634 Students Enroll Here

Some 634 students began classes in the Sudan Schools Monday with several students enrolling later. The first day count showed 153 high school students including 39 seniors, 27 juniors, 39 sophomores and 48 freshmen according to Kenneth Noles, high school principal. Principal Bernard Wilson reported that grades 1-8 have 381 enrolled with 60 in the first, 51 in the second, 46 in the third, 47 in the fourth, 40 in the fifth, 46 in the sixth, 35 in the seventh and 56 in the eighth.

In other school news, Supt. W. E. Hancock reports that the faculty is complete with Mrs. Kenneth Wiseman substituting in the first grade and with the addition of Larry Branscum to the 5-6-7 departmental teaching in the capacity of Language Arts teacher. Mrs. Hazel May transferred from the departmental teaching to the fourth grade.

Hancock also reported that a school Budget Hearing will be held in his office on September 12 at 8 p. m. with all interested persons invited to attend.

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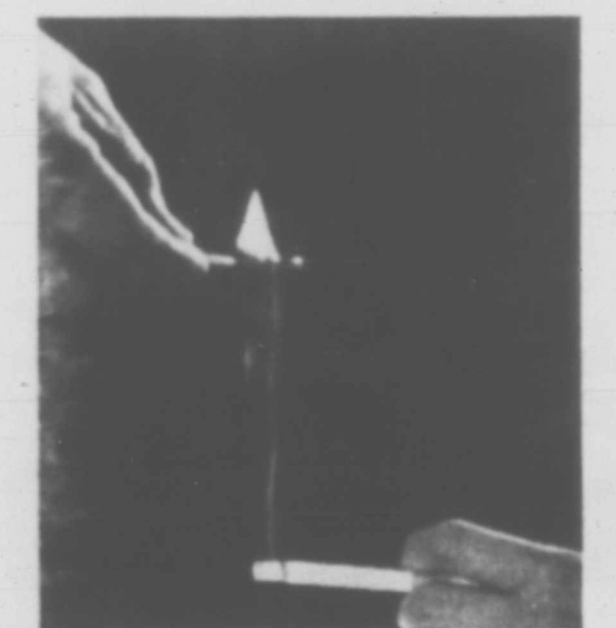
