**POSTAL SAVINGS  
TO BE REDEEMED**

1. Postmaster Ken Minyard today urged depositors with postal savings certificates to withdraw their accounts from Post Offices as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

2. The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

3. Postmaster Minyard pointed out that as of April 28, 1966, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. He said that interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

4. The Postmaster said that for convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

5. The Postal Savings System was established January 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract savings of a large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Offices in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people

who had lost confidence in private banks. Today, however, with the growth of banking facilities paying much higher interest rates than the 2 percent interest per annum paid on Postal Savings, the System has out-lived its usefulness for the American people.

6. The Postmaster noted that as of June 30, 1965, there were 997,029 depositors holding certificates in 3,130 post offices throughout the nation. The number of depositors has been declining, he said, at a rate of about 6,500 per month.

7. The Postmaster said that unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, would be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and would be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

The Sudan Hornet Concert band is scheduled to leave at 1 p. m. today (Thursday) for Six Flags Over Texas to attend a band festival.

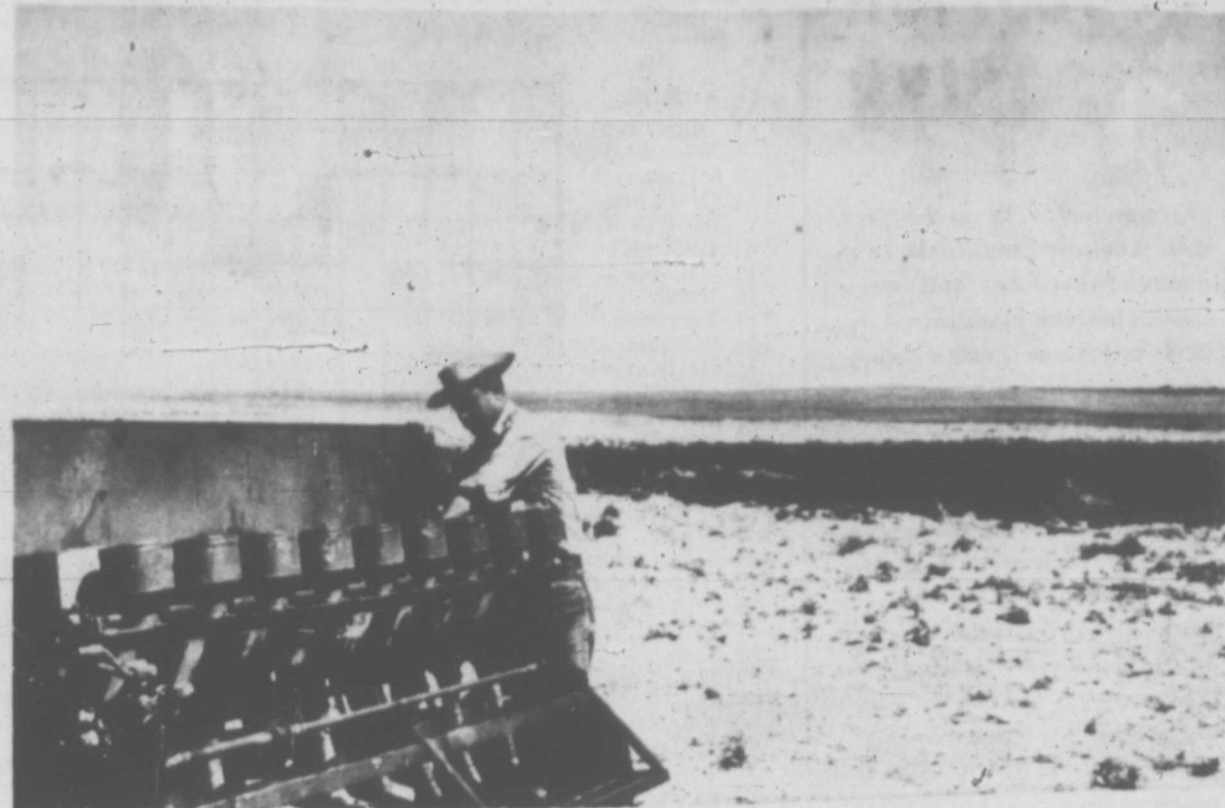

All entomologists on the Technical Advisory Committee of the massive diapause boll weevil control program coordinated since 1964 by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., continue to agree that the program has been highly successful. Westward migration of the pest has been stopped. And the two years of spraying have reduced overwintering weevils to an average of about five per acre, and the 1966 spray operation is expected to cut the overwintering population to less than an average of one weevil per acre.

The group also discussed the 1966 spraying operation, but postponed making firm decisions pending answers to several questions. First, they will need to know the distribution of those few remaining weevils over the control zone.

This will determine the acreage it will be necessary to spray.

Second, it is still not known how much of the cotton in the control zone will be planted to the various skip-row patterns. For instance, with aerial application being the only practical spray method, cotton planted solid. So even with a reduction of 30 or 35 per cent in actual cotton acres, there is no assurance that the area covered by the other 65 or 70 per cent will be less in the control area than it was in 1965.

Third, the Insect Control Association headquartered in Dickens is planning a much broader in-season control effort for this Spring, and the effectiveness of that effort will also have a bearing on the total acreage which will need spraying this Fall.

