SOMEBODY finally spoke up in defense of child-beaters, implying that there are some kids who need to be beaten.

Of coursey I can't seriously condone any child-beating, but I do have to admit that the statements of a couple of pediatricians quoted in a news dispatch last week are interesting.

Child beating stems from stresses in the home because parenthood isn't always what it's cracked up to be, they said.

"If one is honest, one must admit that children are a mixed blessing to the average parent, " the team said, "It is much easier to talk about the love of adults for children than to document the facts," they added.

"Children do limit the activities of parents. They are not always easy to deal with and, indeed, some are most difficult... Perhaps we should be amazed that more children do not suffer assults by parents who have reached their wits' end. "

Well, anyway, you distraught mothers can take some comfort in knowing that others are nearly driven nutty by their kids, too. But that doesn't give a parent a right to beat a kid.

The only kids I have ever seen who needed beating were not mine, naturally, and practically any parent can say that. Your own kids just don't seem as bad as those of the parents.

Of course, our own youngsters (the little darlings) occasionally need to be batted around a little, but not really beaten. In contrast, we seem to have frequent visitors whose brats we would like to drop-kick over the backyard fence.
