Odessa Holds TAAF Meet

The final TAAF meet of the year was held in Odessa Friday, July 15, with six students from Sudan participating.

The participants and places won included:

Frances Hanna, third in 50 yard dash, 6.7; second in 60 yard low hurdles, 7.5; fifth in high jump, 3 ft. 6 in. She also participated with the Lubbock relay team in the 440 relay with the Lubbock team winning first place with 53.3.

Louise Williamson participated, but failed to qualify for the finals.

Jerry Bellar, who re-injured his back, qualified in the 100 yard dash with 10.3, but did not run in the finals due to his back injury. The event was won by a boy from Big Spring who ran the 100 yards in ten seconds flat.

Larry Hanna, third in 50 yard dash, 6.1; third in 100 yard dash, 11.5; second in broad jump, 16 feet; fifth, shot put, 35 ft. 1 1/2 inches.

Billy Gore, second in 440 dash; 55.2; third in 220 yard dash, 24.6.

The Sudan boys 440 relay team composed of Gore, Hanna, Randy Pierce, and a boy from Kermit, who replaced Bellar, won sixth place with their time of 50 seconds.

Coaches Jim Cain and Norman Nelson, who have accompanied the students to all six meets held in this area this summer, said that they feel that all students participating received a lot of personal satisfaction along with great physical training and feel that Sudan was well represented in each meet.

Howard Wright was guest speaker on the subject "Muscular Dystrophy" and he showed films.

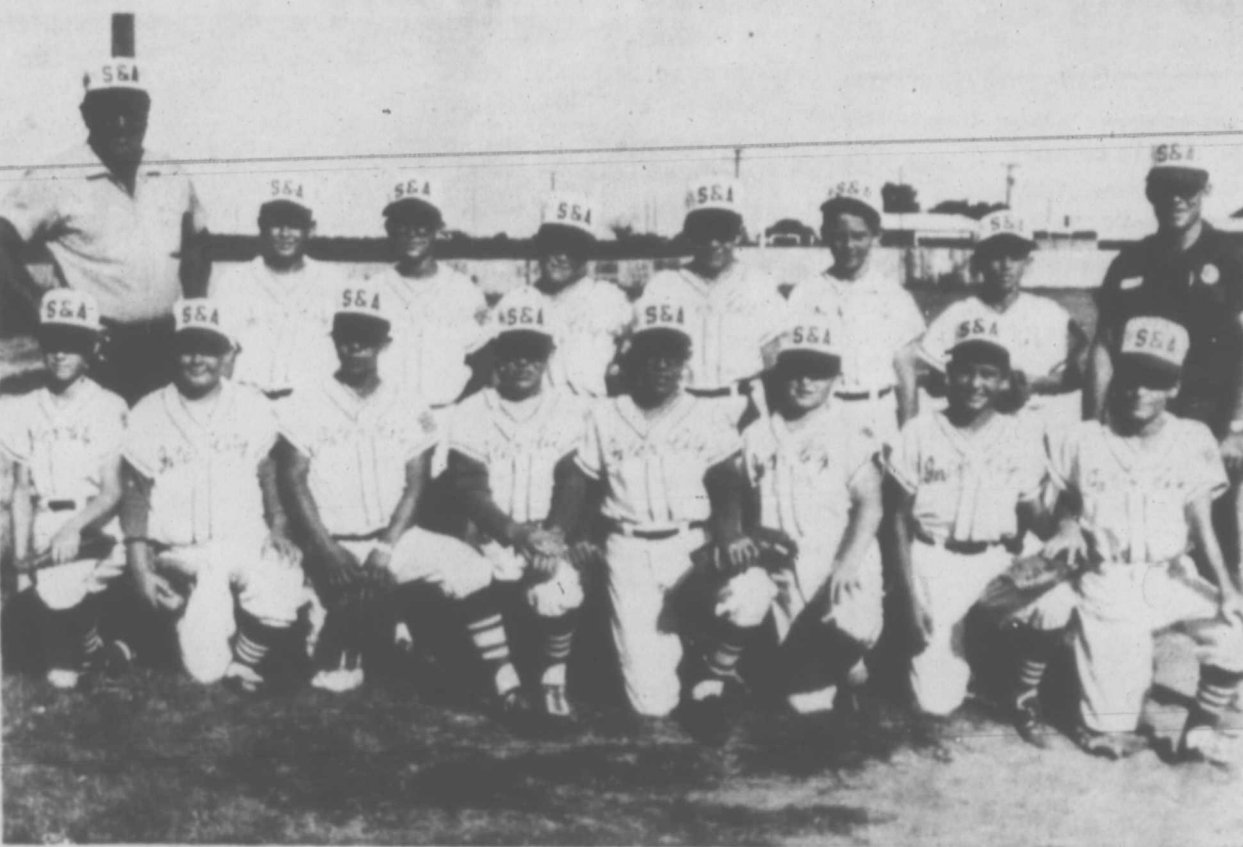

Sudan High School Principal Resigns

W. E. Hancock, Sudan school superintendent, announced this week that the resignation of Ralph Stewart, high school principal, has been accepted by the school board.

Stewart, who has served as principal here for six years, recently resigned to accept a position on the coaching staff of Pecos High School.

Hancock reported that at the present time there are seven vacancies in the school faculty and interviews are being held to fill these, including the principal's position, before school begins in August.

Classes for the 1966-67 school year will begin here on August 29 with registration to be held the week prior.

Hancock stressed that there seems to be a shortage of qualified teachers with the need felt in the math field.

GORDON GRAVES PROMOTED

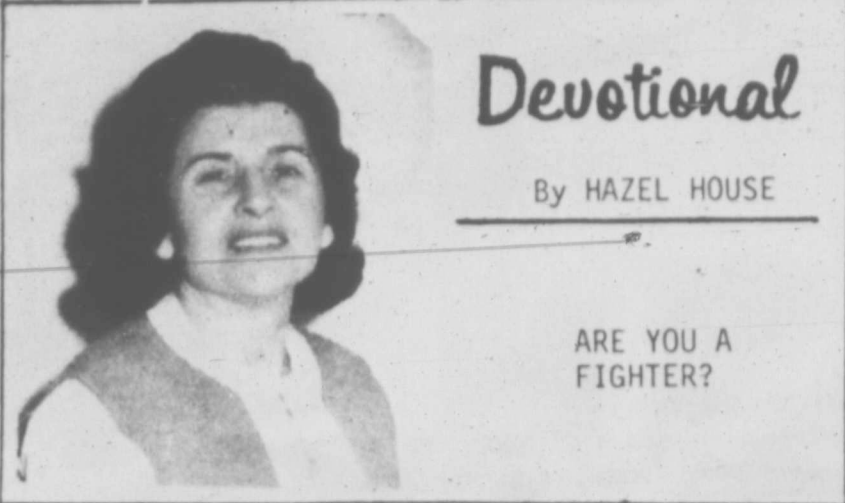

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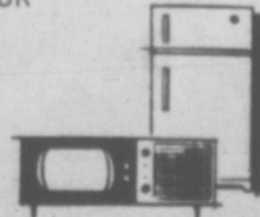
