Of course, Baker and Hoffa are appealing right and left, but who knows—maybe one or both will have to spend some well-earned time in the clink yet.

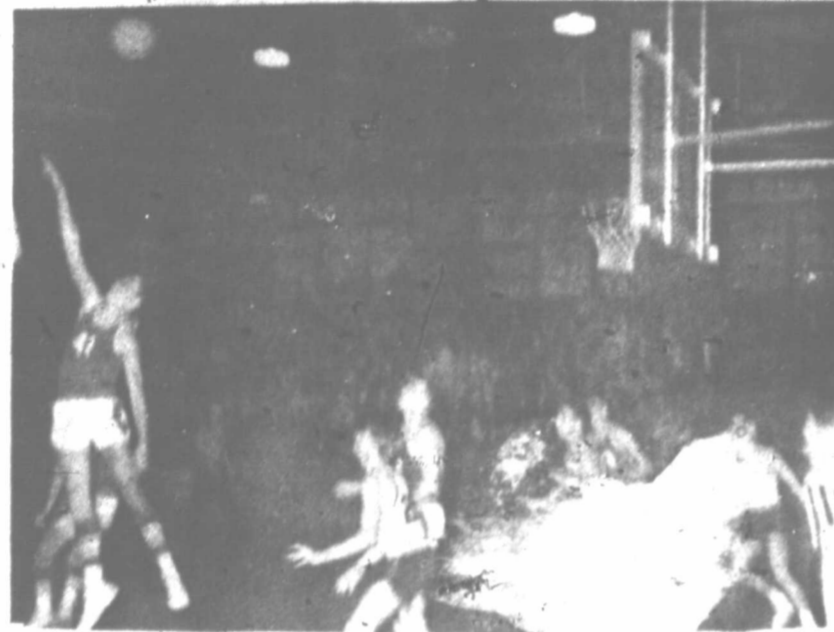

The Hornets fell to the district champs from Springlake 55-26 Friday night. The Springlake feds, who have won 28 consecutive games, have a good chance of going to State.

The guards did a fine job in pressing the Springlake forwards who usually score in the eighties. The Sudan forwards had a bad night, getting a slow start in the scoring department. Kathy Fisher led the scoring for Sudan with 12 points and Jeanne Baker scored 8.

The Hornets defeated the Farwell feds 54-33 in a thrilling overtime game at their last meeting and fans can look forward to some of the same tomorrow night.

The eighth grade girls, who were entered in a junior high tournament last week at Springlake, came home empty-handed after being defeated 15-14 by Muleshoe for consolation. They lost the first game 28-23 to Springlake, but won the second 40-11 over Dimmitt.

**PIONEERS  
OF  
YESTERYEAR**

(Writer's Note: Material submitted by Mrs. Shuttlesworth who calls herself Sudan's first lady barber and dressmaker. Mrs. Shuttlesworth, Sudan dressmaker for forty years, is now using scraps saved and making a tufted silk bed spread; and corduroy and wool Lone Star Quilt tops.)

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Shuttlesworth both natives of Alabama, having arrived in the Lone Star State in 1919 arrived in Sudan in 1922, prior to having lived in Hall County, Texas for two years.

J. M. "Judge" Shuttlesworth was born in Hall County, Alabama, the son of Job and Nancy (Morris) Shuttlesworth. He married Birdie Lee Howard Dec. 24, 1908 and the wedding was held in the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. and Mary (Jane) Howard.

Mrs. Shuttlesworth was born in 1891 in Tuscaloosa County, Alabama and the two grew up on farms in adjoining counties. In Alabama Mrs. Shuttlesworth remembers the old "water" gins that did not have suction pipes, and the cotton had to be fed to the gin in baskets.

Highlights of their stay in Hall County was picking cotton for \$3.00 a hundred; and a cold spell that froze the chickens in the hen house. Birdie described

the spell as "Being nothing between us and the North Pole but barbed wire fence, and the fence was down!"

A Family with a big heart they were adopted by a drifter who made the trip to Sudan with them. They came by wagon to Hale Center in December, 1921, where they remained over until March 1922, while Mr. Shuttlesworth came on ahead and built a three room shack on the two lots where their home now stands. No windows being available, windows were shutters with leather string latches.

Mrs. Shuttlesworth, the two older boys, and the drifter friend, Lew Sebring, Mrs. Shuttlesworth believes his name was, drove the wagons from Hale Center and cut across Spade ranch; as there were no roads or trails they just headed this way and kept coming. They arrived in Littlefield, March 6, 1922, and spent the night in the Wagon Yard, coming onto Sudan the next day.

Mr. Shuttlesworth farmed in 1922, made twenty-two bales of cotton in spite of drought and hail. He rented land from P. E. Bosen. The growing of cotton was in the embryo stage, and some said it couldn't be done, not a long enough growing season.
