THERE'S ONE Senate committee which has been spending some time on a tiring subject.

Actually, there probably are quite a few committees doing this, but the Senate Commerce Committee, headed by Sen. Warren Magnuson, a Washington Democrat, is studying a proposal to set up uniform safety and grading standards for tires, including those placed on new cars as original equipment.

A lot of people for years have been buying new tires at the same time they buy a car, snapping them for the factory equipment, or just keeping a high-priced set they previously bought for the old car, rather than run what they consider a risk of driving on equipment tires.

I never could do this, because by the time I scraped up enough for the down payment on a new car, I usually couldn't buy a bicycle tube.

I do know that some drivers are just naturally harder on tires than others. I will say that I once put 30,000 miles on a set of equipment tires of a brand which is in all respects with most of my driving acquaintances. I may come in on the rim tomorrow for saying so, because recently I acquired another set of the same type. Paul Dixon, Federal Trade Commission chairman, testified recently that tires placed on many new heavy sedans and station wagons are built to support a load of only three average-size passengers without luggage--and while the car's standing still.

(Of course, he neglects to consider that some models of new cars are likely to squeal most of their time standing still.)

Fish Like Candy, Too

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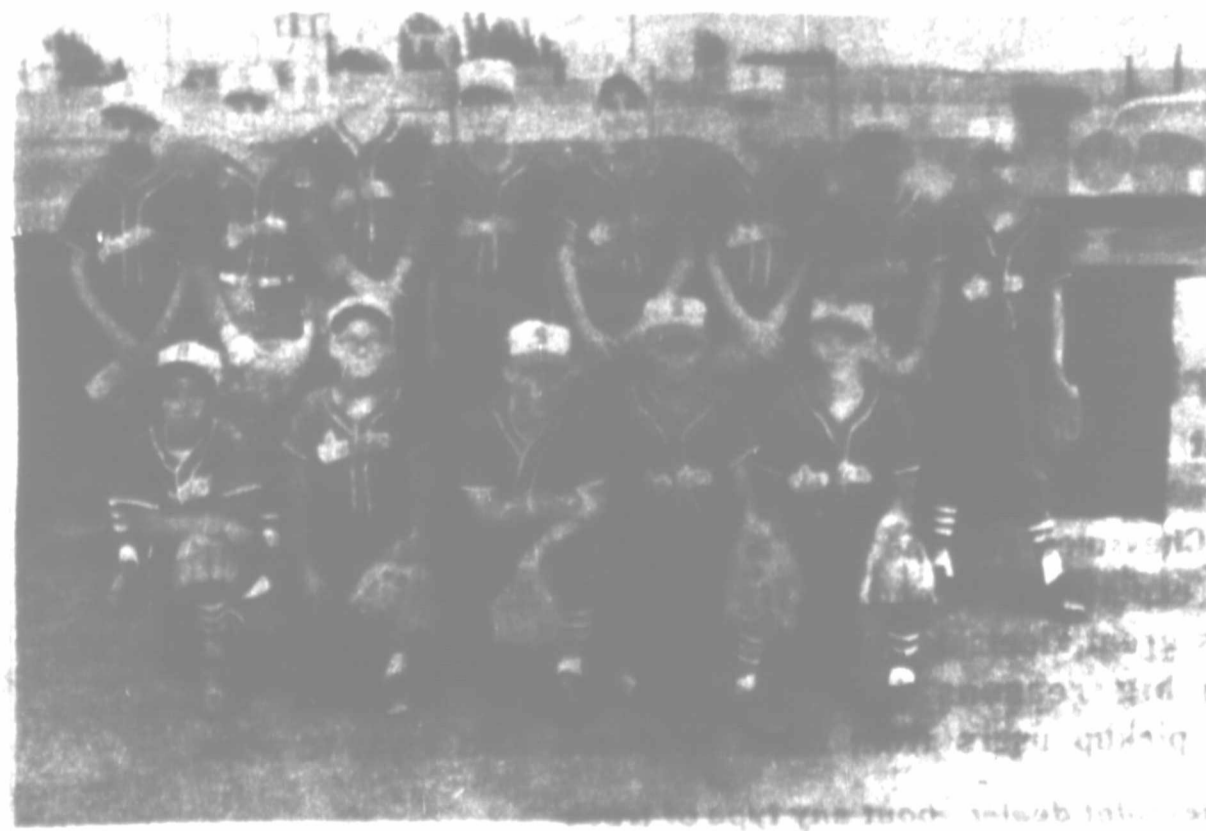

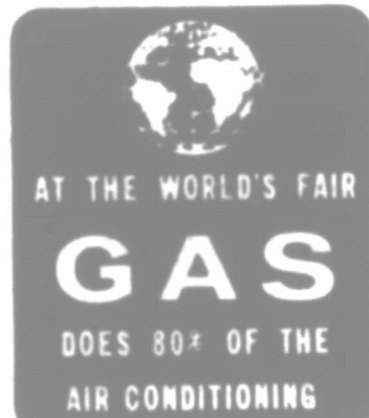

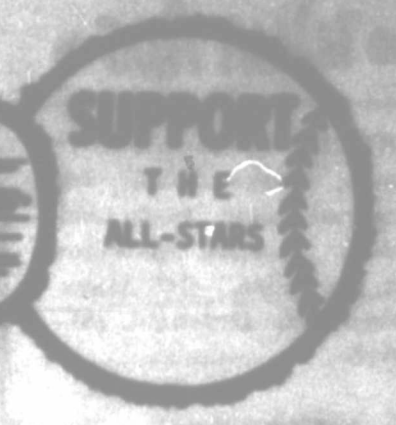
