SCHOOL BEGINS AUGUST 29

Superintendent W. E. Hancock announced that classes will begin August 29 at 8:30 a. m. for the 1966-67 school term. Registration for high school will begin Tuesday, August 23 with the seniors registering in the morning and the juniors in the afternoon. The sophomore class will register Wednesday morning followed by the freshmen that afternoon.

Registration for grades one through eight will be held Friday, August 26 at 9 a. m.

Hancock also reported that a general faculty meeting will be held August 25 beginning at 9 a. m. with the principals holding sectionalized faculty meetings that afternoon.

He also stated that the high school faculty is complete at this time but that three teachers are still needed for the elementary school. This is barring anymore resignations. In the last week, a first grade teacher, Mrs. Hallie Terrell resigned and the high

school principal, Sherrod, who was recently hired, also resigned. Kenneth Noles of Amberst was hired as high school principal. Noles has been a member of the Amberst school system for nine years. Mrs. Noles will be a teacher's aid with the Title I program. Noles is presently on the job at the school and he and his family will move to Sudan as soon as living quarters can be arranged.

Also hired Monday to complete the high school faculty were Joe O. Taylor of Dallas, and Gary Chisholm of Denton. Taylor will teach Spanish and history. He is a graduate of SMU and has taught six years. For the past two years he has been employed by the State Highway Department in Dallas. He is married and has three daughters.

Chisholm is a graduate of North Texas State Teachers' College.

He will teach math and this will be his first teaching assignment. Also voted on by the school board Monday night were the higher cafeteria fees. Due to a deficit of approximately \$2,500 last school term the board voted to raise the price of lunches from thirty cents, for grades one through six, to thirty-five cents. Junior high and high school lunches, which were formerly thirty-five cents, will be forty cents when school begins.

This price increase was called for by the decrease in government commodities donated to the lunchroom and the increase of prices on all food.

Bids were opened at the Monday night meeting of the school

board for the used school bus which was replaced by a new one this year. High bid was received from a Lubbock resident in the amount of \$600.00.

Hancock stated that prospects for completion of the elementary school faculty looks good and that the faculty should be complete this week.

Coach Jim Cain, head football coach for Sudan High School, reported that physical training including running began yesterday, Wednesday, for all high school boys interested in football. Actual workouts will begin Monday, August 15, with practices to be held twice daily at 8 a. m. and 4:30 p. m.

Physicals will be given at South Plains Hospital in Amberst at 6 p. m. Friday, August 12. If any student needs a ride to Amberst for the physical, please meet at the fieldhouse at 5:30 p. m., according to Coach Cain.

Physicals for the junior high boys will be given at a later date. Coach Wingo, junior high coach, is attending a coaching school at the present time.

