

Friona has a lot of things of which to be justifiably proud. This weekend we were going over some of them, and thought we would review them for you readers, in case you may have forgotten some of them, or taken them for granted.

Three things are usually inspected by prospective citizens before they move to a community; schools, churches and hospital facilities. In all three of these areas, Friona scores A-plus.

Friona schools now need take a back seat to no one, with the completion of the 1.25 million dollar school building program, giving the school system a physical plant which can adequately take care of the youngsters.

Perhaps even more important than the physical plant is the fact that in the Friona school system is a feeling bred by the teachers making the students want to excel.

Recent accomplishments by students on all levels, particularly in the district and regional literary and band contests, proves that in Friona we have more than just a good school plant.

As for churches, the city is well represented, with new modern buildings for most of the denominations represented here. Here again, we're pleased with some good personnel, as well as some dedicated church workers to assure that their programs will go forward.

In addition, the three largest churches are able to provide parsonages which are as nice as any which churches in cities the size of Amarillo or Lubbock have for their pastors.

Friona's hospital facilities are as new and modern as any city of comparable size. Farmer County Community Hospital is the pride of the entire area, being completely financed by private means, with no government funds provided.

The staff of the hospital includes five medical doctors, and here again the city is fortunate in having men with their high-calibre ability practicing medicine here.

Frionans are also fortunate to have fine dental facilities and personnel, as well as an optometrist, so that all needs may be taken care of locally.

There are many other things which can be included in a "Friona Brags" list.

One of these would have to be the country club, with as fine a nine-hole course as you'll find anywhere. The country club members, and the women's group, have a fine meeting place in their clubhouse.

Adjacent to Friona Country Club is Friona's Dive - Inn swimming pool, the only indoor swimming pool in the area, and the only one we know of in a town Friona's size.

Then there is the bowling alley, which again is not found in many towns the size of Friona. Bowlers in our size town often have to drive to a larger town in order to bowl.

Friona has a lot to offer in the way of social activities. There are four federated women's clubs, taking care of every age group. There are also other women's groups and auxiliaries.

There are corresponding men's organizations, such as Lions, Jaycees, Masons and Oddfellows. The women's club house is a meeting center for the various clubs, although other groups have their own lodges, such as the Masons and Oddfellows.

Friona is fortunate in having a volunteer fire department with all the pride and skill of a full-time department. Here again, the firemen are as well equipped as those in towns many times the size of Friona.

Then, Friona can be proud of the fact that it is growing. Since 1960, the last federal census, the town has grown from 2,040, to an estimated 3,149 early last year, an increase of over 50 per cent.

By the time the 1970 census rolls around, the population may well have doubled in a ten-year period.

Latest building figures, postal receipts and bank deposits back up the growth figures. Only last week did we announce in a news story that Friona State

State Senate Race Is Highlight Of Primary

A State Senate race brought about by re-apportionment, a local justice of the peace three-way race, and a county clerk's

race are expected to bring out a fair number of voters in Saturday's Democratic primary. These local and area races

add spice to an otherwise lackluster statewide political menu.

The state race pits 18-year veteran senator from the district, Andy Rogers of Childress, against a senator from the Wichita Falls area, Jack Hightower. The 30th senatorial district was enlarged last year due to the supreme court ruling forcing many senators to have to run against each other. This is the case in our district.

A third candidate, James Ray of Hale County, has entered the senate race but is a political unknown, and has done no campaigning in this area.

The Friona precinct Justice of the Peace race has three candidates running for the office. They are incumbent, Wal-

ter Loveless, Mrs. Ben McDonald and J.W. Roberts.

Making for the only contested county-wide race on the ticket is the county clerk's race, where incumbent Bonnie Warren is opposed by Joyce Haseloff.

Main race of interest among the state officers is the attorney general's race, where three candidates seek the office being vacated by U.S. Senate hopeful, Waggoner Carr. The attorney general candidates are Crawford Martin, Galloway Calhoun and Franklin Spears.

Governor John Connally has just taken opposition from two candidates, Stanley C. Woods, and Johnnie Mae Hackworth. (Continued on Page 3)

Polling Places Given; Precinct Meets Slated

Polling places and precinct conventions for Saturday's Democratic and Republican primary were announced this week by county chairman, Nelson Welch.

Balloting in Friona will be at the Junior High School, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The precinct convention will be held there at 3 p.m.

Other locations for voting and precinct meetings are: Black, community center; Lakeview-Otho Whitefield residence; Rhea, community center and Lazbuddie, school.

Voters in the Black precinct need to write in a precinct chairman, as there is no name on the ballot for that position.

Republican precinct voting will be held at the American Legion Hall in Friona, and also at Farwell. No contested races appear on the Republican ballot, which is not expected to draw a large number of voters.

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

Another meeting is scheduled for April 6, at 2:00 p.m. at Bovina Bank Community room.

FOOD FACTS
ON ICE - More and more frozen fruits and vegetables you buy are getting the once-over by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. More than 75 per cent of the total pack is graded for quality. This comes to 3.4 billion pounds - a half billion more than just a year ago.

According to Dr. Mina Lamb, head of Food and Nutrition and Professor at Texas Tech - College, Many of our "EASY FIX" foods are merely "Calorie traps" is about all they do contain. **CHECK LABELS** - is the flour used, enriched (if not its poor-nutrition wise) what contains milk, vitamin A or C, minerals and other needed nutrients found in these products. Check content on package before buying - that is if you are concerned about getting the most nutrition for your food dollar", she said.

