A LOT OF FOLKS are getting upset about the daylight savings issue. Federal law says Texas will go on daylight time April 30 (as will all other states) unless the Legislature specifically exempt the state from the federal law.

## Track Team Enters Meet

The Sudan High school track team officially opened the track season Saturday by participating in the Open Meet at Fort Stockton. Sixty-six schools participated with some 33 class AA, A and B schools grouped in the division in which Sudan competed.

Sudan placed seventh in this division with a total of 26.7 points.

Coach Jim Cain reported that the team made a fine showing at the meet by defeating all other class A schools, except Idalou.

The Regional meet will be held April 21-22 which will feature the first and second place winners from the district meet.

The track team is working hard to be qualified to attend the regional meet and perhaps the State Meet to be held in Austin May 4-5-6.

As you may have noticed no track meets are scheduled for Sudan. According to Coach Cain Sudan does not have the adequate facilities to qualify for any type of track meet. "In fact," he added "the condition of our track may hamper the performance of our boys in scheduled meets."

In other words, Sudan must have better track facilities if they intend to have a winning track team.

Other sports events this week include the first volleyball game of the season with the high school girls meeting Muleshoe, there, at 5:30 p.m. today, Thursday.

Tennis and golf activities are also included in the spring sports schedule.

Stencils start a cheerful chain of thought. A book of Animal Stencils can be used over and over by children. The playbook, sold at variety stores, has an elephant, a kangaroo, a lion—and more—to serve as models for the small artist. He can place them on paper and trace them. He can repeat the stencils to decorate playmates. He can string them up to be mobiles. The shapes are handy for making his own gift wrap or for his room by making tents of colored paper and taping out of shoe boxes and soda straws. Often a corner of his own can be reserved for a work project like this.

Stencil books encourage a child to think, yet give him freedom to make with his hands entirely on his own. An appealing parent points out. Preschoolers can use the stencils for simple coloring and later children can do paste-ups and whole landscapes with them. A child's exposure to

### EASTER SEAL APPEAL ISSUED HERE

The 1967 Easter Seal Appeal opened in Lamb County on Monday, February 20, according to Joe Montgomery who serves as Easter Seal Representative for the county. Montgomery said that Easter Seal Appeal letters would begin arriving at homes in the county this week.

As Easter Seal Representative Mr. Montgomery is the person to contact to request rehabilitation services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech, and hearing program and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

Special emphasis is being given in 1967 by the Easter Seal Society in Texas to locating disabled children and adults who may need rehabilitation services.

The Easter Seal Society was established to assist disabled persons and their families in finding and making effective use of all resources which will be helpful to them in developing their abilities and living more useful lives. The Society helps support 23 treatment facilities where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. Wheelchairs, walkers and related services are provided to those who cannot provide for themselves.

The Society depends on the annual Easter Seal Appeal to finance this program of rehabilitation in Texas and Montgomery urged Lamb County citizens to increase their support of the Easter Seal Society, and its program to help crippled children and adults.

At the time of their marriage, Mrs. Milam (the former Bessie Lee Harper, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Harper) was a school teacher and drawing the tidy sum of \$85.00 a month. While a single lass she taught school on one of the large ranches, the J. A. in Donley County and also taught in Hall County. She was favored with the local ranch boys of transportation by horse—back.

The courtship of John Milam and Bessie Lee Harper would read like a story book romance if elaborate upon, but, suffice to say young John came calling in the family 1912 Cadillac; rode his favorite horse when he called for solemn occasion of asking for her hand in marriage; then came for his bride-to-be in a 1918 Model T. Ford on their wedding day, Dec. 2, 1917.

John Milam was born in Hall County where he grew up. Mrs. Milam was born at Corsicana and moved with her family to Claud, Texas in 1898, later moving to Memphis in Hall County.

Early area ranches remembered by the Milams were the Ralls Ranch, Paul Brothers and Johnny McMurry. Early neighbors were the Porter Ernest family, the Walter Damrons, Ves Gamers, Doc Elmore.

The Milams retired and moved to Sudan Sept 16, 1959. By coincidence on Feb. 21, 1957 they were staking off their town lot for their home; the date of their arrival 34 years earlier in the Sudan area as pioneers.

John was the son of W. M. Milam, native of Georgia who came to Parker County, Texas in 1878 and bought out the U Bar Brand, "range delivery to all us tenderfeet" this means W. M. bought all horses with the U Bar Brand, but, he had to round them up off the range. W. M. later settled in Hall County in 1889 and help-

### Florida New Potatoes Treat for Reducers



One of the most cherished treasures to come from the Florida soil is the unusually fine, large crop of new potatoes. These have such delicately good flavor and "buttery texture" that they need very little, if any, high calorie saucing. Potatoes—especially new potatoes—should be included in reducing diets because they have bonus amounts of vitamin C in addition to the many nutrients which make them such an excellent food.

**SAVORY NEW POTATOES**  
1 1/2 pounds new potatoes  
2 cups chicken stock  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Ground black pepper to taste  
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
Salt to taste

Wash potatoes and peel 1-inch strip around center of potato. Place in steamer with stock, or, if desired, use 2 bouillon cubes and 2 cups boiling water. Add salt. Cover, bring to boiling point and simmer 15 to 20 minutes or until tender. Drain. Place in serving dish and sprinkle with ground black pepper to taste. Dot with butter if desired. YIELD: 6 servings.

Serve with one of the following toppings: One tablespoon chopped fresh parsley, dill or chives; or one tablespoon butter.

**NEW POTATOES PARMESAN**  
1 1/2 pounds new potatoes  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Butter or margarine (optional)  
Ground black pepper to taste  
Paprika for garnish  
Parmesan cheese

Wash and scrape new potatoes. Cook in covered steamer until tender. Drain, add butter and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Dot with butter if desired. Sprinkle with ground black pepper and Parmesan cheese. YIELD: 6 servings.

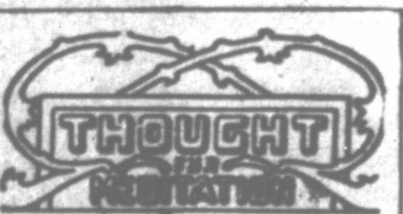
