## WOODWORK

LAST WEEK I had a minor role on the program of a West Texas Chamber of Commerce meeting in Amarillo. As pay for my meager contribution, I got a free meal paid for by a nice fellow named Cliff Milner. I also got to listen to some interesting speakers and panelists.

(Parenthetically, I'd like to comment that this guy's name really is spelled like that—Milner. If it isn't the program was quite consistent with its errors, as it was thusly printed several times. And I heard him introduce himself as Cliff Milner, so I guess he spells it Milner and pronounces it Milner. I didn't ask him about his name, but I figure there must have been a typographical error on his birth certificate and he was forced to accept the spelling. Anyway, he's a nice guy even though the spelling of his name probably has given him some sort of complex.)

Me a while, back with the speaker and panelists, I heard at least three different persons on the panel discussing the role youth can play in West Texas progress mention what a lousy job newspapers are doing.

Mrs. B. F. Seay of Andrews accused newspapers of the country of highlighting the activities of the unwashed minority of young people, pointing out that these are indeed a minority, and that many, and perhaps, most young people today are smart, alert and well-mannered individuals who take part in many wholesome and constructive activities.

Mrs. Seay obviously was thinking in terms of the daily newspapers, but all newspapers of any value have about the same standards for news, so I will try to give some sort of answer to this charge.

What she was saying is that newspapers emphasize the bad things a few people do instead of the good things that most people do. To this charge, we must plead guilty, or at least, partly guilty.

Some newspapers put what I would agree is undue emphasis on hard stories. But most follow a practice of emphasizing the unusual, which is the main element that makes a story news in the first place. It is unfortunate that emphasizing the unusual causes more bad news than good to be printed.

A maniac kills eight nurses in Chicago. Bearded youths at Berkeley cry out for the right to shout four-letter words. American men are dying in Vietnam. A girl gets married in a topless wedding dress. Crowds of teen-agers riot in a weekend beach orgy. None of these things are good news but they are of interest, and it is a newspaper's obligation to report that which is of interest.

These things are unusual for the very reasons that they are out of the ordinary. The Berkeley incident and the teen-age rioting make headlines because they are behavior patterns different from those of most young people (think goodness). So we plead guilty, Mrs. Seay, to the charge of emphasizing the activities of the un-