Dr. Lamb gave a lot of food for thought in her talk to the Texas Home Demonstration women at the District I meeting of this group last week. **THE ROLE OF FOOD ADDITIVES**

Food additives play an important role for today's consumers.

Food additives are important to each of us daily, for they make possible wide choices of foods to buy and to serve. Most historians agree that salt was the first food additive - and it still is one of the most important and widely used ones.

Other well known food additives include vinegar, sugar, oils, spices and vitamins. Chemicals of food additives

are added directly to foods to import the desired quality of the finished product, or to serve a functional purpose in the use of food.

Food additives are subject to strict regulation and control by the Food and Drug Administration.

Manufacturers of food additives must test these products for their safety to consumers. No additives may be added to food without the approval of the Food and Drug Administration of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Enriched flour and meal are required by law because the refined process takes out the B vitamins and other minerals. These are added and labels will give this information. Whole grain products, of course, have all these nutrients - but not all people tastes are trained to enjoy whole grain products.

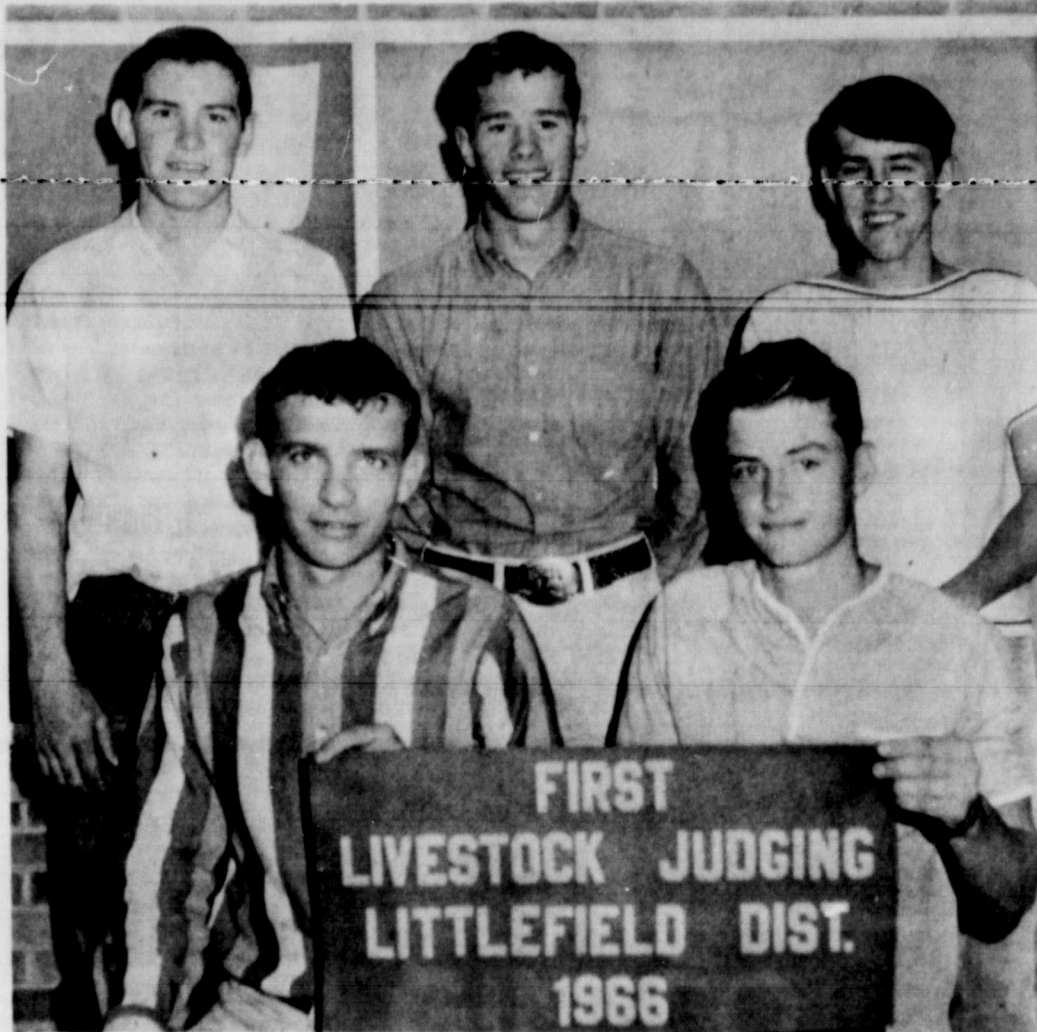

County Women Attend District Convention

Mrs. Edmund Kitten, County Chairman of the Texas Home Demonstration Association, and Mrs. Elmer Dyeke, of the Rhea Home Demonstration Club attended the District I, meeting of the THDA April 28, in Dalhart as delegates from Parmer County. Mrs. Cricket B. Taylor, County Home Demonstration Agent of Parmer County also attended the session.

Dr. Mina Lamb, Professor and Head of the Department of Foods and Nutrition at Texas Technological College was the feature speaker at the meeting.

The topic of Dr. Lamb's talk was "Everybody's Diet for the Jet Age." Some excerpts from her talk are: "Each person is the product of his life's nutri-

tion - obesity is the form of malnutrition. The body built during childhood cannot be remodeled but must be maintained during adulthood; neither diet, food, nor medicine can create miracles. What your child is 50 years from now will depend on what you do for him now - nutritionally, while they are young."

Dr. Lamb cleared up some misconceptions about some of the fad diets. She said: "The Mayo diet reducing, does not come from the Mayo Clinic, and the so-called Air-Force" diet can be dangerous."

A total of 273 women represented 23 Counties in District I attended.