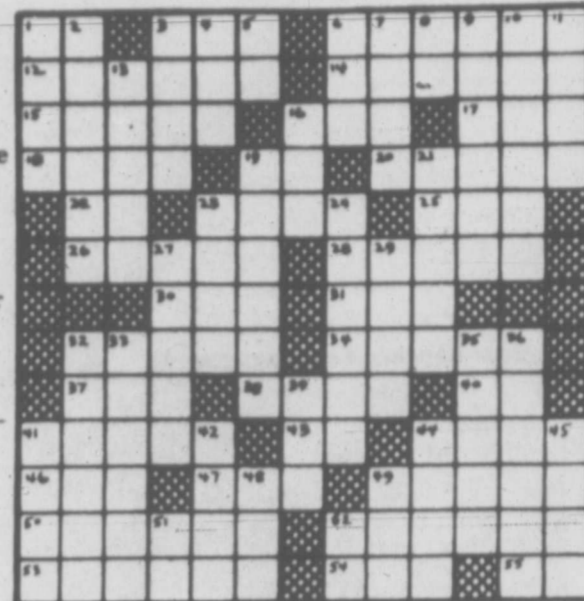
Entomologists have pointed out that even though weevil numbers are brought down to less than one weevil per acre following the Winter of 1966, this will be an "average" figure, and there are likely to still be enough weevils getting together in some locations to reproduce. And once reproduction begins, numbers could build up fast without some kind of control measure. Further, there is always the possibility of reinfestation from other areas to be guarded against.

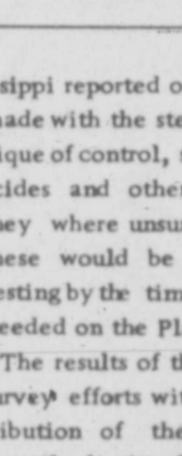

issippi reported on progress being made with the sterile male technique of control, systemic insecticides and other methods. But they were unsure whether any of these would be ready for field testing by the time they would be needed on the Plains in 1967.

The results of the 1966 Summer survey efforts with regard to distribution of the remaining weevils, limits of the control zone and weevil numbers will also be highly important to any plans made beyond 1966.

While there is no assurance of it, there is some hope that the extremely low populations of overwintering weevils which may emerge from hibernation cities in 1967, and even in 1966, can be "trapped" in small acreages of early planted irrigated cotton. If this can be accomplished, they could be almost wiped out with two early season applications of insecticide before the period of oviposition, thereby preventing reproduction and population buildups.

With regard to control measures after 1966, PCG Executive Vice President Donald A. Johnson said: "It would be a terrible tragedy to lose the ground we have gained in this program toward eradicating the weevil from the Plains area. We simply cannot afford it. We must keep weevil populations at a low level in order to be prepared for any scientific breakthrough which will help us complete the job."

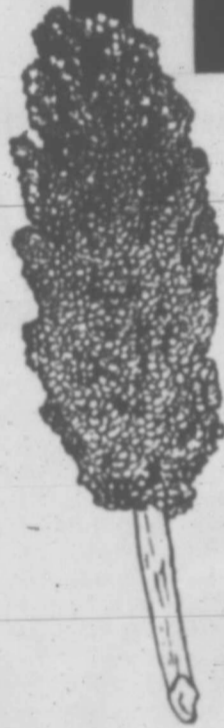

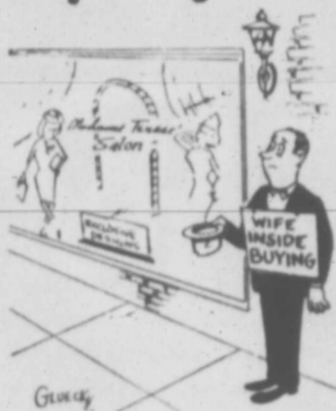
on the program. A short skit, "The Bathroom Door", will be presented by the boys of the Ranch's Senior High School class. A big barbeque will be served at noon.

**COTTON ALLOTMENT VOTES TO BE IN MAY**

Growers in about two-thirds of the upland cotton producing counties will vote during the period May 16 through May 25 on whether to permit transfer of cotton acreage allotments to other counties by sale or lease. If in any county at least two thirds of growers voting favor transfer, growers will be permitted to transfer allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within same state. Allotments may not be shifted to other states.

Where approved by at least two-thirds of growers voting in county, transfer of allotments to other counties for period 1967, 1968 and 1969 will be permitted. Transfer of allotments authorized in Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

First Vote on transfer of allotments held on November 23, 1965. At that time growers in 349 upland cotton producing counties voted to permit transfer.

There are a total of 1,059 cotton growing counties in U. S. Only those counties which did not approve transfers last November will vote.

The May 16-25 referendum will be by mail, first time a referendum of this type has been conducted by mail. Ballots will be delivered to all cotton growers in the county in the near future. Officials said a mail vote should be much more convenient for growers rather than having to appear in person at their polling place, particularly during busy season. USDA officials hope for good turnout in voting and will regard it as sign growers approve mail method of holding referendum. To be counted, all votes should be in office of the county ASC Committee before office closing time May 25.

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

Beautiful home lawns just don't happen. They are the result of good management, including the proper grass, fertilizing, mowing, watering and in some instances, drainage, says County Agent, Buddy C. Logsdon.

Knowing the right time to feed the lawn is as important as knowing what to feed it. Turf requires frequent feedings to remain green and vigorous throughout the growing season. Lawns should receive an application of complete fertilizer in the spring and again in early fall.
