THE SUDAN-ANGIERST rivalry in football, which will be renewed here Friday night, has always been one of the healthlest ones I've ever known about.

The feeling is keen, of course, but only on a few occasions has the antagonism between players and fam grown bitter. In recent years, until last year, it was a bit one-sided, as Sudan had won several years in a row, excluding a 13-13 tie game, but Amherit won it 14-8 last September, and several of the contests have been close ones providing lots of thrills for the fam.

A 14-12 game won by Sudan a couple of years ago was a real disappointment to Amberst fans, who saw their team hold a big edge in every statistical department except the score.

About three years before that, I recall the excitement of a game at Sudan in which the Hornets took a 13-0 halftime lead, only to see Amberst come storming back to the the game, with Ouarterback Johnsty-Blair mearing a receiver (my memory, which could be faulty, savs . it was Bob Hedges) on the goal line in the final seconds to the the score. And fans on both sides recall the tension as Blair's attempted kick for the winning point struck the crosshar and fell back on the inside to leave the score tied,

Other exciting moments of Sudan-Amherst games stand out in my memory, which dates only as far back as the 1959 season (and I'm sure many Sudan and Amherst fam can recall some highlights of games before that).

I remember well the long touchdown runs of Gary West and Joe Bellar against Amherst teams, the pass-catching, punting and tackling of Hornet End Danny Allen at Amherst one night, the rugged tackling of the Hornett' Kennel May, and on the Amherst side, the fierce linebacking and running of Gary Pigg in a losing effort at Sudan, Carl Enloe's outstanding job at linebacker, the darting runs of James Breshears, Blair's cool quarterbacking, and the competitive spirit of End Reagan Cox, whose seal occasionally got him into trouble with the officials, but whose play was

There were plenty of other players who made themselves noticed in past Amherst-Sudan games, and undoubtedly there will be some fierce action Friday, as they should. The rivalry will be keen, as each would like nothing better than to beat the other. It is normal and fine that the players should feel this way, and that the fans will be yelling for their boys to hit the other team with everything hey have.

But the nice thing about the Sudan - Amherst rivalry is the fact that on any other night except the one where they're playing each other, the fam of Sudan are always rooting for the Bulldogs to win, and the Amherst folks are pulling for Sudan.

Despite this, he was second in ground-gaining to teammate Larry Morgan, who scooted 90 yards in nine carries for a nifty 10-yard average. Bellar gained 82 yards in 11 efforcs, for 7.5.