Baptist Youth Attend Rally

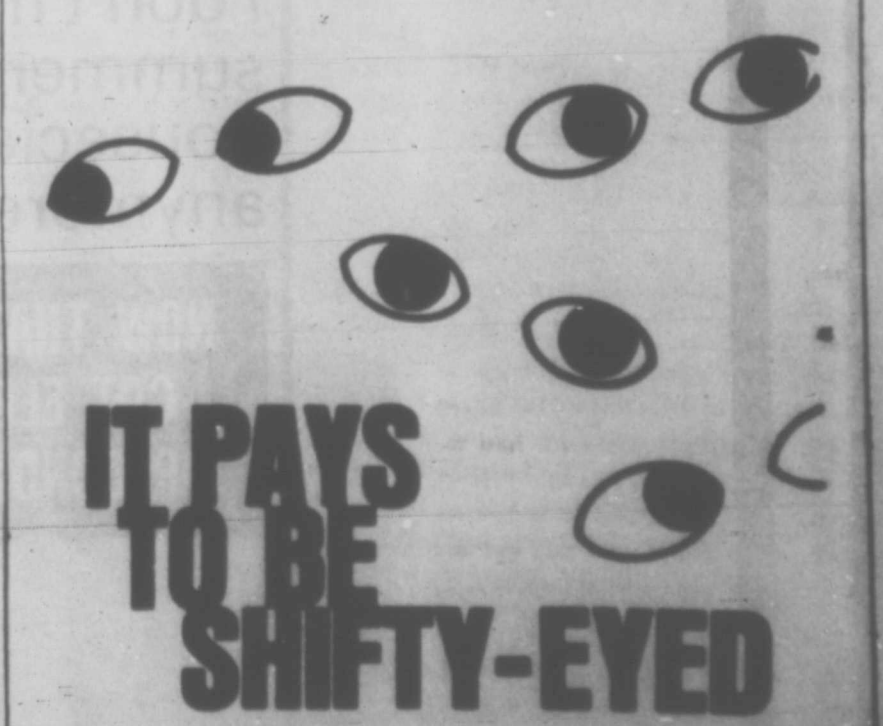

Scripture: Genesis 1:26-27; St. John 3:16.

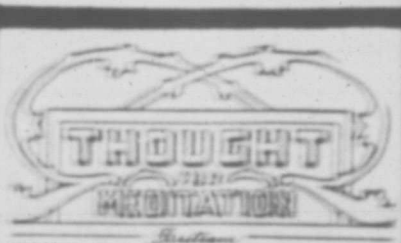

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes, providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a just and equitable share of the cost based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;

(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and

(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispersed, shall be considered an obligation and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for the compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

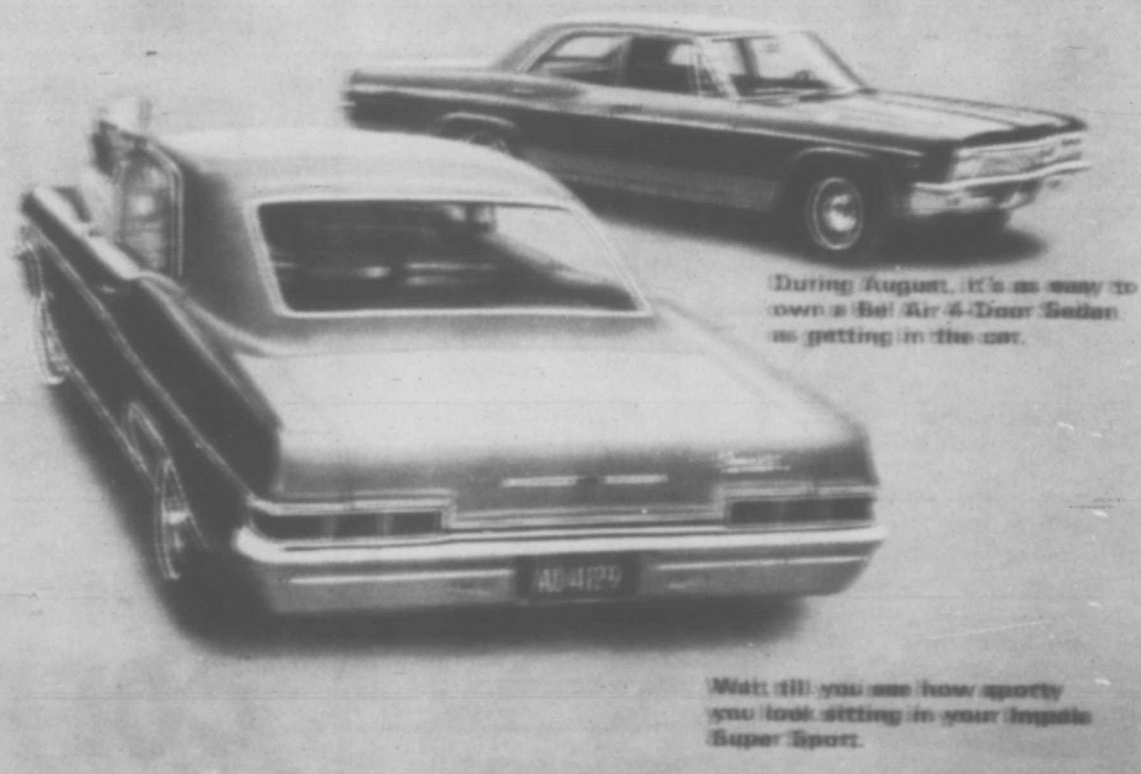
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the qualifying voters in the district concerned.
The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:
