interesting in obgaining toll-free service here, Rone said. He noted that this is particularly true of those whose children attend Sudan schools, those who trade here or who otherwise have ties to Sudan.

One businessman noted that while it obviously would benefit Sudan businesses to have Bula customers calling direct to Sudan, it also would be of equally obvious benefit to those who live nearer to Sudan than anywhere else, yet can't place a call into town without paying a charge.

The more than 200 customers on the Bula exchange evidently are divided by geographical location as to where they would prefer to have toll-free phone zervice.

Some Sudan businessmen who attended the Bula meeting said it appeared naturally enough that those closer to Morton would like to be tied into Morton, and apparently many would be willing to make it a joint venture and be connected to Sudan also. A reciprocal feeling appears likely among Bula Subscribers in the Sudan vicinity, he said. However, he added, people in Pep area people, "he said. "And I've found them to be good, fair-minded people. 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The uncertainly of the amount of cost to all involved is one factor standing in the way of the project. Although a figure of "two or three dollars" per Bula subscriber was mentioned at the Bula meeting, the official who mentioned this later said it was a high figure, and likely wouldnot cost that much. It also would, cost Sudan subscribers more, Mayor Rone pointed out, but how much again is unknown.

Eighty-three Bula subscribers were reported present at the Bula meeting, and on separate votes, 27 voted to tie in with Morton, then 33 voted for Sudan, and finally 37 voted to tie in with both towns.

The Sudan businessmen, with no information as to when Five Area would mail out its ballot, agreed to try to reach as many Bula subscribers as possible, as soon as possible, in an effort to convince them to vote in favor of a toll-free tie up.
