WOODWORK BY DALTON

WE IN THE newspaper and printing business think we have made a lot of progress in the last half century or so, but now I wonder. What makes me wonder are a couple of publications passed along to me by Mrs. Vivian Golladay Smoot of Plainview, mother of Mrs. Woody Dunaway of Sudan, and a frequent visitor to Sudan.

The publications are the Garden City Views, published in 1898 and 1899 by Mrs. Smoot's father. And the high quality of the printing, especially the pictures, is astounding.

Garden City is not Texas or Kansas, although both of these states have such, but is Missouri, where Mrs. Smoot's father, Joseph Cartwright, edited the paper, or magazine, or whatever he called it. (It sort of reminds me of a fat stock show program in format).

Cartwright's uncle incidentally, was Peter Cartwright, a widely-known early-day Methodist preacher. (Paid political advertisement).

Anyway, reading the publication, which is sort of an annual supplement to his paper, or something, gives anyone today a few chuckles, as reading any early-day paper usually does. A few random excerpts:

S. P. Byler advertises that he is "the leading harness maker of the city, keeps, at all times, fine Horse Millinery and Mule Clothing."

A store called "The Racket" in Harrisonville, Mo., advertises "Ladies Fleece Vests 17, 20, 25 and 40 cents. Heavy Union suits, 48 cents."

Under a photo is this caption: "The cut shown herewith depicts W. H. Gilbert, the one-horse printer who does chores around the Views Office. He was born in Indiana 28 years ago. The drawn look on his face is the result of having spent several months, in early life, attached to a rubber hose, the other end of which was inserted in a bottle." (If you could see the picture, you might wonder, as I did, how a man could grow such a mustache in only 28 years.)

Caption with photo of Nat Hopkins, mayor: "This pleasant and whole-souled gentleman came here from Morgan Co. in 1867... For about a quarter century, he followed farming, carpentry, etc. He lived the quiet life of a bachelor until he was about 50 years of age. For years he was acquainted with an excellent lady, milliner and dressmaker, down in Maryland. She too was allowing life to roll on until she was soon to pass her 41st mile post without trying the "bitter or sweet" of marriage entanglement. But in their own good time she and Mr. H. formed that partnership, and with Mr. Hopkins' good old mother, Mrs. E. Hopkins, age 84, they live in comfort and ease in their new home in this city."

A story about W. R. Brasfield, Druggist, notes that "he was Postmaster the four years of President Cleveland's last term, and though he rigidly charged all republicans full price for postage stamps, the same as D. L. Bishop now charged democrats, he was regarded as an honest man and fair in his dealings."

It is, perhaps, even more dangerous to raise your voice against corruption in high places when it arises or to oppose the great out-of-state owned corporations who have so much

Scripture: St. John 1:9-14.

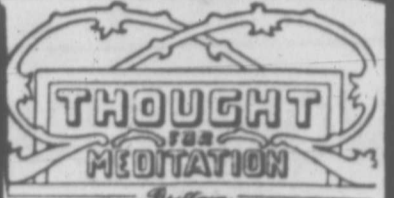

bloes whose interests conflicts with those of our District.

In two of my more recent races they have used every trick; deceit, slanderous anonymous mail and threats to me and my closest friends.

During this race they have, so far, at least, been more subtle. But their money and power behind my opponents become more obvious each day.

This is not to say that my two opponents would employ or use these tactics---they both seem like nice guys---but they don't have to use them---some others will gladly and freely do this for them if they think it will work.

These methods of deceit, etc. have been perfected to an art. And, as has been said, "the perfection of art is to conceal art". But look closely---it is obvious they are at work---not necessarily because all of them love my

opponents, but because they seek to destroy an old and proven enemy, Andy Rogers.

Meanwhile, my opponents readily seek and accept campaign money from various ones of these enemies of the people.

I and my family and some friends have suffered economically, socially and politically at the hands of some powerful lobbyists and others. But, I have not run from them in the past---I will not do so now, or in the future.

ISSUES

1. So the first real issue in this race for the 30th Senate District post; can those who deceive the people and try to manipulate the Legislature and other state officials to their advantage, finally succeed with their tactics and limitless money.

2. In Wichita Falls, the main population center of our district, a group there, several of their number extremely wealthy, pretty well control their city and county. Now they intend to control your Senate representation in Austin. Recently, a banker, and very rich oilman, among their number called a "SECRET" meeting in Wichita Falls to rant and rave how horrible Andy Rogers was and to raise money for one of his opponents. He didn't bother with the facts. MORE IMPORTANT, he didn't tell why he was really against me.

The truth is that in 1959 your then Senator George Moffett and other leaders in Wichita Falls asked me to sponsor a law creating a pollution authority to control oil field pollution as Wichita Falls HAD to seek a new water supply and the proposed new lake would be worthless until firm pollution control was initiated.

I passed this bill for Wichita Falls and neighboring towns and it has brought wonderful results.

But the banker and oilman who called the "SECRET" meeting did not explain how he had been and still is considered one of the
