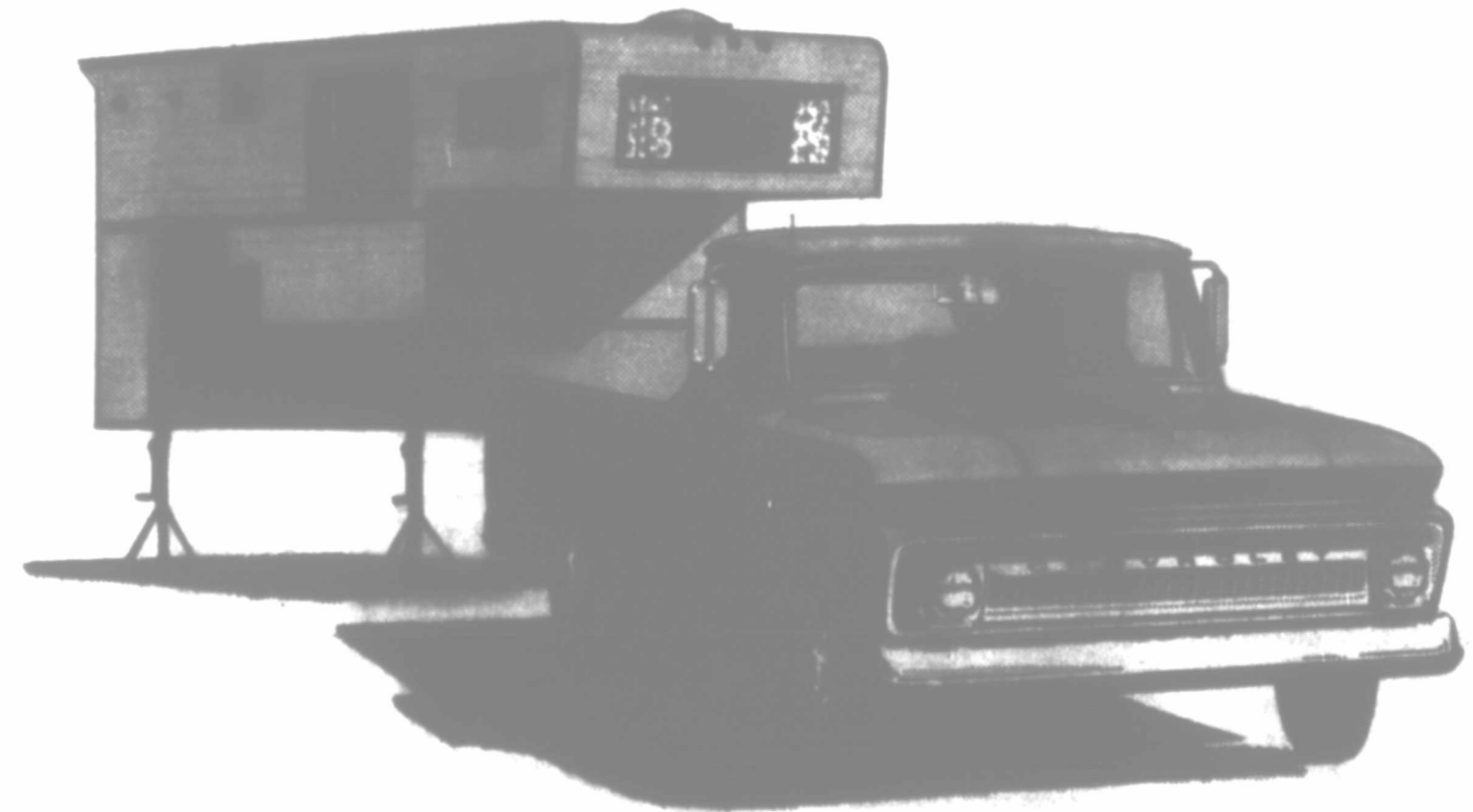

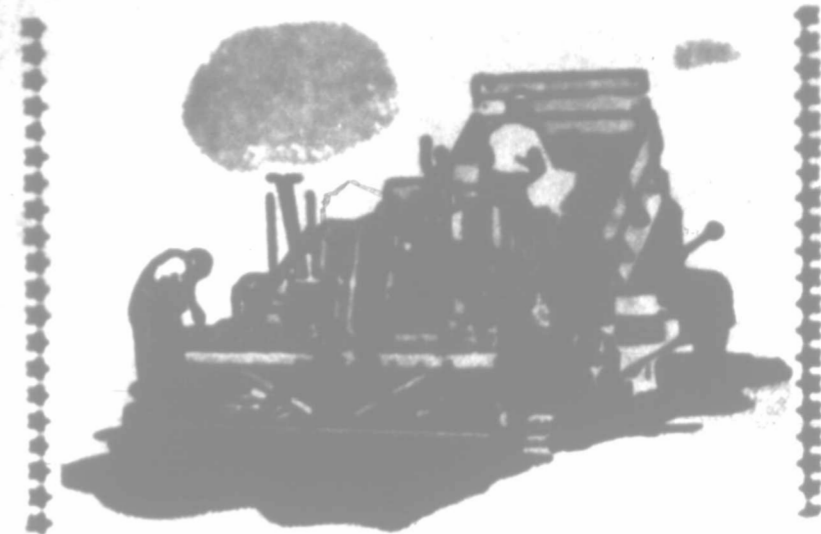

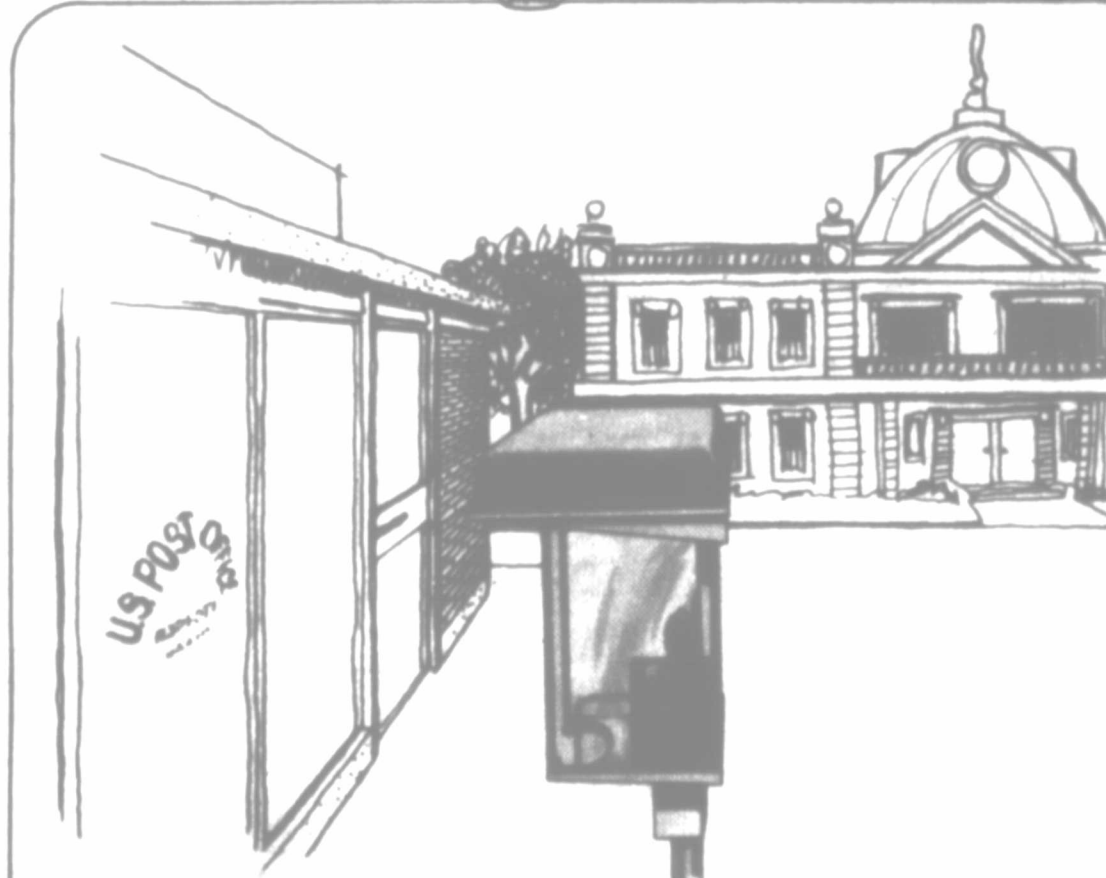

**EVIL AND EVILDOERS**

Scripture: St. Matthew 14: 29-31; Romans 14:10-12, 16, 17, 22; I Corinthians 15:58.  
 "Fret not thyself because of evildoers, neither be thou envious against the workers of iniquity." Psalms 37:1.
