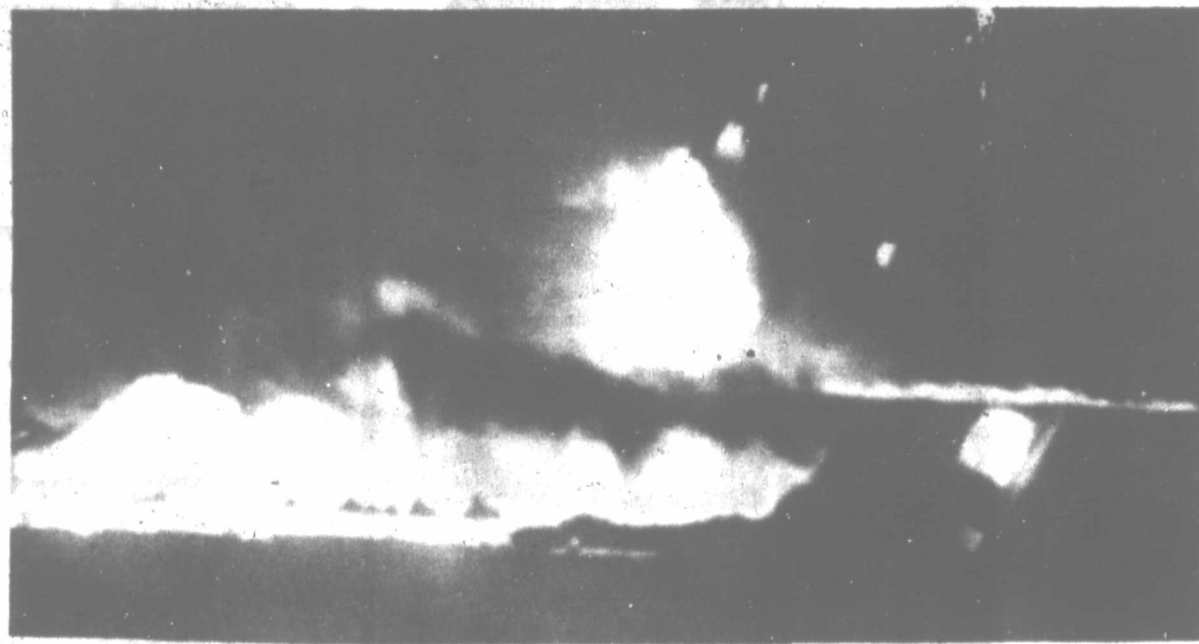
Other movie-makers in the past have more or less left the family-type movie field exclusively to Disney. But now at least one other company, Universal, has made a move in the right direction.

FIRE DESTROYS FIELDHOUSE

The old varsity field house was destroyed by fire Saturday morning. The frame building was located north of the football stadium and had served as fieldhouse for all sports up to the

closing of football season this school term when most of the equipment was moved into the new building adjacent to the gym. The loss was estimated at

\$4500.00 by the insurance adjusters, making the building a total loss. Also destroyed in the blaze was a washer and dryer, the central heating system, hot water heater and a 300 gallon water storage tank, along with the facilities located in the dressing and shower rooms.

W. E. Hancock, school superintendent, stated that the fire was first reported by Mrs. Daisy Martin at approximately 4:30 a. m. Saturday. The Sudan voluntary Fire Department answered the call but reported the blaze was too advanced to save the building. Hancock reported that although the fire started from an unknown origin, writings on the walls of the building and a broken window indicated a possible arson. The obscene writings were sprayed on with paint sometime between 5 p. m. and the time of the discovery of the blaze, according to Hancock.

The State Fire Marshall at Austin has been notified and he will conduct an investigation in the near future.

In 1924 was their bumper crop, seventy-five bales of cotton; but the next year came the "freeze out", so "Judge" called it quits, sold out his farm equipment, and started driving the school bus.

**THIRTY FIVE YEARS
JUSTICE OF THE PEACE**

"Judge" Shuttlesworth was one of the first Justices of the Peace of Sudan, an office he held for thirty five years; he also drove a school bus eleven years, and was a mail carrier five years, retiring in his seventies. Shuttlesworth died Jan. 27, 1965.

To Mrs. Shuttlesworth went the responsibility of making a shroud

for possibly Sudan's first funeral, an infant belonging to the Ray Noels. As no caskets were available a wooden one was built and lined at the L. E. Slate Mercantile Store. According to Mrs. Shuttlesworth and other old-timers the baby was buried south of the old home place of Pete Bosen, supposedly near the Shaffer farm, location not exactly known. Mrs. Shuttlesworth also remembers another burial of a child of the Bill Hughs north of the railroad tracks near the vicinity of the cotton warehouse yards. If the children were ever moved to the present day cemetery it is not known.

