Bond Totals

Are Announced

During the month of November, United States Savings Bond sales in Parmer County amounted to \$1,908, according to a report received from Frank Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee. Through November, Parmer County has purchased \$34,485 in Savings Bonds for the year.

During the first eleven months of 1966, Savings Bond sales in Texas amounted to \$139,381,146 which is 94 per cent of the state's goal of \$147.1 million. This is an increase of 5.2 per cent over the same period last year.

"Nationally, the sale of Series E and H Savings Bonds during November amounted to \$368 million. These sales were the highest for any November in 11 years; 9 per cent higher than a year ago. The January-November sales were \$4,488 million, 7 per cent over sales for the first 11 months a year ago and a 10-year record for any January-November sale since 1956", Spring stated.
