THE IDIOCY of the system used by sponsors and networks to decide what programs will be shown on television was pointed up again last week with the announcement that the Ben Casey and Jimmy Dean shows would be dropped by ABC in April, and probably would not appear again next fall.

The Sudan Hornets edged their district wins and losses Tuesday night by defeating Springlake 63-62 in what was described as a heart-stopping thriller. Coach Nelson commented that he felt that this was the best game that the boys had played this season.

Sudan trailed in the first quarter 19-14 but led at the half by one point, 34-33. They rallied in the third quarter and led 59-52 although Corley Baker scored 25 points and Mike

Springlake wasn't done for yet and led by one point into the final minute of the game. Sudan scored with seconds to spare to win the game. Sudan has 3 wins and 3 losses in district play.

Corley Baker tallied 26 points, Mike Bellar, 14 and Danny Martin 4 while Pete Glasscock scored 17 for Springlake.

Last Friday Sudan was defeated by Kress 59-52 although Corley Baker scored 25 points and Mike

SOUP BOWL SUPPER

Perfect Pot Roast

4 to 5-pound beef pot roast

1 can Campbell's Onion Soup

1/4 cup water

2 to 4 tablespoons flour