"THAT TEXAS WEATHER" Not being familiar with West Texas weather, it is remember-

ed the three oldest Shuttlesworth children, Martin, Arthur and Annie Jewel were sent to school in a snowstorm one morning in 1922 and it seems they wound up at different places, having been blinded by the snow and not being able to keep a sense of direction. Luckily they found their way to a local business and a local residence.

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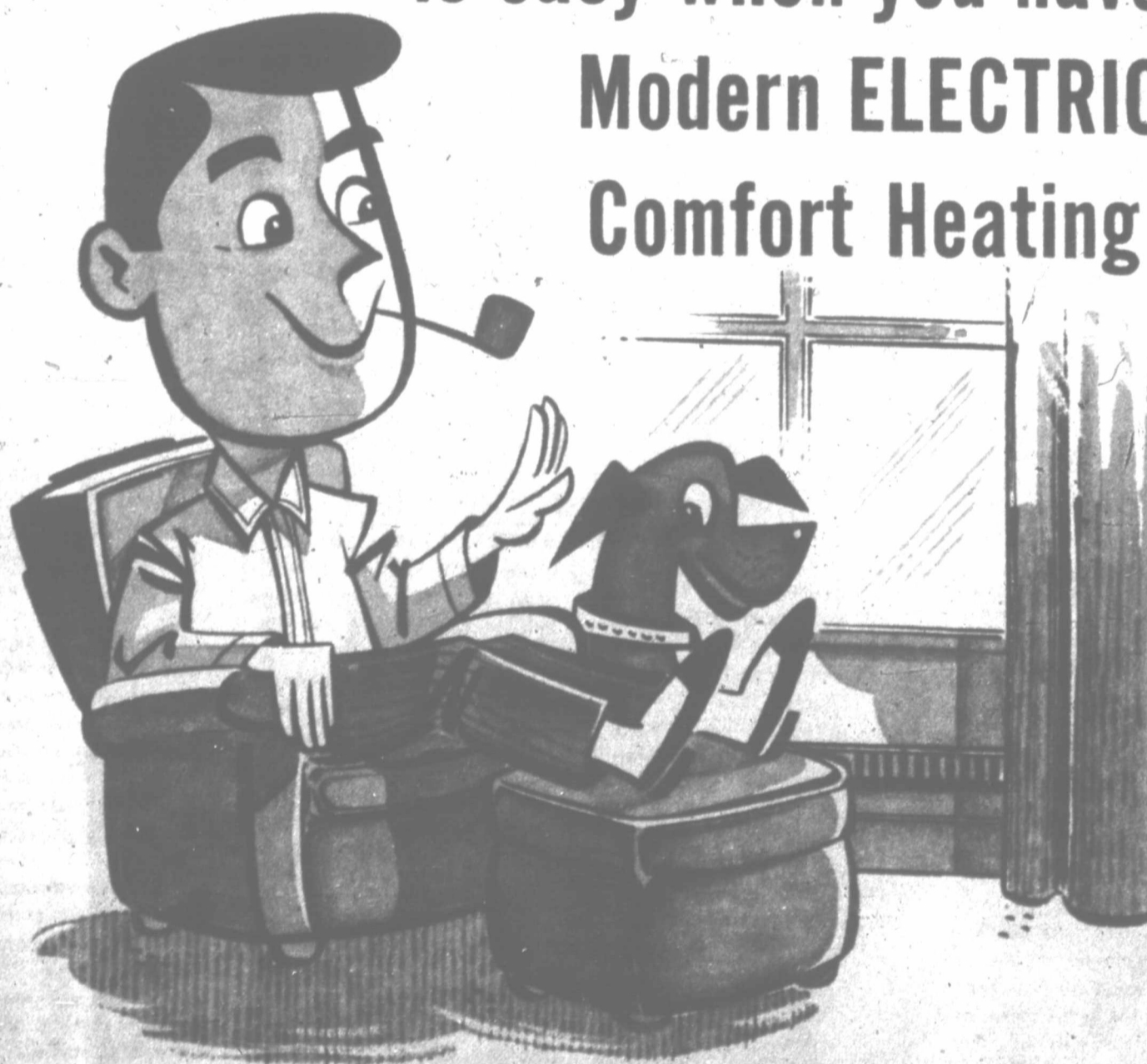


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Devotional

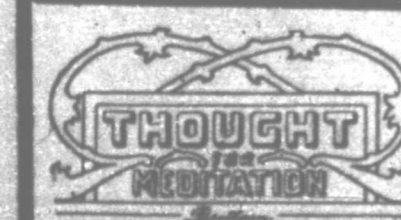
