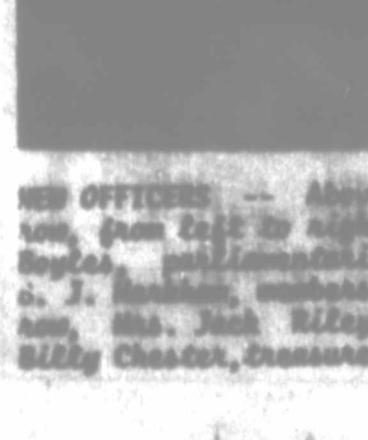
BLOOD TYPE RECORD TO BE KEPT IN SUDAN
