NOTE TO MY friends in the insurance business: Please don't bother me with a bunch of facts about car insurance. My mind is made up.

Actually, I hadn't intended to write anything else so soon about auto insurance, but since I have received a letter from some good people in the business, I feel obligated to comment.

Understandably, those in the insurance business are a bit defensive about the periodic increases in auto insurance, and this letter included some material prepared by the companies to try to calm the wrath of the car owners. The letter suggested I print some of the facts about the issue.

Statistics were cited showing that the young drivers are more often involved in accidents and therefore should pay a higher premium. I never claimed otherwise; I don't doubt it for a minute. But this still is small comfort to the parents of the good, sensible teenage drivers—and there still are a few around.

Another fact quoted in the brochure was that although Texas ranks sixth in the nation in the number of licensed drivers, there are 34 other states which have higher average premiums for auto liability insurance.

This is like saying, "be thankful you have the measles; nearly everyone else has polio".

In addition, the letter included a reprint of an editorial from the Houston Chronicle which said that the blame for rising auto insurance rates must be placed on the people, not the companies. The writer said "the more the companies have to pay out in claims, the more the companies have to take in premiums." He blamed the general public for our indifference to traffic laws, voting for legislators who killed the "safe driver" plan, by applauding jury judgments against insurance companies, etc. He also mentions the rising costs of medical and hospital care and automotive repairs.

All of these are points well taken, but there are many things not mentioned. Nowhere are company profits listed for example, and no matter how you slice it, the auto liability insurance is still compulsory insurance, which wouldn't be so bad if drivers were required to carry less protection than they now have to.

Finally, I must point out again that any statements I make on auto insurance—or anything else—are strictly my own opinions and no one is required to agree with me about any of them. I certainly have no quarrel with the man who feels the companies deserve every bit of the premium they are getting, nor would I object if they wanted to send the companies an extra donation every now and then, just to make sure they don't go under.

Scripture: St. Matthew 7:13, 14; Acts 3:19; 4:12.

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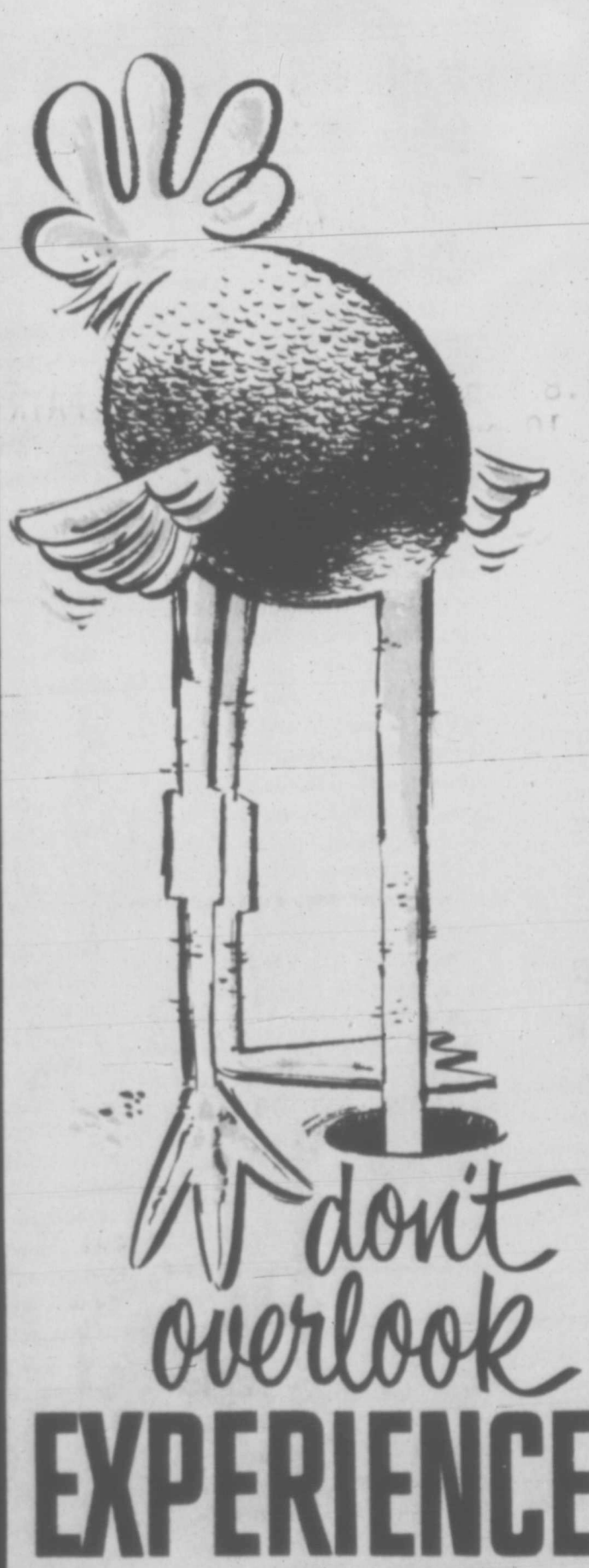

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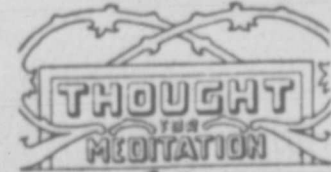
